

### Heirlooms and Antiques Displayed by Sojourners

A display of antiques and heirlooms featured a meeting of Sojourners club Thursday at the Pythian hall. The display was held during the tea hour preceding the meeting.

Medford guild members will take a display of handwoven articles.

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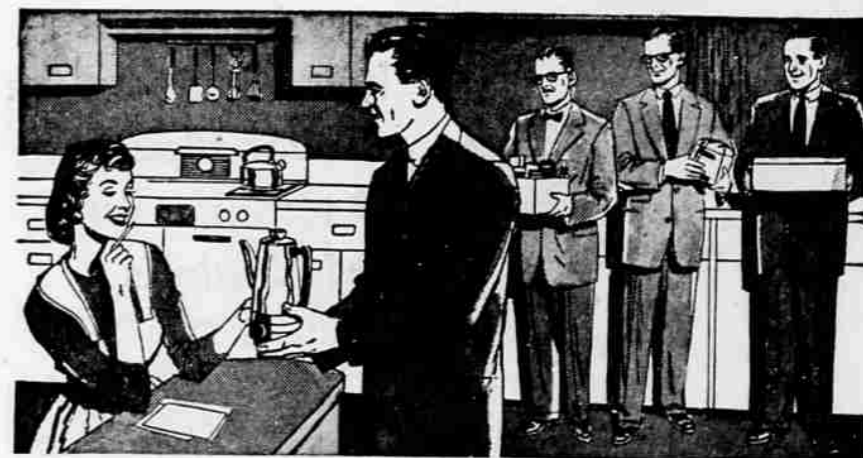


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### Nurse Elected To State Board; Meeting Planned
