

### NAIA Pass Tossers Led By Seymour

Ashtland—When the Southern Oregon college Red Raiders play Oregon Technical institute's football gang at Klamath Falls on Saturday, their attack will be spearheaded by the top passer among schools in the National Association of Intercollegiate athletics.

Reports from Kansas City, Mo., show that quarterback Bill Seymour of the Red Raiders has the best pass completion record in the NAIA. He has thrown 82 times with 33 being gathered in by receivers. His tosses have gained 421 yards for the SOC eleven, 140 per game.

The Oregon Collegiate conference has been shifted to 2 p.m. Saturday. It will be OTI's homecoming. The fray was previously set up for night contention.

The action will match two clubs which play about the same brand of ball. Both like to pass a lot. OTI is said to have faster backs than do the Raiders and it is felt to be a strong team since four players recently were dropped.

A number of SOC players have been taking it easy on contact work this week in order to be in shape for the Owl engagement. There are no serious hurts reported but quite a few bumps and bruises are being nursed.

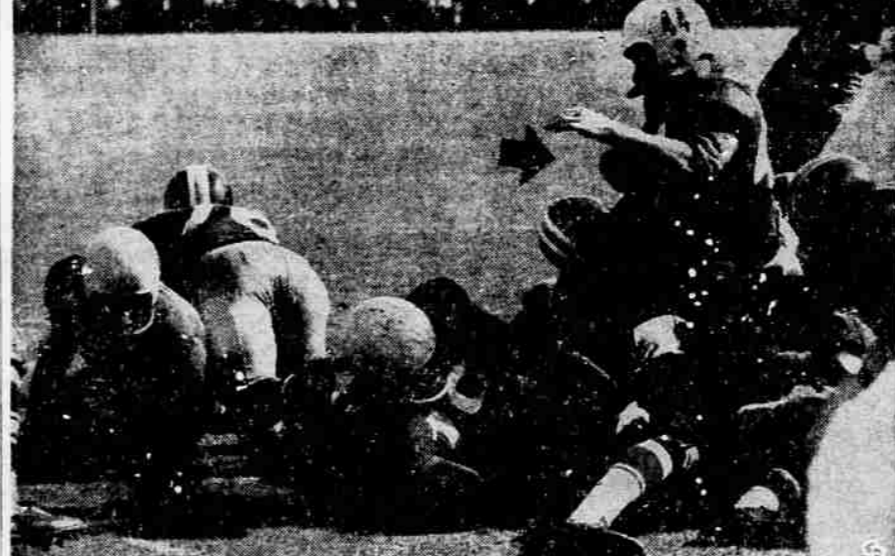
In the vanguard were seniors Jack Scrivens and Wendell Walmsley, guards, and Gene Kutsch, forward, along with junior forwards Jim O'Donnell and Art Chapman and guard Larry Larsen. Also answering the first call was George Hinkhouse, guard, who has not seen action since his freshman season three years ago when his career was interrupted by an eye injury requiring serious surgery.

Up from last year's unbeaten freshman team are nine sophomore candidates anxious to nail down varsity positions, including John Westermann, 6' 8" center; Larry Walsh, Art Bull, Elmer Broedel and Dick Jolley, forwards, and Wally Panel, Jim Armstrong, Harvey Jones and Frank Weber, guards.

New Pilot hopefuls are Bill Zapp, forward, from Clark college, and freshmen John McCormick of The Dalles, Joe Etzel from Central Catholic in Portland, and Tom Moore from Lakeview.

### Tornado Grid Contingent Heads For Friday Scuffle at Eureka

A contingent of Medford high school grid d'ers, 36 players strong, were to leave by bus this afternoon for the coast of Northern California. The Black Tornado will oppose the Eureka Loggers in the Humboldt county city on Friday night.

A 20 to 14 verdict here last season got Medford back on the win trail after losses three years in a row to the traditional California rival. The Tornado will try to take it from there and add to the impressive record over the years against the Loggers. In the longtime rivalry Medford has 18 victories, Eureka six and one game has been a tie.

Both clubs will have scores to settle in the fracas. Last year the Tornado broke a win skein at 16 straight for the Californians and darkened the record of a club recognized as one of Eureka's best in years. The Medford nod was turned about for 1954 when a high rated undefeated Tornado club was smeared 12 to 7 in the mud by the Loggers at Arcata, Calif.

**Tornado Most Impressive**  
This year the Black Tornado will go on the field with the most impressive record, having five wins by one-sided scores, a tie with the state's No. 1 team and no losses suffered. Eureka has two victories, two losses and a tie so far. The Loggers beat Shasta of Redding, Calif., 19 to 18, Del Norte of Crescent City, Calif., 20 to 13, knotted Fortuna 6 to 6 and dropped decisions to Arcata 18 to 7 and to the Eureka alumni 14 to 0.

Three regulars of Eureka's strong 1955 club are back among 15 lettermen. They are Errol Scott, 195-pound fullback, Ron Moore, 180-pound guard and Jim Zigienbein, 170-pound all-conference end.

Eureka offense is of the wide open type with spread plays

from the T. The Loggers pass a lot, power Scott up the middle and sweep the ends on pichouts.

Coach Fred Spiegelberg probably will go with his usual Tornado starting crews. On offense it will likely be Dick Cople and Mike Stearns, ends, Neil Plumley and Larry Cranston, tackles, Bob Apple and Tom Merton, guards, Dick Swinney, center, Dick McLaughlin, quarterback, Gordon Owsley or Gary Riley, left halfback, Eldon Francis, right halfback, and Loren Christean, fullback.

Defensively the eleven may be Cople and Stearns or Tom Hamlin, ends, Cranston and Plumley, tackles, Apple, middle guard, Jim Funston, Merton and McLaughlin, linebackers, and Francis, Owsley and Riley, halfbacks.

Those who may be in the opening crew on offense for coach Dick Renfro's Loggers are LeRoy McFarland and Jim Ziegenbein, ends, Lou Grossi and Bill Nichols, tackles, Tom McGilivray and Ron Moore, guards, Fred Lindblade, or Doug Kane, center, Denny Guintini, quarterback, Larry Sullivan, left half, Jerry Olsen, right half, and Errol Scott, fullback.

**Heavy Tackles**  
Stan Krupka, 220, and Tom Lee, 200, are tackles in the Eureka line-up on defense.

Medford will present the heavier offensive line-up with an average of 185 pounds per man but may face a defensive line almost its weight, around 183½. But the attacking line of Eureka, averaging around 176½ pounds, could be up against a Tornado forward wall of 195 pounds or better average.

The Black Tornado so far this season has piled up 1918 yards from scrimmage to 1489 by opponents, averages of 319.8 to 248.1. It has gained 1498 rushing and 420 passing to rivals' 1020

### Ducks Base Hopes on Defensive Record; Beavers Prep for WSC

Eugene, Ore.—(UP)—The University of Oregon Ducks are counting on their good defensive record to offset the throwing arm of Stanford's John Brodie when the two teams tangle at Hayward Field here Saturday.

"I notice we still lead the conference on pass defense and are one of three teams in the loop which has not given up a touchdown yet this season to a passer," Coach Len Casanova said. "If we still are in the same situation after playing Stanford, I know we will have done an excellent job of pass defense and probably will have won a ball game."

Corvallis, Ore.—(UP)—Coan Tommy Prothro stressed pass defense Wednesday as his Oregon State Beavers prepared for Saturday's game with the Cougars of Washington State.

The Beavers haven't been able to defeat the Cougars in Pullman since 1946, although they scored wins against Washington State in Corvallis in 1949 and 1953.

### Conditions Good For Steelhead Angling in Rogue

Portland—(UP)—The weekly report on fishing conditions prepared by the State Game Commission:

**SOUTHWEST:** Continued low stream flows are largely responsible for lack of activity throughout most of the upper Umpqua areas. A goodly number of silver salmon are present throughout the length of the main river, but a few fish are being caught.

Salmon angling in the lower Umpqua river is fair to good in the Mill creek to Sawyers Rapids area. Angling is generally slow in Gardiner area. Salmon fishing in Coquille river is fair.

Rogue river is in excellent condition for steelhead fishing from Gold Hill to Galice. Good catches are being made in the Grants Pass to Robertson bridge section with the use of single eggs.
