WHEELS IDENTIFIED AS PART OF MISSING AMERICAN PLANE

Undercarriage Found by Tanker 370 Miles at Sea

Discovery Raises Hope for Survivors

London — (U.P.) — Two aircraft wheels found in the ocean off the southwest coast of England were identified today as part of a missing U. S. military Air Transport Service plane missing since Wednesday with 59 men aboard.

A Royal Air Force spokesman at St. Eval said the undercarriage wheels, found by a British tanker 370 miles southeast of Land's End, England, has been examined and found to be part of the missing plane.

New Hope for Survivors

"This gives new hope that there might be a dinghy or dinghies with survivors in the area," the spokesman said. "A new and more intensive search is being built around the area in which the wreckage was found."

The MATS C118 with 50 U. S. Air Force officers and men and a Navy crew of nine was last heard from Wednesday night at a point 180 miles southwest of Land's End while en route to the Azores and McGuire Air Force Base, N. J. The landing wheels were found 190 miles south of that position.

Flares Sighted
Air Force planes also were searching an area some 600 miles west of Ireland, where flares were reported sighted during the night, an announcement said. However, the flares may have originated from passing surface ships and cannot be confirmed as distress signals, it added.

Neuberger Due Here This Week For Campaign Talks

Sen. Richard Neuberger will begin southern Oregon Wednesday and Friday this week to campaign for the reelection of Sen. Wayne Morse. Both are Democrats.

Neuberger will speak at a convention at Southern Oregon college at 10 a. m. Wednesday. He will attend an SOC faculty luncheon at noon. The Young Democrats club of SOC is also sponsoring a breakfast for the senator early Wednesday morning.

He will leave Ashland Wednesday to attend a senate interior committee hearing concerning Indian matters in Klamath Falls Thursday.

Neuberger will be in Medford Friday for an all-day interior and insular affairs committee hearing regarding power and flood control development of the Rogue River basin. The hearing will be held in the federal courtroom at the Medford post-office.

The senator will speak at a no-host dinner at 6 p. m. Friday in the Medford hotel. The dinner will be open to the public. A reception will be held for Neuberger at the Esquire theater following the dinner. He will speak there on the behalf of the reelection of Morse at 8 p. m.

Friday from 3 to 5 p. m. a coffee hour will be held at the Ed Kelly residence, 906 West Fourth st., Medford, with Charles O. Porter, Democratic candidate for congress from the fourth district, and Maurine Neuberger, wife of the senator, as guests of honor. The coffee hour will be open to the public.

Mamie To Be With President On Visit To Oregon Thursday

Washington — (U.P.) — President Eisenhower today added Los Angeles to his western campaign trip which begins tomorrow.

Under the revised plan the President will speak in the Hollywood Bowl at 8:30 p. m. PST Friday.

President Eisenhower plans two speeches in Portland Thursday and his wife Mamie plans to accompany him, GOP officials said today.

The president's visit will highlight the week as candidates stepped up their pace with only 22 days left before the Nov. 6 election.

Robert T. Mautz, GOP national committee chairman, said he had been advised by the White House staff that Mrs. Eisenhower plans to come with her husband on his western trip. The president is due in Portland at 2:05 p. m. Thursday with an afternoon speech scheduled to party workers and a major televised speech in the evening, both in the auditorium. The president is scheduled to remain overnight and fly back to Washington via Denver Friday.

Morse Replies
Sen. Wayne Morse replied to an editorial in the Oregonian which compared the much publicized Al Sarena case to the Big Meadows bill involving public lands which the Democratic senator introduced. The editorial declared that Morse introduced a bill which would convey a 560-acre stand of virgin federal timber worth \$300,000 to two private citizens.

Morse avowed there was no similarity between the two cases and said he would re-introduce his Big Meadows bill in the next session of Congress.

Tennessee Senator Calls Eisenhower Administration 'Indifferent, Insensitive'

U. S. Sen. Albert Gore, Democrat of Tennessee, struck out at President Eisenhower as "indifferent" and "insensitive" to what Gore called "the most powerful temporal position in the world — the presidency of the United States."

He spoke last night to about 250 people at the Esquire theater.

The fact that there is no way to delegate presidential powers is reflected by the lack of direction and leadership of the Eisenhower administration, according to Gore. He described it as an administration in which "Sherman Adams runs the politics and Jim Haggerty and Leonard Hall are as good propagandists as Goebbels was for the Nazis." The people have a government for which they did not

"I introduced the bill on request of constituents who believe they have been wronged by the federal government. It was my clear duty to attempt to get them hearing," Morse said. "If the hearing were to show that the constituents are wrong and the government is right, I would vote against the bill," he added.

"My bill would require consideration by a Senate committee. If passed there, it would require a Senate vote. The complete sequence of House action and presidential signature would also be necessary before the bill could become law."

The Oregon senator continued "The safeguards of the public interest inherent in my bill were a far cry from those followed in the Al Sarena case. My bill was open to the clear white light of full public disclosure of all the facts."

He charged that "All Sarena — on the other hand — was handled in the dim shadows of administration action behind closed doors without public notice or cross-examination of witnesses."

Plans Speeches
Douglas McKay, Morse's opponent for the Senate seat, planned speeches in the greater Portland area and television addresses during the early part of the week. Major part of McKay's schedule for the week will be his appearance with and introduction of President Eisenhower Thursday night.

One item of particular interest on the week's schedule is a date before the Portland Women's forum Thursday noon that has Sen. Morse and McKay scheduled to appear on the same platform for the first time during the campaign.

At the same time Dulles admitted to the world he was the "daddy" of the Western backed Suez canal users association, the Democratic senator said, and he also let it be known "we didn't mean it," by admitting the U.S. would not "shoot its way through the canal."

Slash Burning Starts On Forest Land
A limited amount of slash burning on national forest land was to begin today in the Butte Falls and Union Creek districts of the Rogue River National forest, according to S. T. Moore, fire control officer.

It is the first such burning permitted this season in the forest. Rain has dampened the areas sufficiently to make it safe, and the slash areas have dried out enough to make burning possible, he said. Burning of slash will continue through the week, he said, unless it is halted by rain.

Slash burning has been permitted in a few places on state department of forestry protected land but the southwest district headquarters here has stated that more rain must fall before burning will be allowed in most localities. Permits for fires are still required.

Referring to a full page advertisement in the Mail Tribune paid for by the Jackson county Republican Central committee, he blasted the charge that the Gore bill would have put small businessmen and loggers out of business by raising the tax on truck tires 1,000 per cent, or that Democratic Sen. Wayne Morse, now seeking reelection, would have fought for such a bill.

Defends Morse
Gore declared that his bill had no such revenue provision and that it would have been unconstitutional if it had as all revenue bills must originate in the house. As a matter of fact, he said, Wayne Morse has fought to reduce taxes on gas and oil

for lumber trucks. At one time, according to Gore, the country was on the threshold of peacetime usage of atomic energy. Eisenhower "tied up" the government and turned over exclusive patents of atomic energy development to private enterprise, he said.

Atomic energy is as much a natural resource as Hells Canyon, Gore stated, which was also "given away." The bill that Eisenhower got through, he explained, would not even let the government build a demonstration atomic power plant.

No Construction
Along with the help of Morse, Gore said, an amendment was added to the bill postponing private development of atomic energy for five years. But the administration did succeed in

Tito, Hungarian Communist Boss Mapping Strategy

Nagy 'Rehabilitated' In First Hungary Move

London — (U.P.) — Yugoslav President Tito and Hungarian Communist party boss Erno Geroc met today in Belgrade in the first of a new series of Communist satellite moves expected to touch off a wave of explosive Titoism in the Soviet empire.

In Warsaw the Communist party meets this week in a determined mood to press ahead with removal of the Stalin influence—and possibly to adopt a more moderate line as result of the Poznan riot trials.

In Bucharest the Hungarian Communists prepared for the Tito meeting by "rehabilitating" former Premier Imre Nagy and frankly admitting the "personal prejudice" of former boss Matyas Rakosi, an enemy of Tito, had contributed to his downfall.

New Premier Seen
Reliable political sources in Vienna said Zoltan Szanto, former Hungarian minister to Belgrade and press chief of Nagy's cabinet, was expected to be named next premier of Hungary. Hungary's shaky economy will prevent Nagy from taking the post, the sources said.

Moscow was reported keeping a wary eye on the developments. Communist party leader Nikita Khrushchev returned from Yalta where he saw Tito and other satellite leaders. And the authoritative Communist party organ "Kommunist" today assailed dogmatic Communists who refuse to recognize peculiarities and conditions of other Communist countries.

But the Tito-Geroc meeting took precedence over other developments. Relations between the two nations have been cool since Hungary led the fight to expel Tito from the Cominform. Today's meeting was to prepare for a formal rapprochement, with emphasis on the political and economic fields.

Concessions Necessary First
Hungary apparently had to make a series of important ideological concessions before the talks could even get started—including the restoration to party favor of Nagy and Laszlo Rajk who was executed seven years ago as a Titoist.

Geroc and Tito met at Yalta earlier this month during the secret talks with the Soviet leaders. Geroc's journey to Belgrade was held to indicate that the pressure for some sort of liberalization can no longer be resisted. Tito emerged from the Yalta talks as one of the key Communist figures in Europe, and there have been instructions from Moscow to the other satellites to cooperate politically more closely with Yugoslavia.

Retailers Warned On Firearms Sales

Sheriff Howard Gault today warned retailers who handle firearms that Oregon law prohibits their sale to unnaturalized aliens.

He said a few complaints have been lodged with his office that several of the Mexican nationals who have been working in the fruit this season have purchased pistols. The law prohibits them from buying any weapon capable of concealment, and prohibits anyone from selling or providing them to non-citizens, he said. Penalties range up to five years imprisonment for violations, he declared.

He said if any violations are found, a complaint will be filed.

Passengers On Canal Cruises Identified

New York — (U.P.) — Passenger lists of the Panama Canal Company showed today that three U.S. senators, 15 House members and six members of congressional committee staffs have traveled free on the line's vessels during the past 15 1/2 months.

They took with them on trips to the Canal Zone a total of 35 dependents who paid 25 per cent of the round trip fare which is \$400.

Travelers Identified
The traveling senators were: W. Kerr Scott (D-N.C.) and William R. Laird (D-W.Va.) with his wife and 16-year-old daughter, who sailed on the S.S. Ancon from New York on Aug. 23, and Clifford P. Case (R-N.J.) who sailed with his wife and two children last Dec. 15.

The passenger lists were made available to reporters today following a week-end decision by executives of the company which is owned by the U.S. government.

Last April Denise was taking a short cut through a field near her home and came upon a sack with two dogs tied up inside — one a tiny black cocker spaniel and the other a full grown but small terrier. Yesterday Denise and a friend, Louise Fields, found a sack with a half-grown Scotch terrier inside in a field near Hedrick school.

Denise's mother, Mrs. Frances Webb Stevens, stated this morning that the dog seemed well-cared for and is trained to sit and to beg.

The Stevens and their friends are quite mystified by the two incidents. Although the Stevens have a pedigreed collie as a pet, Denise fell in love with the Scotty pup and plans to keep it if no one claims the animal.

Adolph Quesey, 17, Missing Southeast Of Klamath Falls

State's Death Toll For Season Now 13

Klamath Falls — (U.P.) — Adolph Quesey, 17, of Rogue River, deer hunter missing since Saturday night, wandered out of the woods to safety today on Ward road about 25 miles southwest of Klamath Falls.

Two deer hunters were killed in shooting accidents, another was wounded in a widespread search was underway for a fourth as a result of week end hunting mishaps in Oregon.

George W. Quarles, 24, Stanfield, was killed in Baker county Saturday when struck by a bullet fired by Jackie Ackerman, 13, Lawrence Fickett, 31, Hermiston, said he and Quarles were shot downhill at a buck and missed. Fickett said Quarles suddenly raised up and caught a bullet fired at the deer by the boy in the back of his head.

Killed by Companion
Killed when struck by a bullet fired by a hunting companion near Seapoose yesterday was Glenn Allen Burkett, 32, Portland. Coroner Ben Coleman identified the man who fired the shot as Thomas B. Golden, 41, Portland.

Golden told police that he mistook his hunting companion for a deer.

Members of the Klamath air search and rescue unit and state police renewed their efforts to locate a missing teen-age hunter in the Klamath river area today.

Adolph Quesey, 17, of Rogue River, had been missing about 25 miles southwest of Klamath Falls since Saturday. A companion, William Moore, also of Rogue River, told police he and Quesey became separated while hunting Saturday.

Lawrence L. Vockredt, 19, Milwaukie, was wounded Saturday near Redmond when struck by a ricocheting bullet while target practicing with a friend. His attending physician described the wound as "not too serious."

The death of Burkett yesterday brought the state's death toll in the hunting season to 13. Three of the deaths have been attributed to bullet wounds, however. All others have been caused by heart seizures.

A 14th person died of bullet wounds on the eve of the hunting season while planning a trip with his companions.

Sample Ballots Ready At County Courthouse
Sample ballots for the Nov. 6 general election may now be obtained in the county courthouse, elections department officials report.

A number of questions have been asked regarding item 301 on the ballot, which provides space for the write-in of a judge for the supreme court (position number one). Incumbent is William M. McAllister, who was appointed to this position following the death of Judge Earl C. Latourette. The appointment was made too late for any candidate to get his name printed on the ballot.

On Friday and Saturday, 637 absentee ballots were mailed to applicants in Jackson county voting precincts 1 through 72, officials reported.

It is estimated that an additional 363 absentee ballots will be mailed before the deadline. Applications will be accepted up to the Oct. 26 mailing deadline.
