

TORNADO, PELICANS TANGLE HERE TONIGHT

A-1 Scuffle On Medford Grid Turf

Physical outlook for the Medford high Black Tornado was much improved today as the defending district champion footballers awaited the 8:15 p.m. kick-off time against a traditional Southern Oregon conference and District 6 A-1 opponent.

Medford "enters" the Pelicans of Klamath Falls tonight in its second district and conference ruckus and the first for the Whitebirds. At the same time Ashland will be at Grants Pass for a loop and district hassle.

The Black Tornado and the Cavemen are the favorites for the encounters but the Medford aggregation is expected to run into considerably more trouble against the upset-minded Pels than Grants Pass will find in opposing the Grizzlies.

The Medford camp has had its worries this week when tackles Neil Plumley and Larry Cranston and halfback Gary Riley developed cases of the flu and end Gary Harrington sprained an ankle. Coach Fred Spiegelberg reported last night, however, that Cranston was on hand for the Thursday practice.

Riley was pretty well recovered from his siege of illness and that Plumley and Harrington likely would be in suit along with Cranston and Riley tonight.

Whitebirds have dominated in recent years with four victories in the last seven games. There have been one Medford win and two ties in that span.

Tonight's engagement will find the underdog Klamath eleven of Coach John McGinnis going for an upset in trying to continue its recent year success. The Pels with only two victories in five outings aim to add bright luster to their season. Medford is seeking its third consecutive district banner and also is ambitious to uphold its Oregon prestige. The Tornado with four victories and one tie is rated No. 2 among the state's Pels. Klamath is unrated but is still a power to be reckoned with in its own district.
