

Morse, McKay Get Influential Assists; Nixon Slated in Medford on October 26

Oregon's political pot boiled furiously today with only 20 vote hunting days left before election.

Aside from the forthcoming visit of President Eisenhower to Portland tomorrow, the Oregon voter's attention was focused mainly on the Senate race between Sen. Wayne Morse and his Republican opponent, Douglas McKay.

And the campaigning there isn't left to the candidates alone. Both men draw assists from influential supporters in their bids for a Senate seat.

Meanwhile, it was announced in Washington, D.C. that Vice President Richard Nixon would visit Oregon again next week. Nixon is scheduled to fly to Medford from Walla Walla on Friday, Oct. 26, and then go on to California.

Ex-Coach Helps McKay
Sen. Morse was joined yesterday by Sen. Richard Neuberger who worked the southern

reaches of the state.

McKay got help from Mrs. Paul Patterson, wife of the late Oregon governor, in a radio address last night and the announced formation of a Roseburg Democrats and Independents for McKay organization with a former University of Oregon football coach as one of its leaders.

Jim Aiken, former football mentor at Oregon, and Joan Knudtson were named as co-chairman of the Roseburg organization. Both are registered Democrats.

McKay, joined by Oregon Republican national committee man Bob Mautz, told a Portland television audience last night that the Eisenhower program has given the people the "two things they wanted most—peace and lower taxes."

McKay said "the way to cut taxes is to cut the cost of government."

Big Tax Cut Cited
"As a result of the economies

effected by the Eisenhower budget, the people of this country in 1954 received the biggest tax cut in history—a \$7,400,000 cut," McKay said. "And 62 per cent of that cut went to individuals," he added.

Neuberger centered his attacks on the Republicans in two fields yesterday. Speaking at Grants Pass last night he said "A political philosophy that subordinates animals and birds to oil derricks on wildlife refuges threatens the pattern of outdoor values which are the basis of Oregon's tourist recreation business."

"During a two-year period when a stop-order against oil leases in wildlife refuges supposedly was in effect, the Interior Department under McKay issued 60 oil drilling permits," Neuberger said. "While this fictional ban was on the books, McKay's department issued five times as many leases as in all previous history of the Mineral Leasing Act of 1920," the junior senator continued.

Morse Visits OSC
Morse today visited the Oregon State College campus at Corvallis.

Robert Holmes, Democratic candidate for governor, carried his campaign to Roseburg last night. He reiterated his opposition to a sales tax and the construction of Pelton dam and told a Democratic rally that he assured them he would support cheap hydro-power.

He charged that his opponent, Gov. Elmo Smith, "in the past few days has espoused causes which for years have made him unhappy and against which he has worked to his full capacity. I am sure Elmo Smith is confused. I am certain his private power backers must be utterly confounded," Holmes said.

State Said Progressive
Gov. Smith, in a non-partisan address at West Linn, told the Clackamas county President's council yesterday that Oregon is one of the most progressive states in the nation and a leader

Dorothea H. Beethe Files Court Suit

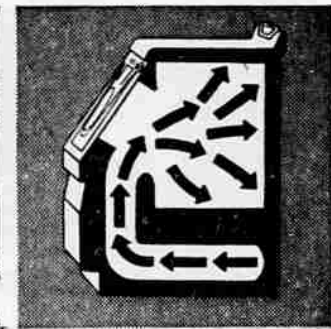

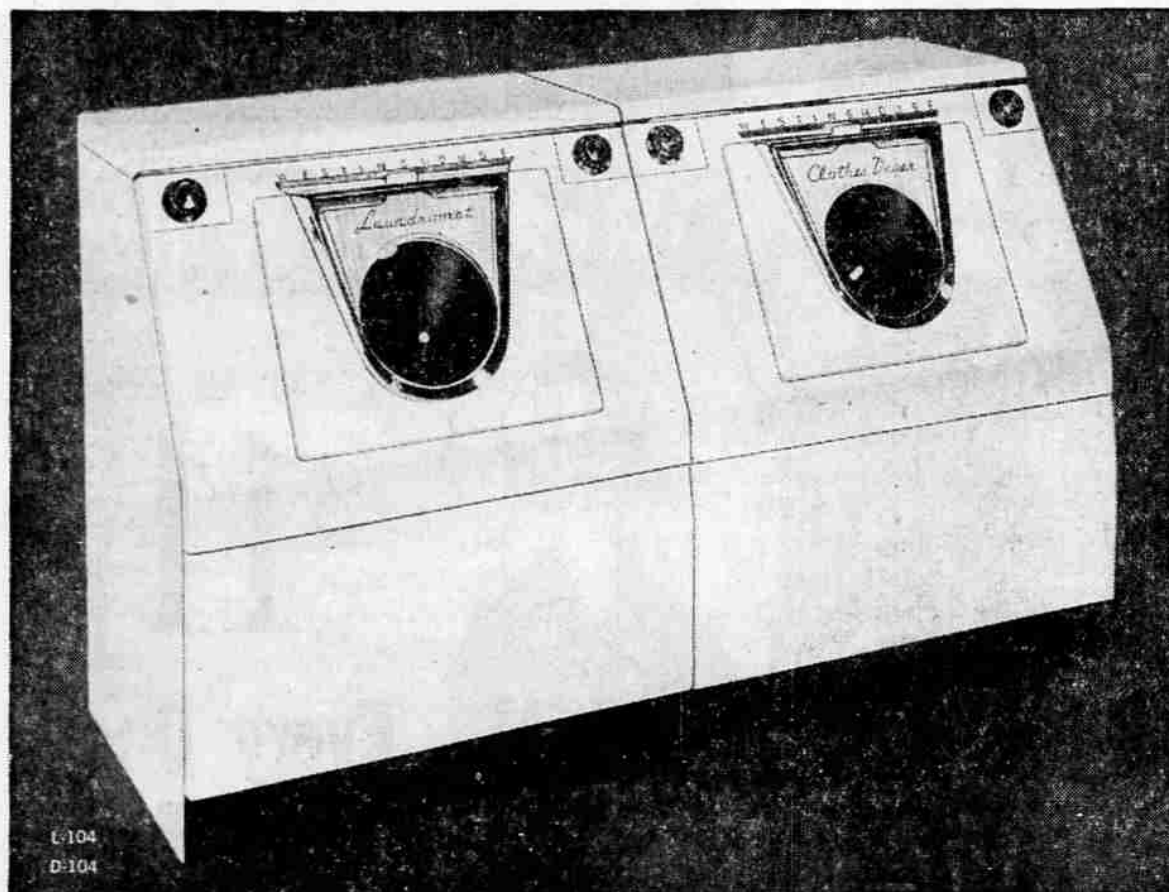
