

# Orange Bowl To Pay For Poor Teams

Miami — (U.P.) — There was a time when \$440,000 would buy a whole of a football bowl game, but the Orange Bowl Committee realized today it would be paying that much next Jan. 1 for two low-rated teams. The New Year's game will be the "off year" under the Orange Bowl's tieup with the Atlantic Coast and Big seven conferences. And it may turn into such an "off year" as to spell an end to the pact when it expires after the 1958 game.

Under Big Seven rules, Oklahoma, the perennial conference champ, cannot return to Miami two years in a row. The Sooners beat Maryland in last year's Orange tussle. That means the Big Seven will furnish its second-rated team and, by national standards, that outfit may even be third rate.

The ACC still will send its champion, but its teams have had great fun so far this season losing to each other and particularly to teams outside their conference.

Van C. Kussrow, past president of the Orange Bowl Committee who lined up the original Big Seven-ACC pact two years ago, commented, "It's just as well Oklahoma can't come back next January; we wouldn't have anyone to match them."

Colorado Springs was chosen as the site for the world championships, held in this country for the first time in 25 years. The east sectional championships were slated for Hershey, Pa., with Midwest sectional championships awarded to Sioux City, Iowa.

## Hazardous Jobs Said Usually Safer

Chicago — (U.P.) — "Hazardous jobs usually are safer than routine ones," a safety supervisor for the Northwestern Bell Telephone Co. told the 44th National Safety Congress today.

Glen Latschaw, Minneapolis, said the "large majority of serious or fatal injuries occur on everyday, routine jobs and mostly are caused by supervisory countenance of . . . so-called minor wrong habits."

Latschaw said minor bad habits of an individual can be corrected by observing his or her work operation during the progress of a job, thus providing for the worker's safety.

he drifted into a job of mucking in the Tiger-Poorman mine. Orchard joined the Western Federation of Miners' local. Thus he entered a war that had been raging since 1891 between the Federation and the Rocky Mountain Mine Owners Protective association.

Holbrook begins the history of his war on Page 31 of his 318-page book. He sets a vast stage of tragedy, in depth to the organization of the first union of hard-rock miners, year of 1863, and projecting the birth of the Industrial Workers of the World from the revolutionary elements in the Western Federation of Miners.

It was all hell, for it was all war. Orchard, Federation dynamiter, typified one side of it. Charlie Siringo, spy and gunman for the association, was another breed of hellion. In the end, William Edgar Borah and Clarence Darrow were opposing champions of the war. The Orchards and the Siringos only did the killings.

The crimes of Harry Orchard in the Rocky Mountains were concluded with the dynamiting of ex-Governor Frank Steunenberg at Caldwell, Idaho, after midnight on December 30, 1905. Orchard confessed, and thus was spared the rope. He died in Boise prison April 13, 1954. And now lives again in Stewart Holbrook's surgizing prose.

## Nixon Radiates Confidence During Michigan Campaign

En Route With Nixon — (U.P.) — Vice President Richard M. Nixon's campaign party whistled through the heart of labor powerful Michigan today radiating confidence every mile of the way.

Nixon himself exudes confidence at every stop and he is plugging hard for the GOP state and congressional tickets.

**Notes Said in Bag**

Michigan Republican leaders have expressed confidence that the state's 20 electoral votes are "in the bag" for President Eisenhower and Nixon. State Chairman John Feikens predicted the GOP presidential ticket will win by more than its 320,000 victory margin of four years ago.

But GOP strategists privately are far less optimistic about the congressional and gubernatorial battles in the state where Walter Reuther's United Auto Workers are a potent force.

**Presidential Race Rivalled**

The gubernatorial battle, in which Democratic Gov. G. Menen Williams is seeking an unprecedented fifth term, is rivaling the presidential race in interest. Williams is opposed by Detroit Mayor Albert E. Cobo, who was slated to accompany the Nixon party today.

Nixon, whose 13-car "Dick Nixon Special," is following virtually the same route Adlai E. Stevenson took last week, is striking back at Democratic campaign charges that President Eisenhower's is "a big business" administration.

**JAPANESE SHIPS SEIZED**

Tokyo — (U.P.) — Soviet patrol vessels captured four Japanese fishing boats off the Hokkaido coast Monday, the Japanese Coast Guard reported today.

Three of the Japanese boats were captured while operating two miles west of Suio Island only a few miles off the coast of Hokkaido. The fourth was taken near Kunashiri Island, also within sight of Hokkaido.

## 'Middle Price' Car In Chrysler Series

Detroit — (U.P.) — Chrysler has added a new "middle price" Saratoga series to its longer, lower and restyled 1957 automobiles which go on display in dealer showrooms across the country one week from today.

The new Saratoga series is offered in a four-door sedan, a two-door hardtop and a four-door hardtop and is built to market between Chrysler's Windsor and New Yorker series.

The Windsor, lowest-priced Chrysler, and the higher-priced New Yorker come in four-door sedan, two and four-door hardtop and station models. Convertibles also are featured in the New Yorker series.

Torsion bar suspension, push-button transmission, 14-inch wheels and recessed safety door openers are standard equipment on all models. Combination heater-air conditioning units and dual headlights are optional.

All models have massive grille and front bumper arrangements and feature long, sweeping rear fender fins that blend into the body at the midway point. Overall height has been reduced as much as five inches.
