Skiers of this area are already thinking about the forthcoming season on slats and a good number expected to go to Mt. Shasta in California or to Tomahawk hill 28 miles north of Klamath Falls for their week ends of recreation on snowy slopes rather than to Crater Lake.

Members of the Rogue Snowmen ski club here have been informed that the Alpine West corporation will have a 2,000-foot T-bar ski lift ready by Dec. 1 for use on Snowman hill at Mt. Shasta. They have been told also that Don Divens will have Tomahawk hill with a 2,000-foot slope in operation by the same time. That new slope will have a Poma lift.

Rogue Snowmen still will have their portable tows available. However, these must be laboriously set up each week end and a number of club members feel they can get in more skiing by going to the spots where tows are already in place.

**SKI SHOP TO OPEN**  
President Bill Brooks of the Rogue Snowman has announced plans to open a ski shop at 415 Oak st. about the middle of next month. He is converting a cabinet shop. Snow reports of Mt. Shasta will be available through his shop.

**700 CAPACITY**  
The new T-Bar lift at Mt. Shasta was made possible by seven businessmen of communities in that vicinity. It, of course, has the support of Mt. Shasta Ski club, representatives of which met with Rogue Snowmen concerning the tow at the Brooks home recently. The tow will have an hourly capacity of 700 skiers.

**PREP COMPETITION**  
Rogue Snowmen are to have their first meeting of the new season around the first of November. Brooks has reported that ski competition among high school students of southern Oregon and northern California is being talked.

**NO DOE SEASON YET**  
A sporting goods store has reported a deluge of hunters claiming to understand that a hunter's choice season is in effect in Jackson county. That is incorrect. There is no "doe season" at this time in this area. Only forked horn bucks may be taken through Oct. 21 in southwestern Oregon. However, there will be a Rogue Valley area either sex deer season Nov. 24 through Dec. 2. Nimrods who will inspect their pocket copies of the Synopsis of Oregon Hunting Regulations (available at almost all sporting goods stores) will see

the area designated in bright blue on the map.

The synopsis also describes the open area:

"Beginning at Bybee bridge; thence south along the Table Rock road; to Medford; thence southwesterly along State Highway 238 to the Applegate river at Applegate; thence northwesterly down the Applegate river to the Rogue river; thence northwesterly down the Rogue river to Robertson bridge (13 miles west of Grants Pass); thence easterly two miles; thence easterly along a line parallel to and two miles from the Rogue river to the Table Rock road; thence along Table Rock road a distance of two miles to Bybee bridge.

Bag limit is one deer for hunters possessing unused deer tags.

## Commission Explains Dead Fish Appearing in Klamath

Reports of dead fish appearing in the Klamath river late in September have been confirmed and explained by the Oregon state game commission, it was reported this week.

Some reports indicated that "thousands" of fish were killed due to lack of oxygen in the water on Sept. 22, after the flow of water down the river from Keno dam was decreased.

Col. Paul H. Weiland, Medford, a state director of the local Isaak Walton league, wrote the state game commission asking for added information, and last week received a reply from the commission.

The flow was cut off through the joint action of the game commission, the state engineer's office, and the California Oregon Power company, in an effort to determine the optimum minimum flow for the river, the letter said. The tests were made in connection with Cope's application to build a new hydroelectric project at Big Bend, below Keno.

The game commission reported that its recommendations and those of Cope as to the necessary flow to maintain fish life did not agree. The state engineer has the responsibility for making the final decision.

**Fish Loss Sudden**  
The letter said, "The flow at Keno was reduced gradually, starting about 7 a.m. Sept. 22, until a minimum of 27 cubic feet per second was reached. It was found necessary for observation purposes in the canyon below the Big Bend dam site to maintain this restricted flow until 1 p.m. Sept. 23.

"The fish loss occurred suddenly in running water and, to a limited extent only, in potholes. Our fishery agent investigated the loss and determined that in the restricted flow from Keno to Spencer creek, fish died from lack of oxygen caused very largely by the decomposition of

## DEFENSE POLISHED

Los Angeles—(U.P.)—Coach Jess Hill emphasized pass defense Tuesday as the University of Southern California polished its defense for the Washington game.

New York—(U.P.)—Oklahoma's mighty football Sooners are making a record runaway for the major college total offense title.

In the three games they have played so far, the Sooners have averaged 49 points and 477 yards, 406.3 yards by rushing alone, according to statistics released today by the NCAA Service bureau.

No team is close to Oklahoma in any of those figures but the ones in the runnerup spots are Tennessee, with a 39.7 scoring rate, Texas Christian, with a 44.7 yard total offense average, and Ohio State, with a 33.3 ground attack average.

The Sooners are far in front in every phase of offense except forward passing, a technique they seldom employ and appar-
