

Music Memberships 'Coming in Fast'

Memberships for the annual concert season of Jackson County Civic Music Association "are coming in very fast" it was said at headquarters this morning. The annual campaign opened Monday and closes tomorrow; no memberships will be sold after that date and no single admissions are ever sold for concerts.

Littrell, Collins Return From Trip

Al Littrell and Ed Collins were guests of the U.S. Air Force last week end on a flight to Florida to witness an Air Force fire power demonstration.

They were picked up here Friday, flown to Florida, and returned Tuesday, after visiting Elgin Air Force base, a research and experimental base, Florida. They stopped at Lowry Air Force base, Denver, en route, and visited the new Air Force academy.

The two Medford businessmen were the only Oregon men in a party of 5,500 men to observe the demonstration from all over the country and abroad. A number of civilians were invited as part of the armed forces program of public relations and information.

The trip was made in an Air Force plane.

The demonstration itself consisted of displays of new types of equipment, including planes and weapons, both fighters and bombers. At one point an F-100 fighter plane went through the sonic barrier in front of the audience, and the shock wave was tremendous, they reported.

En route back they stopped at Nellis Air Force base, Las Vegas, Nev., where many of the newer types of planes are stationed.

Board Members Set Lincoln School Meet

School board members from Jackson and Josephine counties will meet at the Jefferson school in Medford, Tuesday, Oct. 16, to discuss proposed legislation relating to school problems of administration and finance.

County Superintendent Alf B. Mekvold will explain the proposed revision of the Rural School Law, which would make the County School Superintendent an appointive office and would require annexation of all districts not now within a rural school district, to the existing rural school district, for purposes of tax equalization.

Medford School Superintendent Leonard Mayfield will discuss the new distribution formula for the basic school support fund.

There also will be a discussion on some of the proposals for state assistance in building construction for distressed districts, and presentation of program of the annual convention of the Oregon School Board association in Eugene Nov. 30 and Dec. 1.

'Politics' Charged in Polio Vaccine Plans

Washington—U.P.—Rep. B. Carroll Reece today accused a Democratic-controlled House subcommittee of going on a "purely political fishing expedition" to try to discredit the administration's polio vaccine program.

The Tennessee Republican said the Democratic investigators "show a complete callousness for the welfare of the children to make such political capital out of it."

Reece charged "politics" as the government Operations subcommittee headed by Rep. L. H. Fountain (D-N.C.) recalled government officials for further testimony.

The subcommittee is trying to find out if the government was overcharged for Salk vaccine on the \$53 million program to provide free shots for needy children.

Duncan Discusses State Measures at Farm Bureau Meet

Robert Duncan, Democratic candidate for the state legislature, was the guest for the Fern Valley Farm bureau at its meeting this week. He discussed pros and cons of various measures which will be submitted to a vote of the people at the general election, Nov. 6.

There was considerable interest in the measure which is intended to give the legislature power to attach the emergency clause to tax legislation, and a number of questions were raised.

Duncan also discussed the measures dealing with restricting commercial fishing in the coastal streams, the referendum on the cigarette tax, the measure authorizing the state to accept gifts of stocks and bonds, raising legislative salaries, legalizing salaries of the governor, secretary of state, treasurer, Supreme Court judges and the measure dealing with the qualifications and means of selecting the county surveyor and the county coroner.

Duncan also urged the members to write in the name of William M. McAllister for justice of the Supreme Court. He pointed out that this was the first time that a Jackson county resident had been appointed to the Supreme Court, and that Justice McAllister is a man of unquestioned integrity, fine judicial temperament, and well qualified legally for the position which he seeks.

Duncan called attention to the fact that it was necessary not only to write in the name of William McAllister for position No. 1 on the Supreme Court ballot, but also to make an "X" in front of it.

Dominis is free on \$100 bail and is working for relatives at Valsetz, Ore.

Washington—U.P.—Sen. Clinton P. Anderson (D-N.M.) chairman of the House-Senate Atomic Energy Committee, has agreed with Adlai E. Stevenson that the United States should end its H-bomb tests.

Anderson said Thursday the country should take immediate steps to halt the testing of nuclear weapons "of more than one megaton intensity." Such tests, he said, "appear unnecessary at the present time for a well-balanced arsenal of weapons."

Railroads Reduce Hay Shipment Rates

Washington—U.P.—The Association of American Railroads said that beginning Saturday western railroads will cut in half their rates on hay shipments from the West to drought-stricken states.

The association made the announcement Thursday after President Eisenhower unveiled a new farm aid program, including \$5 million in subsidies, to help farmers in 14 drought-stricken states maintain their basic livestock herds.

The reduced railroad rates were authorized by the Interstate Commerce Commission shortly before the railroads announced the cut. The railroad program will be in effect in Texas, Oklahoma, Arizona, Colorado, Kansas, Nevada and Utah.

Northwestern States Receive Rainfall

Earlier this week federal agents had arrested Sherwin and Marilyn Shoen on similar charges, along with Mrs. Dorothy Peddicord, wife of the blind man convicted of bombing the Meier & Frank store here last year.

A detainer has been placed on William Clarence Peddicord at the state penitentiary where he is serving a 20-year sentence for the bombing.

Western Electric Negotiations Stall

Winston-Sale, N.C.—U.P.—Negotiations between Western Electric Co. and the striking Communications Workers of America stalled again Thursday night when the company rejected a union package proposal.

Company negotiators said they were willing to accept four of the union's proposals but the union insisted on acceptance of the entire nine-proposal package.

It was the second time the company had rejected a CWA package offer.

Teacher Refused To Quit Job for Defending Man

Mrs. Flo Way, a 45-year-old fifth grade teacher, charged Thursday the Jefferson county school board ordered her to resign and keep quiet about it.

"I have no reason to resign, and I feel I have the right to free speech," she said. "I shall carry on as usual."
