

Hank Aaron Leads Balloting on UP National League All-Star Team; Four Redlegs Named

New York—UP—Four players from the Cincinnati Redlegs, two each from the Brooklyn Dodgers, Milwaukee Braves and St. Louis Cardinals, and one from the New York Giants were named today to the annual United Press National League All-Star team.

The honor squad, selected by 61 sports writers from the various league cities, is one of the most powerful ever to be named. The hitters batted in a total of 751 runs this past season and drilled a total of 228 homers.

Hank Aaron, the National League batting king from Milwaukee with a .328 average, led the balloting with a total of 58 out of 61 votes. Another outfielder, Duke Snider of Brooklyn, was next with 49 votes and catcher Ed Bailey from Cincinnati ranked third with 48.

Name Utility Star
Because of unusual circumstances, the United Press for the first time selected a utility all-star, Stan Musial of the Cardinals. Musial received a total of 18 outfield and 16 first base votes.

This combined total would have put him ahead of rookie Frank Robinson of Cincinnati, who had 29, and first baseman Ted Kluszewski of Cincinnati, who had 23. Since Musial played both positions, he was designated as a utility member of the team.

Red Schoendienst, veteran second baseman for the New York Giants, who has been a perennial member of the team, was selected for that spot with 31 votes, while Roy McMillan of Cincinnati was named at shortstop with 30 and Ken Boyer of St. Louis at third with a total of 44 votes.

The pitchers were Don Newcombe of Brooklyn, who had 47 votes, and Warren Spahn of Milwaukee, who totaled 38.

There was a big turnover from last year's All-Star team. Only Snider, Kluszewski, Schoendienst, Musial and Newcombe were repeaters.

Musial RBI Leader
Musial was the leader of the squad in runs batted in with 109

and Snider set the homer pace with 43. There were six 300-plus hitters led by Aaron's .328. Musial was at .310, Boyer .306, Kluszewski and Schoendienst .302, and Bailey .300 even. Snider his .290 and Robinson .292, leaving only McMillan as a batting "weakling" but his .263

average was more than offset by his spectacular fielding. Besides Musial, both Kluszewski and Snider topped the 100 RBI mark, Klu with 102 and Duke with 101. Boyer just missed with 98 and Aaron had 93.

Newcombe with a 27-7 won-loss record was the biggest vic-

tory man in the majors and Spahn with a 20-11 mark recorded his seventh season at 20 or more victories.

There was only one close race for a position. That was at shortstop, where McMillan beat Ernie Banks of the Cubs by four votes.

College Football Career of Jon Arnett Ends Saturday; Ranks 3rd in USC Play

San Francisco—UP—A brilliant college football career will be abruptly snuffed out late next Saturday afternoon when the final game ends Jon Arnett's playing days for Southern California.

The All-American halfback, who now ranks third among the school's all-time ground gainers, was among numerous gridirons made ineligible as the result of last summer's West Coast gridiron investigation.

Later, the Pacific Coast Conference brass relented and allowed seniors who had been trapped in the upheaval to play any five games in a row.

End Of Line
Arnett became a "first fiver" for Coach Jess Hill and reaches the end of the line Saturday against Stanford. There will be no Jon Arnett around to carry the mail when the Trojans go up against such traditional opponents as UCLA and Notre Dame.

He made his final appearance in the Los Angeles Coliseum last Saturday where a crowd of 44,749 gave him a standing ovation after he ended the day with 157 yards gained against Washington.

That brought his 25-game rushing total to 1,781 yards and he edged ahead of Morley Drury, "the noblest Trojan of them all" for third spot among the school's all-time ground gainers. Orville Mohler tops the select list with 2028, or 247 more than Arnett now has. Jon is only 108 away from Gus Shaver, who is second with 1889.

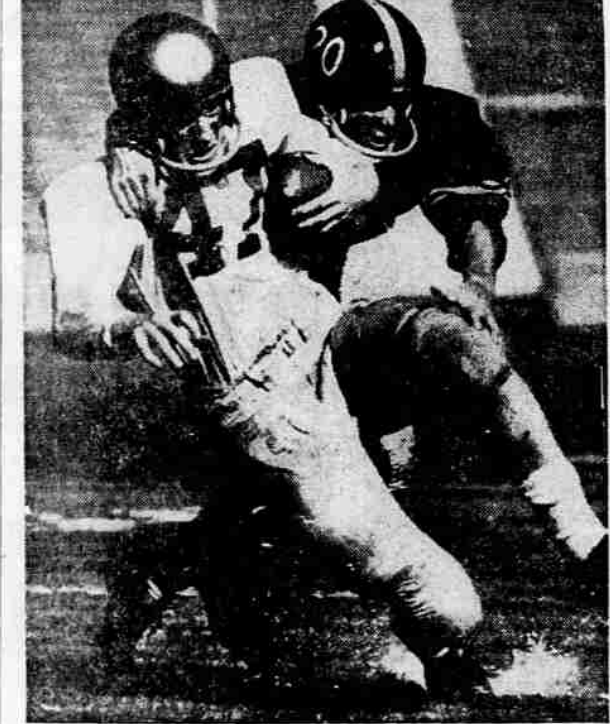
And so "give the ball to Arnett" may be the order of the day when the angry Trojans seek to humiliate a Stanford foe which not only upset them last fall but which voted for strict enforcement of the rules when Southern California walked the carpet.

Yet it is only by a change of heart that Arnett is playing at all. When the probe was at its peak last July, he indicated he might drop out of school and even said he would advise high school prospects to steer clear

of the Pacific Conference. But he stayed on and next Saturday could be his greatest.

The Southern California-Stanford game is the top one of the day along the Pacific slope. In

others, UCLA is at Oregon State, California at Washington, Oregon at Pittsburg, Washington State at College of the Pacific, San Jose State at Arizona Tempe State and Idaho at Utah.

Newcombe Hopes Arm Recovers In Order to Redeem Self to Japanese

Tokyo — (UP) — Brooklyn Dodger pitcher Don Newcombe said today he hopes his ailing right arm which plagued him during the World Series would recover so he could redeem himself with Japanese fans before he returns home.

Newcombe disclosed that he injured his right elbow in the last game of the regular season against the Pittsburgh Pirates. He was knocked out of the box twice during the series and again in Hawaii and in Japan on the Dodgers' current exhibition tour.

No Treatment
Newcombe told United Press in a telephone interview from Sapporo, Hokkaido, northernmost Japan, he was not leaving for the United States for treatment.

"I am leaving it up to the trainer to see what he can do for me," Newcombe said. "I've had arm trouble a couple of times before."

An over capacity crowd of 45,000 turned out last Sunday at Tokyo's Korakuen Stadium to see the National League 27-game winner start against an all-Japan team. They were shocked when Newcombe was knocked out in the first inning without getting a man out. He walked the first man and then allowed four consecutive hits, one of them a two-run homer.

Leo Harris Defends UO Grid Staff 2 Qualifiers Lead Field

Eugene—UP—Athletic Director Leo Harris today defended the University of Oregon football coaching staff following the effigy hanging of head coach Len Casanova.

Harris said "we couldn't have beaten Stanford last Saturday if we had a coaching panel composed of Oklahoma's Bud Wilkinson, Michigan's Bennie Oosterbaan and Georgia Tech's Bobby Dodd."

An effigy of Casanova was found hanging on a tree early yesterday and was cut down by Eugene police before most students arrived for classes, Oregon lost to Stanford 21-7 last Saturday for its third straight defeat.

"I know of no place to go in the United States to find better coaches than we have today," Harris said.
