News About Books From the Library

In observation of National Bible Week, Oct. 13-21, a special Bible Week selection of books is featured in an exhibit at the Medford Public Library.

Included in the display are a number of editions of the Bible, "Standard Revised Version," "Modern Reader's Bible," "The Bible: An American Translation," "The Bible for Today," and "The Bible Designed to be Read as Living Literature." Abridged versions include a "Digest of the Bible," arranged and edited by Peter V. Ross; "The Short Bible," an American translation edited by Edgar J. Goodspeed and J. M. Powis Smith; and "The Book of Books," the King James version of the English Bible abridged and arranged for younger readers.

French, Spanish French and Spanish translations of the Bible are also available at the library for patrons who read most easily in these languages.

The selection of books on exhibit also include Bible history and archaeology, study and teaching of the Bible, individual Bible characters, Bible commentaries, and novels about Bible figures.

Among the most recently published books about the Bible and Bible characters is "All the Women of the Bible," "You can almost trace light and darkness in the Bible by the women themselves," writes the author, Mrs. Edith Deen.

Mary Ellen Chase, author of "The Bible and the Common Reader," now gives us "Life and Language in the Old Testament," a valuable guide to the understanding of the Old Testament.

Showers Soak Area Of Rocky Mountains

By UNITED PRESS Most of the eastern half of the nation basked under sunny skies and balmy temperatures Saturday while showers soaked the Rocky Mountain states and the area around the Gulf of Mexico.

Warm air moved into the Eastern Seaboard from Maine to Georgia. It was also sunny and warm from the Ohio Valley west to the Great Lakes and Mississippi Valley. Spasmodic showers sprinkled Louisiana, Alabama and surrounding states however, and the Rocky Mountain states were in the grips of cooler air and drab showers. Light snow was expected over portions of Montana.

The mercury dipped slightly from the Rockies west to the Coast. It was generally sunny west of the Mountain States, but there were hints of off-and-on showers over the Pacific Northwest.

King Paul Foregoes Allowance Increase

Athens, Greece — (U.P.) — King Paul said Saturday he will forego the private allowance increase granted him by Parliament this week and will cut expenses instead. Parliament increased the royal family allowance by one-half, raising it to \$397,000. The King said he decided against acceptance because of accusations of overspending and criticism of his pleasure trips.

Troops Guard River Threatening New Delhi

New Delhi, India — (U.P.) — Troops stood guard Saturday along the Jumna River which threatened this capital city with the worst floods since 1924. Engineers said the water level was rapidly approaching the 1924 flooding point which resulted in most of the city being submerged. Eight Delhi villages already were under water and 3,000 persons had to be evacuated.
