

Oregon State Overpowers Cal, 21-13; Webfoot Fumbles Give Game to Huskies

Contestable Sparks Bevos In Upset

Corvallis, Ore. — (U.P.) — Oregon State turned a crunching ground attack loose in the second half to come from two touchdowns behind and overpower California, 21-13, Saturday in a Pacific Coast Conference football game.

An overcast sky pretty much reflected the early gloom of 14-125 partisan fans in Parker Stadium at the end of the half when the Golden Bears of California held a 13-0 lead. The California scores were set up by the remarkable passing of sophomore quarterback Joe Contestable, who during the first two quarters was delectable to the Beavers.

But an Oregon State crew of fleet and powerful backs proved too much for a steadily weakening California line in the second half. The Beavers got one touchdown in the third quarter on a 30-yard run around right end by sophomore Paul Lowe and ground out two more—the last with only two seconds remaining in the game—in the fourth period.

Clark Converts
Lowe squirted through the California defense from the three-yard-line for the second, and tying, Oregon State touchdown. John Clarke, a sophomore right end, put the Beavers ahead 14-13 with a conversion. The final score climaxed a 51-yard drive which saw Oregon State call for time out on the California four with two seconds remaining to play. With time left for only one play, Lowe plunged over and Tony Arana, another sophomore, converted. Clarke had made good also on his first conversion attempt.

It was Oregon State's first conference victory in two outings.

California, inspired by the passing of Contestable, scored first mid-way in the first quarter when Jack Hart cracked over from the 10-yard-line to climax a 65-yard drive. Max Hale's conversion try was wide.

Scores on Pass
The second Golden Bear score came early in the second quarter when Contestable hit Hart in the end zone from 10 yards out. This time Hale made good his try for point.

Biggest thrill of the contest was a 75-yard sprint into the end zone by Lowe which was nullified by an Oregon State holding penalty with the game barely under way.

California completed 12 out of 21 pass attempts for 144 yards, almost all of it in the first half. Oregon State made 279 yards on the ground and the Beavers' 76 yards from passing more than offset the Bears' 72 from rushing. In first downs Oregon State led 23-11.

Phoenix — The Illinois Valley high Cougars spotted Phoenix a first quarter touchdown here Friday night then romped back for a 25 to 6 victory.

Cave Junction's prep footballers thereby recorded win No. 2 in District 6 A-2's southern sector to stay even with Eagle Point. The game was the Cougar's opener in the Rogue league.

Score was 13 to 6 at the half and 19 to 6 at the end of three cantos.

A big, hard smacking power team, the IV club consistently drove for yardage inside the tackles. It ran and passed for 233 net yards while holding the Pirates to 79. Illinois Valley accumulated 14 first downs to four by Phoenix.

Phoenix recovered an IV fumble on the Cougar 40-yard line and drove goalward in the first quarter with Don Wallace and Jack Thompson carrying the ball. Wallace pushed the last three yards.

He set up the second IV marker with a 35-yard punt return and then sneaked from two yards away. The extra point kick was good.

IV marched 30 yards in the third quarter to the Phoenix 10 where Milligan pitched the scoring pass to Piller.

For the conclusion TD the Cougars blocked Wallace's punt on about the Phoenix 30-yard line and went to the end zone from there. Milligan's scoring run was for three yards.

Fred Bliss was a standout for IV at right halfback and Eldo Swift turned in a bruising game at defensive guard. Archie Trott was particularly outstanding for Phoenix on defense.

UO Fails to Capitalize On Breaks

Seattle, Wash. — (U.P.) — Guard Dick Day, eating up bobbed balls like mashed potatoes, kept Washington out of the duck soup Saturday as the Huskies defeated Oregon 20-7 in a Pacific Coast Conference football game before 33,500 fans.

Day, a 240-pound junior, recovered five of Oregon's seven fumbles including one that set up Washington's final touchdown.

Washington scored in the first period when Luther (hit-and-run) Carr snaked 27 yards to enemy territory. The Huskies were never headed but they were in constant trouble until Day pounced on Jack Crabtree's fourth period fumble on the Oregon 47.

Fumble into TD
Mike McCluskey ripped off 10 yards, Bobby Herring added 24 more and three plays later Herring fell on his own fumble in the end zone for a touchdown.

Oregon opened up like it was going places when Jack Morris ran the kickoff back 75 yards before end Corky Lewis downed him with a toe-tackle on the 15. But the Ducks couldn't capitalize on the advantage and lost the ball on a fourth down fumble.

Washington began rolling near the end of the first period and Carr found a wide hole at right tackle and scored standing up.

Dean Derby added six points for Washington in the second period when he bucked over from the one, culminating a 33-yard drive set up when guard Whitey Core recovered Tom Crabtree's fumble.

Center Nick Markulis, a bull on defense, blocked Derby's kick for the extra point.

Then it was Oregon's turn, and the Ducks drove 72 yards in nine plays, two of them long passes by Tom Crabtree. Will Reeve rounded right end to score and Morris kicked the extra point — Oregon's 19th without a miss and the ninth in a row this year.

Crede (Incredible) Green broke away in the third period for 40 yards but quarterback Bill Snyder fumbled away Washington's chance and the game turned into a defensive duel until Day recovered Jack Crabtree's fumble.

OSC Star Due in Court

Corvallis — (U.P.) — Oregon State college football star Paul Lowe, 20, of Los Angeles, will appear in Benton County Circuit court here Oct. 26 to enter a plea of innocent to an indictment charging that he took a bicycle without permission of the owner.

Lowe's attorney, Karl Huston of Corvallis, said the innocent plea would be entered on the regular day for submitting motions to the court and that a trial date would then be set.

The later date for plea would mean that Lowe probably would retain his position as No. 2 tailback on the Beaver football squad for the remainder of the season. College officials have said they would take no action pending outcome of court proceedings.

Lowe and another student were arrested on the bicycle theft charges but Lowe explained he had only borrowed the bicycle, thinking it belonged to the persons from whom he borrowed it.

Richardson, Moyer Win Ring Titles

Stockton, Calif. — (U.P.) — The Western Regional Olympic boxing trials ended Friday night with 10 hard-hitting fighters winning berths in the American championships which start in San Francisco next Wednesday.

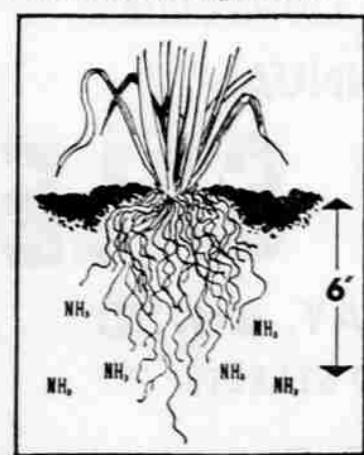
