## Port Orford Youth Slain by Companion

Roseburg, Ore. (U.P.)—A 13-year old Port Orford youth was wounded fatally here yesterday when a .22 calibre rifle in the hands of a companion on a rabbit hunt was accidentally triggered by a twig.

Coroner L. L. Powers identified the victim as Jimmy Allen McDaniel, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Mervin McDaniel, of Port Orford.

Police said the youth had gone rabbit hunting with two companions, Larry Rumbach and Gary Rose, both of Roseburg. McDaniel did not have a gun and was walking a short distance ahead of the other two when suddenly Rose's rifle caught on a twig and fired.

The bullet entered the McDaniel boy's chest. He died a short time later in a Roseburg hospital.

## Multnomah Trials Seen After Election

Portland (U.P.)—It appeared certain today that none of the persons indicted by the vice-probing Multnomah county grand jury would go on trial until after the general election next month.

Motions filed by Multnomah county District Attorney William M. Langley charging that campaign material used in the Voters pamphlet in behalf of Attorney General Robert G. Thornton was prejudicial to him has evidently upset the schedule that had called for the first trials to get under way today.

Fred Jensen, attorney for several policemen indicted by the jury, said Saturday there was "no chance" the trials would begin before November.

## Experts To Report On Atomic Radiation

United Nations, N.Y.—(U.P.)—Experts from 15 countries meet today to prepare a report on human hazards of atomic radiation to be submitted to the United Nations General Assembly next month.

Emphasis will be placed in their discussions—which will be held in private—of the danger to humans from radioactive fallout from hydrogen and atomic bomb explosions.

Added interest was given to their discussions by Democratic presidential candidate Adlai E. Stevenson's demand for an end to hydrogen bomb tests—a goal long sought by India and Japan, in particular—and supported in varying degrees by many countries.

## Britain Sets Off Last Atomic Test in Series

Melbourne, Australia (U.P.)—Britain exploded the fourth and last atomic weapon of the desert wastes of Western Australia before daylight early today.

Sir William Penney, chief British atomic scientist, and members of his team were expected to fly home within the next few days with data to be analyzed during the next few months.

## Western Europe Fails In Atomic Agreement

Paris (U.P.)—Western Europe once more has failed to reach agreement on an atomic energy pool and common market.

The foreign ministers of six countries wound up two days of discussion with a short communique Sunday saying "agreement had been reached on some points but that on other points they had failed to find a solution to outstanding differences."

## Road Death Record May Prompt Action

Chicago (U.P.)—The enormity of the record-breaking traffic toll being piled up by the nation this year may "shock the American people into drastic action" to reduce it, the president of the National Safety Council said today.

Ned H. Dearborn, in a speech before the council, revealed that unless an effective plan of reducing highway fatalities was achieved soon, the traffic toll will reach all-time high of more than 41,000 deaths this year.

The council's annual meeting opened the 44th national safety congress which is being attended by nearly 12,000 safety leaders.
