

# Former Internal Revenue Chief Would End Income Tax if Elected

Richmond, Va. — (UPI) — For nearly three years as President Eisenhower's internal revenue commissioner, T. Coleman Andrews nagged the people to file their income tax returns early. And he told his subordinates to make every last taxpayer fork over every last penny due the government.

Now he's running for president on an independent conservative ticket which is dedicated to abolition of the federal income tax.

This isn't as inconsistent as it may sound. In early 1953 shortly after joining the Eisenhower team he said taxes were "oppressively high." But as long as the law was on the books and he had the job of administering it, he would operate according to "plain old-fashioned morality steadily practiced and rigidly enforced."

**Can Say What He Thinks**

Now that he is no longer with the government and is, instead, the presidential candidate of a new conservative political movement, he can say what he thinks. One of the things he thinks is that the income tax is a "thoroughly un-American" device pulled "right out of the Communists' manifesto."

He also thinks the major par-

tical ambitions and never until this year ran for political office. He didn't want to this time.

But on Sept. 15 at Memphis, Tenn., a loosely knit group of more than 300 representatives of a variety of conservative splinter parties in 25 states endorsed him for president. They picked Thomas H. Werdel, former Republican House member from California, as his running mate. Andrews hesitated for a while, but finally agreed to run.

**Names on Ballots**

On Oct. 6, the "National Committee for T. Coleman Andrews and Thomas H. Werdel" said independent electors' names will be on the ballots in at least 14 states—8 in the South and 6 in the North and Midwest—for the presidential election in November.

But Andrews has made it clear he is not trying to establish a third party. His aim, he says, is to force a realignment of both the Republican and Democratic parties.

He hopes to do this by proving at the polls that there are a lot of conservative voters who don't like the way either major party is behaving.

"We think there will be enough to give both parties something to think about," he says.

## Back Stairs: One Short Trip a Week

Washington — (UPI) — Back stairs at the White House:

"I am trying, at least, to make one short trip a week." That's how President Eisenhower outlines his plans for the remainder of the campaign.

Short in time, but mostly long in distance. None of the President's four trips so far — the shortest was about 400 miles — has taken him away from Washington for more than 31 hours.

Next week: The longest in time and distance: 72 hours and about 5,300 miles.

Mr. Eisenhower's press following on the campaign has been growing. It took two chartered planes to carry the reporters and cameramen on the Pittsburgh trip this week, and there will probably be two for at least part of the long western trip next week. Between 35 to 40 newspaper and wire service reporters have boarded the planes here on each of the four stumping tours. The presidential caravan always picks up more reporters on the road, some from

local newspapers and radio and TV stations, and some Washington reporters who are out there sampling grass roots sentiment.

In addition, there are a dozen or more radio and TV newsmen, photographers and cameramen on each trip.

The President received an open letter last week, telling him: "You are a commuter's hazard."

## All Italy Mourns Gallant Laborer

Terrazzano, Italy — (UPI) — Italy today mourned for the gallant laborer who died leading a police assault on two mad brothers who held 100 children and three women teachers hostages for six terrifying hours Wednesday.

Sante Zennaro, 23, was shot and killed by Arturo Santato, 27, who, with his brother, Flavio Osvaldo, had threatened to kill the children and teachers unless paid \$320,000 ransom.

Zennaro was chosen to lead the police charge because he helped build the school and knew the layout. He fell under a hail of bullets as he clambered through the window of the first floor classroom where the crazed brothers were holed up with their terrified hostages.

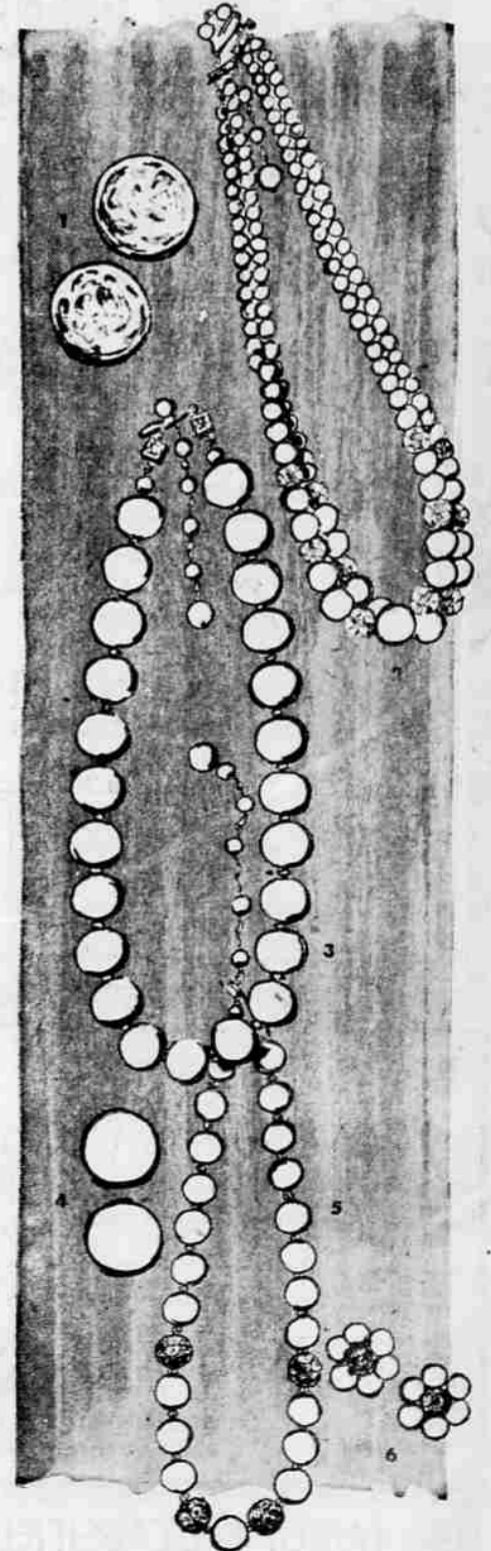
