The lesson was given by Mrs. Foster Swigert and Mrs. Lemmon.

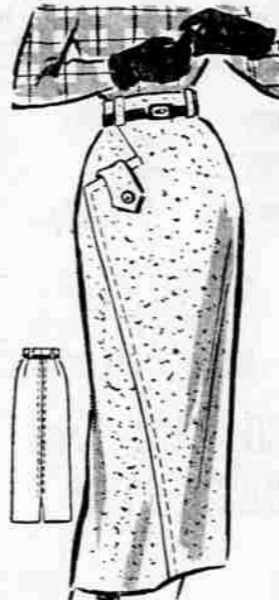
Roll call was answered with incidents from trips made during the summer months. The November roll call will be answered with a household hint.
