

# 16-5 Odds Favor Yanks to Take Series; Casey Confident of Win

Brooklyn — (U.P.) — The New York Yankees are 27 putouts away today from attaining a share of Don Larsen's World Series glory.

Favored at 16-5 odds to win their sixth world championship in seven tries under Casey Stengel, the Yankees were scheduled to send either 18-game winner Johnny Kucks or eight-game victor Bob Turley against the Brooklyn Dodgers' "do-or-die" choice of Clem Labine. The odds on today's sixth game are 21-20 if it's Kucks vs. Labine and even money if Turley gets Stengel's nod.

Triumphant, though as dazed as the rest of this cockeyed world after Larsen's first perfect game in series history gave them a 3-2 series edge, the Yankees needed only one victory in the two remaining games at Ebbets field to add another golden page to their history.

Their last five straight series games to the Dodgers at the cozy little Ebbets field handbox but after Monday's historic 2-0 victory, they're convinced anything can happen.

Will Remember Larsen

For never before in all the 53 years of World Series history has there been a situation such as the two teams find themselves in today. After Larsen's "ultimate game" there is only anticlimax. This 1956 World Series will always be remembered as the one in which a 27-year-old modern Rube Waddell achieved immortality. Even the players sense that in the years to come the public will say, "Oh, yes, the Yankees or, so be it, the Dodgers won that series."

The stunning impact of Larsen's wondrous achievement surpassed all other considerations. Players of both teams in addition to the 64,519 fans at Yankee stadium seemed to realize they had taken part in a never-to-be-duplicated historic event.

That was in evidence in the Yankee clubhouse Monday when the normally blase Yankee attitude could have been summed up in the words, "gee whizz" as well as in the attitude of the Dodgers, who visited the New York clubhouse to shake the hand of the man who pitched the "dream game" to end all dream games.

Maglie Adds Congratulations  
Among these was 39-year-old Sal Maglie, the great old clutch pitcher who was beaten by the greatest clutch performance of all time.

For today's sixth game, both managers indicated they would stand pat. The Yankees, of course were convinced they could not fail in the wake of Larsen's performance while the Dodgers took heart from their two-year, unbroken run of success against New York in their home park.

"I only hope our players are as confident as I am that we'll win it," Stengel said. "The boys should be feeling real good after that one and there's no reason why we can't wrap it up at Ebbets field."

Manager Walt Alston of the Dodgers led his players in praising Larsen's performance but pointed out "we've been in tough situations before and we still think we're going to win this one."

Both managers are sticking with their fifth-game lineups, barring last-minute overnight hunches.

Alston Has No Choice  
That means Stengel will keep Joe Collins at first base and string along again with third baseman Andy Carey. Carey singled to open the sixth and scored the Yankees' second run Monday while Collins also sing-

Larsen Owes Wife \$420  
New York — (U.P.) — Don Larsen may not be paid for his World Series perfect game for some time, if his wife is successful in having his Series share attached by the courts.

While the 27-year old star pitcher was achieving baseball immortality at Yankee stadium Monday, it was disclosed at nearby Bronx Supreme Court that Vivian Larsen, his estranged wife, had filed a court complaint for non-support of her and their 1-year old daughter.

Justice Sam H. Hofstadter issued a show cause order requiring the Yankees and baseball Commissioner Ford Frick to show in court next Monday why Larsen's Series shares — which could run between \$6,000 and \$10,000 — should not be withheld.

Mrs. Larsen claimed in her complaint that the big pitcher deserted her and their daughter, Caroline Jean Larsen, and that the Bronx Supreme Court ordered Larsen on July 16 of this year to pay her \$60 a week in support money. She said Larsen was \$420 behind in his payments.

In the face of Larsen's perfect game, Alston really has no choice. He can merely throw up his hands and accept Larsen's date with destiny and hope the Dodgers will once again resemble the formidable machine they looked like in the first two games at Ebbets field.

Behind, 2-0, only three days ago, the Yankees went ahead in the Series for the first time Monday when the 6-foot, 4-inch, 225-pound Larsen pitched his all-time master piece.

With Maglie, the no-hit hero of the Dodgers' pennant victory hurling one of his finest clutch games, the Yankees were held hitless until Mantle walloped his third home run of the Series with two out in the fourth inning. Carey's single, Larsen's sacrifice and Hank Bauer's single made it 2-0 in the sixth and left it up to Larsen.

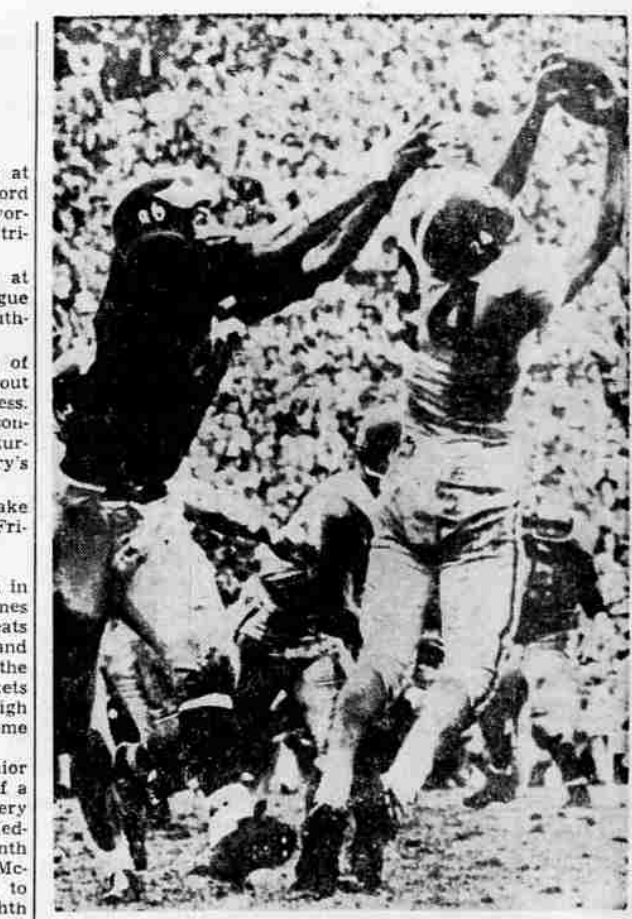

In 1947 Bevans pitched for those same Yankees against the Dodgers. The husky right-hander had a no-hitter going with two out in the ninth when Cookie Lavagetto rapped a pinch-hit double that scored two runs and cost Bevans a 3-2 defeat. Bevans had walked 10 in that contest and the Dodgers had scored a run—but they didn't have a hit until Lavagetto's dramatic blow.

Bevans said he "was feeling for him all the way."
