

Morse Asks Anti-Trust Revision; McKay Raps Demos' Bomb Stand

Sen. Wayne Morse and Douglas McKay, waging an all out battle for the U. S. Senate seat that Morse now occupies, concentrated their work in Portland yesterday but both had forceful speakers in other parts of the state.

Speaking before the Portland chapter of the American Institute of Banking last night, Morse said the present time compares to the period of 1908-1912 "as far as the threat of monopoly domination of the country's business is concerned."

He called for a complete revision of the anti-trust laws to

protect the competition system, and pointed to the formation of subsidiary companies by large corporations as a manifestation of what he called the unhealthy trend toward monopoly domination.

McKay carried his campaign to Reed college and declared that Morse and his supporters have "turned their back on powerful and meaningful issues that can overturn and engulf" them.

The former Interior secretary and Oregon governor lashed out at Democratic calls for end of H-bomb tests and the draft, and his opponent's stand on power

and loosening of controls on money.

McKay said the federal government could not afford to build all the power projects needed and said a loosening of money controls would lead to spiraling inflation.

In an earlier address yesterday, Morse charged that "budget slashers in such places as the department of the interior have pointed out that they have cut funds requests for access roads and similar projects. In reality, they have saved pennies and lost many dollars in the long run by failing to aid an expanding economy," he said.

A Republican team of Phil Hitchcock, Don Walker and Ivan Congelton, made a flying visit through central Oregon yesterday, stopping in Madras, Redmond, Prineville and Bend to plug their party's candidates.

Hitchcock told his listeners that Morse is making campaign promises that are impossible to fulfill. He singled out for special criticisms the senators stand on old age assistance payments and removal of curbs on inflation.

"His promises to those receiving old age assistance are both malicious and cruel," Hitchcock said.

Neuberger Stumps
Sen. Richard Neuberger stumped eastern Oregon in behalf of Morse and at Vale called for extension of the soil bank program to include some vegetables and row crops. He urged revival of the Columbia Basin power development which he said had been "throttled by four years of Republican political collaboration."

A Douglas county group which calls itself Organized Democrats and Independents who Okay Doug McKay, yesterday charged that "The Al Sarena case has been promoted as a monstrous political fraud by opportunist bureaucratic politicians opposing McKay."

George Luoma, Roseburg attorney and secretary of the organization, said he toured the mining claims last week and found first hand that the claims were being worked. Luoma said he had pictures to prove his claim and also letters signed by Estes Kefauver which were written to assist in obtaining the legitimate mining patents.

Klamath Jail Escape Thwarted

Klamath Falls—(U.P.)—A jailbreak attempt by four prisoners, one under life sentence for murder, was thwarted yesterday when Sheriff Murray Britton and other officers heard them sawing through an iron wall.

Two hacksaw blades bound to broomsticks were used by the men, and they had succeeded in cutting through 11 inches across and 4 inches down each side of a Klamath county jail wall when Britton, Deputy Sheriff Woody Joe and Jailer Fred Calfee moved in on them.

Had the prisoners succeeded in cutting a hole big enough to let them through, it would have gained them access to a plumbing corridor. Britton said they probably hoped to overpower a guard there and escape.

Britton said the four included James Quinton Anderson, 31, convicted in Burns last year of the second degree murder of Richard David Miller. Anderson was due to be transferred to the Oregon state prison Wednesday.

Chin Up Club Schedules Hobby Sale Nov. 2 and 3

A cooked food sale also will be a feature of the event. The Chin Up club is an organization of physically handicapped persons. Proceeds from the sale will be used to further the club's activities for the coming year, the president said. These include making of favors for the county fair, convalescent homes and shut-ins during various holidays and other projects to brighten the life of the less fortunate. The club's annual antique show and sale, usually held in May, provides funds for a handicapped aid equipment pool from which supplies such as hospital beds, crutches and wheel chairs are purchased for loan to anyone having a need for them.

Bar Harbor, Me.—(U.P.)—A representative of Canadian National Railways said the new international ferry, Bluenose, operated by the railroad "has exceeded the fondest dreams of her owners." Atty. Kenneth Baird said the vessel, which plies between this Maine resort and Yarmouth, N. S., carried 60,000 passengers and 16,000 motor vehicles in July and August.

Brazilian Strongman May Be On Way Out

Rio De Janeiro — (U.P.) — Luis Carlos Prestes, longtime Brazilian Communist strongman, may be on his way out, observers speculated today. The Brazilian Communist party Monday fell in line with the new Moscow anti-Stalinist policy. A manifesto, issued by the party's Central Committee, said the errors of Stalinism in Russia would serve to alert the Brazilian Communist party to guard against the possibility of dictatorship within its organization.

Prestes has been the unchallenged head of the party in Brazil for years. The manifesto, published in the party organ Imprensa Popular, did not mention Prestes name but indicated strongly that the party now is less likely to follow one-man leadership blindly.

Pocatello, Ida. — (U.P.) — An atomic scientist said Monday he believes some people in Utah, Idaho and Wyoming areas already may have received "excessive" doses of radioactive fallout.

Dr. David L. Hill, an atomic physicist at Los Alamos, N.M., said the amount of "poisonous" fallout has been increasing and in certain instances may be "excessive."

"I think it has happened particularly in Utah, Idaho and Wyoming," he told a reporter. Hill, former president of the Federation of American Scientists, was traveling with Sen. Estes Kefauver, (D-Tenn.) on his vice presidential campaign as a special consultant on atomic matters.

School Lunch Program Credited To Surplus

Chicago — (U.P.) — The head of the Commodity Credit Corporation said Monday that the nationally supported school lunch program was "just one of the opportunities made available by the so-called farm surplus problem."

True D. Morse, also undersecretary of agriculture, told members of the American school food service association, that "our vigorous economy and abundant farm and ranch production" was the source of the expanded lunch program.

"The use of surplus foods in schools shows how surpluses can be made to benefit our youth and build for the future," Morse said. He urged further local support of the profit-free lunch program which he said would be "the key to its success."

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Classroom Teachers Hold Key to Problem Of Educating Youth

Classroom teachers hold the key to the problem of educating youth, according to David C. Guhl, Connellsville, Pa., who addressed a meeting of Jackson County Department of Classroom Teachers, Oregon Education Association, last night. The dinner meeting, held at Howard school, was attended by about 125 teachers.

Guhl, who is president of the Department of Classroom Teachers, National Educational Association, said business men and women are no longer dodging the problems of education, and are showing more interest in their solutions.

The speaker also said that if the nation is going to demand a certain type individual to teach the young, then citizens must be prepared to meet the salary scales these people can get from business and industry.

The attitude of national magazines and other publications toward education is becoming more favorable, Guhl declared, and said this was due largely to efforts of educators and others connected with the school systems.

Attention to Problems

He also pointed out that both political parties are paying more attention to the problems of education, and said NRS consultants were available for the platform drafting committees of both parties last summer.

Guhl also talked about school buildings and said "no one knows as well as a classroom teacher what is needed to make a schoolroom functional and acceptable" and added that school boards and architects should consult teachers when planning school buildings.

Nairobi, Kenya — (U.P.) — Nairobi's social set shunned Princess Margaret's visit Monday night to the dinner-dance held at the lovely home of pro-African settler Michael Wood.

Race-conscious settlers first threatened to demonstrate against the princess' attendance at the party because Wood is the leader of the multi-racial Capricorn party. However, native constables patrolled the area and Nairobi's social set stayed quietly indoors.

The princess did not dance at the party, although the band played her favorite rock 'n' roll numbers. She sat sipping a liquor and chatted with guests for two hours before she was whisked back to Government House by a police convoy.
