Blue Island, Ill.—(UPI)—The American Lutheran church has modified its stand on divorce to allow the remarriage of the innocent party and also the guilty party provided there is repentance.

The modification was announced Monday in a paper presented to some 300 delegates at the church's 14th biennial convention here. The statement urged Lutheran pastors to "carefully" decide which person is the innocent party in a divorce action and ascertain when the guilty party "has seen and repented before God of his sins."

Water Runoff Records Set in Northwest

Portland—(UPI)—New water runoff records were set at 17 of 31 gauging stations in the Pacific Northwest during the water year just concluded, the U.S. Geological Survey said here today.

The survey made every month of the water year, from October through September, had been better than average with January and December the heaviest in peak flows.

Last month's mean flow on the Columbia river near The Dalles was 103 per cent of the 15-year average for September and the outlook for this month is for a runoff about 100 per cent of the 15-year average for October.

Boys School Blaze Leaves One Dead

Chehalis—(UPI)—One boy was killed and six other persons were injured, one seriously, last night in a fire which broke out in the maximum security cottage of the Greenhill academy.

The victim was Richard Vanderpool, 16, of Balfaire, near Bremerton. He was trapped in his room at the training school for boys when the blaze broke out.

Vanderpool hid under his bed but was overcome by smoke.

Fifteen other boys and five members of the school staff were also in the building when the fire was discovered. Eleven boys escaped immediately from the blazing cottage but four others had to be taken from the building by school personnel.

George Gage, a cottage "parent" was hospitalized when he collapsed from inhaling smoke after helping lead some of the boys out.

E. H. Stevenson, business manager of the school, said the fire apparently broke out "spontaneously" in the television room on the ground floor of the cottage.

Distributorship Sales Bring Arrest

Portland—(UPI)—Sherwin Shoen, 37, who listed his occupation as a barber, was arrested yesterday in connection with what postal authorities called the sale of phony "exclusive" distributorships for a battery additive and a nylon preserver.

Shoen was released on \$5000 bail. He was indicted secretly last Friday by a federal grand jury on 10 counts of mail fraud and one of conspiracy.

R. A. Severson, postal inspector, said it was charged that "exclusive" franchises for the products were sold to distributors in Yakima and Spokane, Wash.; Coolidge, Ariz.; Butte, Mont.; and Salem. Severson said that after distributors had signed, they often found that competing stores had identical products under the same name or a different name.

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Baseball Interest Slows Wall Street

New York—(UPI)—Wall Street went all out for baseball today. Interest in the market was in direct proportion to the sales total which was the smallest since Aug. 15, 1955, just about 14 million.

The price trend was in inverse proportion to the interest in the ball game. It was lower, but not much. Only the industrial average fell as much as one half of one per cent.

In most instances the net changes held to fractions. The ones that didn't seldom got beyond a point.
