

Democrats Protest 'Welcome Ike' Signs

Portland — UP — Democrats protested today against signs on downtown streets welcoming President Eisenhower which bear the words "Re-elect Mr. Eisenhower."

President Eisenhower is scheduled to visit Portland Thursday afternoon.

Democrats claimed the signs were put up illegally and contained campaign slogans.

Ken Hinke, county Democratic chairman, told city officials no license to erect the signs had been obtained. He said:

"We feel that all Portlanders, regardless of party, will welcome Mr. Eisenhower as the president. But we also feel that our general welcome should not be abused by political propaganda."

He said that they wanted all statements in writing.

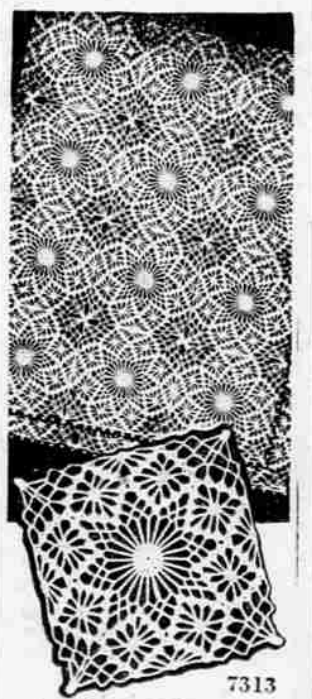
