Raiders Subdue PSC In Conference Opener

Ashland — Southern Oregon college, lagging by one touchdown after the opening quarter, struck back for two counters of its own in the second period on a chilly, nippy Saturday evening at Fuller field here to trip Portland State college 13 to 6 in the 1956 Oregon Collegiate conference inaugural for the Red Raiders of the Rogue.

There was no tabulating in the second half although Southern Oregon speared to the Viking 11-yard line in the third quarter and PSC threatened from the Raider 10 in the dying minutes of the conflict. The Raiders had one first quarter pass completed into the end zone nullified by an offside penalty.

The Raiders went to victory on a more potent rushing attack. They rolled up a net of 325 yards on the ground to Portland's 95. However, the visitors had the margin in the air 149 yards to 64.

An interception of a Bill Seymour pass by Lee Foster and a roughing-the-kicker penalty enabled the Vikings to set up for their TD. Foster carried the ball back to the Raider 41. Chuck Withers picked up four yards but the PSC club was forced to kick. The infraction against SOC put the ball on the 22. Foster lost two yards then Harvey Nefendorf pitched to Dave Starback for 24 yards and the score. The PSC conversion kick was wide.

With 10 minutes played Nefendorf threw to Scott Tiley for 35 yards to reach the Raider goal but that's where the penalty erased the score.

In the second quarter Ted Tenney and Don Koros were the packers on a drive that carried from its own 35 deep into Viking territory. A pass, Seymour threw to Dick Smith was the payoff for the TD and John Garrett booted the bonus to put the

Raiders in front 7 to 6.

Then Larry Schweinfurt intercepted a Nefendorf aerial on the Portland 30 and boomed it back to the nine. Ralph Clarno gained to the five-yard line and Andy Travis to the two. A pass failed and on fourth down Don Koros took a pitch out and tumbled right end for the six-pointer.

In the third quarter Portland State got the ball on the Raider 20 by way of penalties. The Raiders were first assessed for pass interference. This point was argued and Referee Mel Ingram stepped off 15 more yards, charging-unsportsmanlike conduct. But the SOC eleven buckled down and held. Schweinfurt got to the Viking 11 in the same game on a run from fake punt formation.

After Portland got down to the Raider 10 in the closing moments, a third down pass was dropped by Foster in the end zone. On fourth down Chuck Crandall intercepted a PSC pass in the pay area for a touchback as the game ended at that point.

Electronics Used By Four Elevens In Sunday Frays

Four of the 12 National Football League teams used electronic devices Sunday to call offensive or defensive signals and had varying degrees of success with "space cadet" tactics.

Coach Paul Brown, who started the trend by installing a receiver in quarterback George Ratterman's helmet, made little use of 19A1161—the Cleveland Brown radio station. The roar of 60,000 fans at Cleveland drowned out his signals so he alternated backbacks to call plays in a losing cause against the New York Giants.

The Detroit Lions used an electronic device for the first time to relay defensive signals to linebacker Joe Schmidt while downing the Los Angeles Rams.

The Chicago Bears used a similar system to pass defensive signals to Wayne Hansen while whipping the San Francisco Forty-Niners. The Pittsburgh Steelers had quarterback Ted Marchibroda "wired for sound" against the Philadelphia Eagles but mechanical difficulties left Ted on his own.

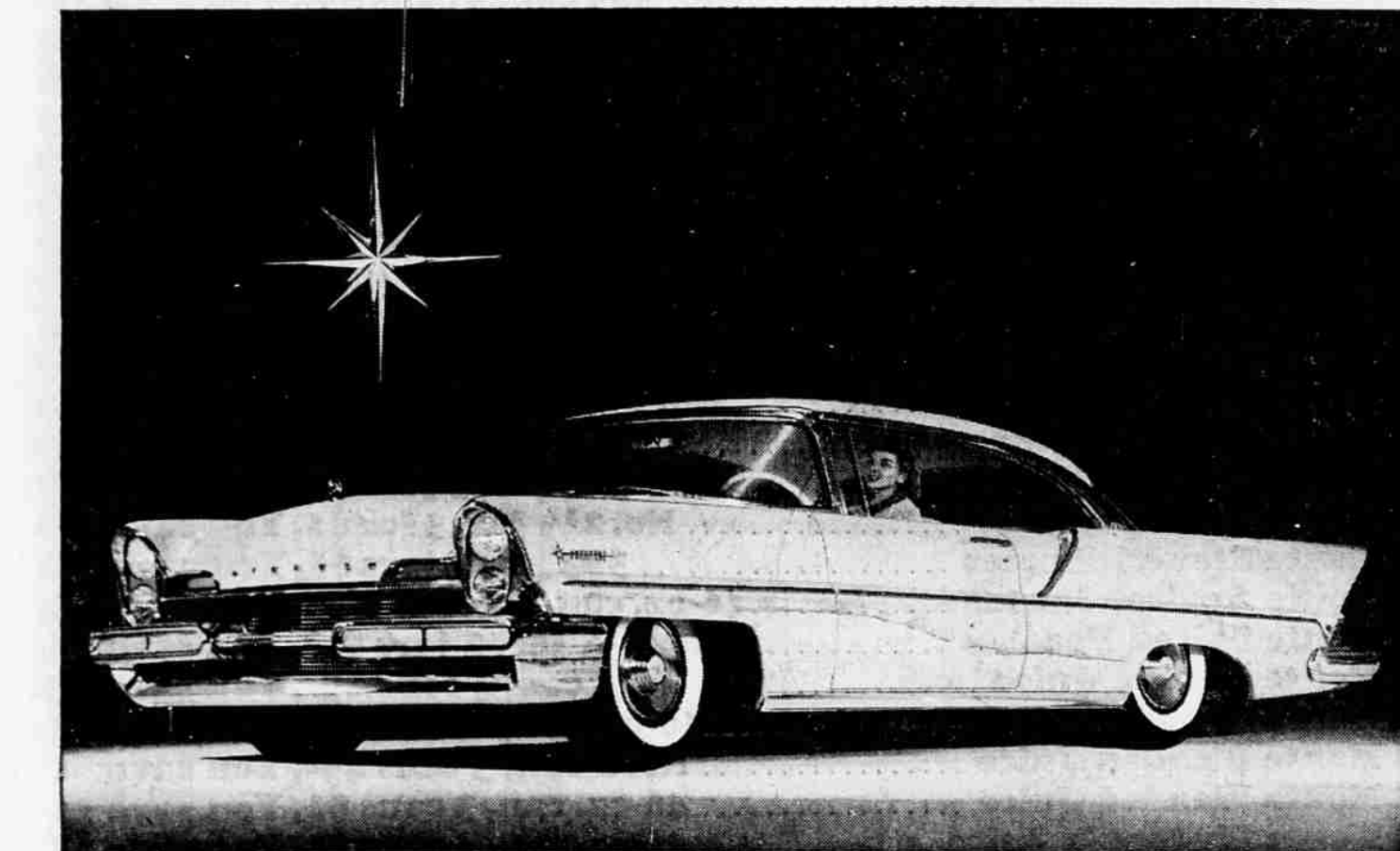
