

Full Slate This Week In OCC, NWL

A full slate of league action is on the weekend schedule for Oregon's two small-college conferences Saturday, four league members from each loop engaging in counters.

Topping the Oregon Collegiate Conference slate is the Portland State-Oregon College game in Portland. Portland State has a counting record of 1-1 while OCE has dropped its lone conference game.

Southern Oregon, with a clear record after one conference start, meets Oregon Tech, loser of both its league tilts thus far. CI vs Willamette.

College of Idaho and Willamette, each winner of one league game and loser of one, provide the key Northwest conference struggle. Both teams beat Pacific and lost to Lewis and Clark.

Linfield and Whitman, the Wildcats loser of their lone conference game thus far and Whitman making its league debut, meet at Walla Walla.

Eastern Oregon and Pacific battle at Forest Grove in an inter-league fray while Lewis and Clark, unbeaten this year in four starts, invades the home of Chico State for its Saturday opposition.

CRATER, ASHLANDERS TANGLE THIS EVENING

Ashland — Southern Oregon conference football activity is at a minimum tonight and Crater and Ashland High schools will provide that minimum. They clash at 8 p.m. on the Ashland turf.

It will be the continuation of a rivalry which has been intense in recent years but the first meeting with both classed as A-1 schools.

Crater will be out to repeat its 1955 win—its first in a number of close contests—and is favored. But the Comets will meet a rejuvenated Grizzly team.

After some experimenting early in the season, Coach Al Simpson has the Ashlanders operating from tight T formation and the Grizzlies loom stronger for it. While the T is tight, basically, Ashland still spreads its ends and flanks its backs in attempt to make its passing click. That gives the Grizzlies an attack that will have the Comets wary on defense.

Crater Split T
Crater uses the split T and

mixes the running principally of George Juveland and Don Goyette with the passing of Wayne Allen.

An Ashland objective this week has been to recover from the fumbling which contributed heavily to its loss to Grants Pass last Friday. Pass defense is also getting attention since that is a Comet threat and was also paved the way for Grants Pass touchdowns.

Both teams will be going for their first victory in the conference and District 6 A-1.

Outside of Tenney, the Raiders should be at full strength. Other possible starters are Larry Schweinfurt and Norm Hedgepeth, ends, Jim Bird and Herb Colley, tackles, John Garrett and Chuck Romine, guards, Bill Stewart, center, Bill Seymour, quarterback, Chuck Cranfall, right, half, and Don Kornis, fullback.

Further spirited rivalry is anticipated on Saturday. SOC has

Oregon State's football team flies to Spokane today and a Saturday game against Washington Saturday at Pullman. It was a confident Beaver aggregation awaiting the flight, determined to end a dubious 10-year record of not winning in the Inland Empire city.

On the other hand it was not quite so cheerful a crew that stayed home at Eugene and awaited the invasion of Stanford, the University of Oregon's Saturday foe.

The Ducks top two quarterbacks, Tom and Jack Crabtree were in bed with bad colds. Team physician Dr. George Guldager ordered the pair of signal callers to bed yesterday after both showed up with high temperatures and sore throats. Both will miss workouts today but may be able to play Saturday.

Pass Defense
Coach Tommy Prothro has been working his squad hard all week on pass defense formations designed to halt the Cougar aerial game which ranks as No. 1 in the nation. Quarterbacks Bunny Aldrich and Bob Newman will be used by Coach Jim Sutherland to keep the Oregon State defense loose.

Joey Picked Over Turner

New York — (U.P.) — Handsome Joey Giambra, sparkling middleweight contender of Buffalo, N.Y., is favored at 14-5 to beat "reborn" Gil Turner of Philadelphia tonight when boxing returns to Madison Square Garden after a six-week absence.

Their action-assured 10-rounder will be televised and broadcast nationally over NBC networks at 10 p.m. (EDT).

Black-haired Giambra, a lithe, fast counter puncher, seeks his fifth straight victory and a higher rating among contenders than his present number 10. Approaching his peak at 25, he is eager to shoot for the title.

Twenty-six-year-old Turner, former welterweight challenger and formerly high ranking middleweight aspirant, seeks to break his losing streak at three straight. Close friends say he may do it because he's been "reborn" by patching up troubles with his wife.

Avery Brundage Raps Lowering Sports Standard

New York — (U.P.) — Avery Brundage, the controversial international Olympic president, today criticized the "lowering of moral athletic standards" in this country and urged "something be done about it immediately."

Just back from Switzerland, the 69-year-old Brundage told a group at the Overseas Press club that other nations question the amateur status of U.S. athletes as much as they do Russia's "and perhaps even more so."

"It's a sad state," he said, "when a boy believes he has to be paid for playing a game. I believe crooked boxing matches, basketball scandals and surreptitious payments to athletes under the table is an indication of a lowering of moral athletic standards in this country and something should be done about it immediately."

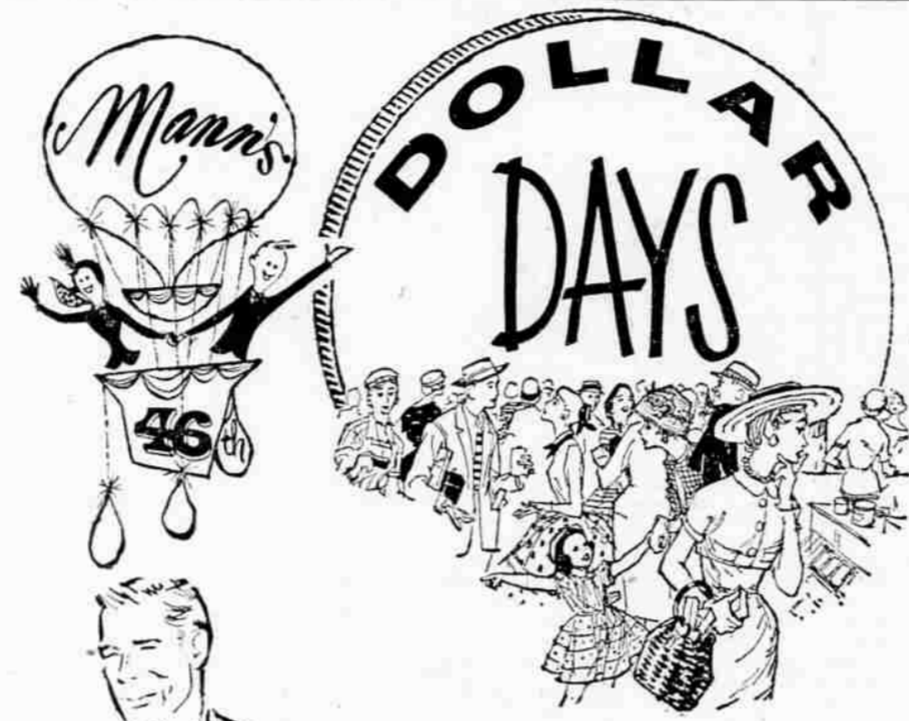

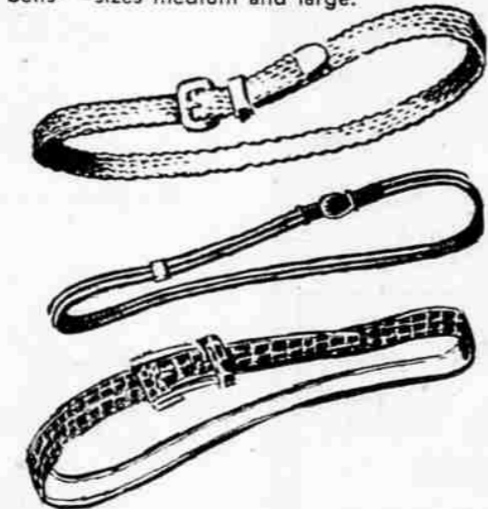
