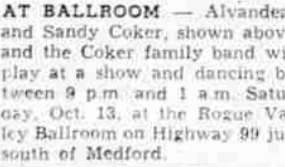

# Railroad Rapped by Simpson at Kiwanis Meeting Yesterday

Southern Pacific company's "stranglehold" on the economy of this area was rapped yesterday by L. L. Simpson, secretary manager of the Southern Oregon Conservation and Tree Farm association, when he told Medford Kiwanis club that southern Oregon is not getting its share of wood industry plants because of the railway firm's "refusal to give us decent freight rates."  
Simpson addressed the noon luncheon of the service group at Rogue Valley Country club.  
Kiwanians also heard a report from Jennings Pierce on the first quarter of the porcupine eradication contest the club is sponsoring with the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce. Ronald Scholer, Ashland, second place winner for the quarter, was presented a crossbow award.  
Bicycle Winner  
Kenneth Phipps, fifth grader at Jefferson school, was introduced as the bicycle winner in the Kiwanis Kids night "get out the vote" contest. Jack Raapke, contest chairman said that 642 students, who got 10 or more signatures of people promising to register and vote, were admitted to the Crater-Medford High school football game. Many of the students got more than 100 persons to sign the pledge.  
Simpson in his talk listed overproduction of lumber and plywood, overproduction of

housing and high interest rates, making money hard to borrow, among reasons for slump in the lumber industry. He also mentioned that prices were "not too good" and said that industry is somewhat to blame. He pointed to high bidding on timber.  
The industry survived a similar situation in 1950, Simpson stated. Looking to the future, he brought out the need for utilization of the wastes from forest resources and the need to go through a transition from sawmills to manufacture of products from wastes. Simpson said there is a large reserve of wastes in southern Oregon. He then brought in the freight rate matter.
