### Prosperous Switzerland Offers Many Attractions

Washington—Switzerland offers the visitor more than mountains, yodels, cuckoo clocks, and watches. One of the many Swiss surprises has been learning that fleets of steamers serve this rugged, landlocked nation. "True, they are fresh-water steamers plying the Lakes of Geneva, Geneva, and Lugano," says the traveling wife-husband team, Jean and Franc Shor. "But they carry as many as 1,500 passengers and form an important link between Switzerland and her neighbors." **Speak Four Tongues** Less than half the area of Maine, Switzerland is home to nearly 5,000,000 people who speak four languages—German, French, Italian, and Romanish. They stand as one, however, in defense of their country. "Switzerland does not have an army," a Swiss major snapped in answer to a query about how many troops are in training. "Switzerland is an army. . . If an invader should strike tomorrow, we would be ready. Practically every important bridge in the country is mined, ready to be blown up at a minute's notice. All important factories have reserve stocks of vital materials. Every family has reserves of food. Most important, every able-bodied man has a gun he knows how to use."

### Kefauver Speaks Against Alleged Broken Promises

St. Louis, Mo. — (U.P.) — Sen. Estes Kefauver flew into Missouri today to campaign against President Eisenhower's "broken promises" to farmers, laborers, housewives and small businessmen. The Tennessee Democrat resumed his cross country campaign after delivering his first national wide telecast — a bitter blast at "corruption" in the Eisenhower administration. **Many Said Involved** Kefauver charged from New York Tuesday night that more government officials have been "involved in corruption" under Mr. Eisenhower than in any administration since the Republicans under Gen. U. S. Grant after the Civil War. Kefauver told his television viewers that Mr. Eisenhower must accept the personal responsibility for the broken promises he has made and for the "misconduct" of his top officials. Kefauver flew into St. Louis early this morning and scheduled a news conference. He also planned speeches in St. Joseph and Springfield, Mo. **Used Filmed Statements** In his television broadcast, Kefauver used filmed statements by Mr. Eisenhower that the President has broken his promises, particularly those made during the 1952 campaign. "In 1952 and ever since," Kefauver said, "Mr. Eisenhower has promised everything to everybody. "But he has given everything to the privileged few," he said.
