

# SOC Red Raiders Play PSC Vikings Saturday

Ashland—A Southern Oregon college football crew, which has a few aches and hurts but is determined to make the best of it, appears on Fuller field Saturday night against the Portland State college Vikings.

It will be the first showing of the Red Raiders on the Ashland turf and will be the Oregon Collegiate conference started for the Southern Oregonians.

Coach Al Akins has forewarned his Raiders that they'll need more of the same spirit that they had in defeating Chico and that they can't let down if they are to launch their OCC slate with a victory. The Portland Slayers won't carry tremendous weight but they will have speed and they have good passing and some fine breakaway runners.

Pass defense has continued to get attention through the week since Harvey Neffendorf of the Vikes is expected to be one of the best flingers the SOC team will face this season. The fleet backs are Lee Foster, Curtis Knight and Julius Strong. Portland has a puncher in 195-pound Chuck Withers.

## Beavers Tussle California; Oregon Faces Washington

Oregon State and California were rated even-up for their Pacific Coast Conference football game at Parker stadium in Corvallis tomorrow afternoon, while Oregon's Ducks, their wings clipped by UCLA last week, were underdogs against a resurgent Washington team at Seattle.

Coach Tommy Prothro's Beavers and the Golden Bears each have suffered two defeats this season. But both remain very much in the PCC title picture.

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Oregon State lost to Iowa by one point and Southern Cal by eight after defeating Missouri 19-13. California lost to unbeaten Baylor 7-6 and to Illinois 32-30 and then last week upset strong Pittsburgh 14-0.

### Game Televised

The game will be regionally televised.

Oregon flew to Seattle yesterday afternoon for its game with Washington. The Ducks face probably the strongest offensive team they've met this season in Washington, which also boasts a speedy backfield.

Oregon, its hopes high after an opening 35-0 win over Colorado, barely defeated Idaho and then was blanked by UCLA 6-0 last week.

The Huskies are slight favorites.

## British Court Finds Lady Discus Thrower Quilty of Shoplifting

London—(U.P.)—A British court today found Soviet discus champion Nina Ponomareva guilty of stealing five hats from a London shop. But it freed her with payment of light court costs to permit her to return to Russia "at the earliest possible moment."

Nina pleaded innocent to the theft charge, which Moscow had said was a "provocation" designed to embarrass an eminent athlete.

However, Magistrate Clyde Wilson, before whom she was

tried in jam-packed Marlborough Street Court, ruled that the charge of shoplifting had been proved against the 27-year-old

But, apparently mindful of international repercussions, he released her unconditionally on payment of three guineas (nine dollars) court costs.

## Perfect Game Brings Varied Commitments

New York—(U.P.)—Don Larsen, the perfect game pitcher, said today he will "gladly settle for 16 or 18 victories next year."

Up to his ears in endorsements and a variety of other commitments, the hulking 27-year-old right hander headed today for Hollywood, Calif., where he has a television date during the week end.

"Everyone's expecting mira-

cles from this no-windup idea," he said, before departing. "I think it's a good thing and naturally I'd like to win 20 next year but right now I'd gladly settle for 16 or 18."

A whole new world has opened up for the previously hardly-noticed Larsen since he pitched his masterpiece.

The tremendous publicity that followed his feat has enabled him to meet such celebrities as Elizabeth Taylor, Bop Hope and Frankie Laine among others, and he's frank enough to admit he's "enjoying every minute of it."

Thus far his perfect game has paid off \$15,000 in outside "work" with the prospect he may more than double that figure this winter.

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
