Only player among Medford's top line talent expected to miss the Grizzly fray is guard Dean Rickard, who suffered a knee ligament injury against Eureka.

Fullback Loren Christean and tackle Bruce West have missed practice because of colds. Halfback Gordon Owsley was hospitalized Monday night, yesterday and last night for treatment of boils.

The Tornado wound up its drill last night with about a 20-minute scrimmage. It worked on defense with much attention on pass defense since Ashland has done much throwing in recent games. Individual work is on the agenda tonight with tackling drill, blocking for linemen and pass defense for backs.

Workout Monday was light and was hampered somewhat by the absence of nine players who were attending the regional conference of the Oregon Association of Student Councils.

Southern Oregon conference schools, which have been playing a 12-game slate in league basketball, swing to a 18-tussle schedule in the 1957 season. Reason, of course, is the elevation of Crater high to Class A-1, making the conference and District 6 a five school circuit. The plan of four games for each member school against each other member schools.

Crater has not had all four of the other Southern Oregon conference schools, Medford, Ashland, Grants Pass and Klamath Falls, on its schedule on a regular season basis since around 1950 when it was still Central Point high. However, it has kept up a regular rivalry with Ashland and Grants Pass and has met Medford, Grants Pass and Klamath Falls in district play-offs.

JAMBOREE DEC. 1

The expanded loop schedule permits the conference schools only six regulation games in which to warm-up for the regular campaign. Medford has been used to having at least seven. Medford, Ashland, Grants Pass and Klamath Falls, however, each will see the equivalent of three quarters of a game here on Dec. 1 in their annual jamboree. Each school will play each other one quarter. Oregon School Activities association regulations limit prep action to 22 games outside of district play-offs and state tournament participation.

PLAY AT EUGENE

Medford high's slate of full-length hoop games opens with a trip to Eugene on Dec. 7 and 8. The Black Tornado, runner-up for state championship laurels two years in a row, opposes Marshfield here on Dec. 14 and North Bend here on Dec. 15.

Franklin and Cleveland of Portland come to Medford on Dec. 27 and 28, respectively. Scheduling of the Portland schools here on successive nights is a departure from last year's plan where the metropolitan teams engaged in a twinbill here with Medford and Grants Pass one night and all four schools moved to GP action the following night. This year Cleveland will stop at Grants Pass on Dec. 27 and the Cavemen will be hosts to Franklin on Dec. 28.

Star of the Franklin Quakers is Bjarne Jensen, 6-foot 9-inch first team all-stater and most

talked of player in the state. The Tornado beat the Quakers with Jensen in the line-up in the 1955 state tourney and again here last December but lost to that club in last season's state A-1 finale.

TWO-WAY CHASE

The 1957 championship race in Southern Oregon conference basketball is figured to be a two-way race between Klamath Falls and Medford. Klamath finished second to Medford last season and both clubs entered the state tourney. Much of the Klamath hope will be based on two tall boys, Glenn Moore and Cliff Sutherland. Both are reported to be around 6-8 now. Medford will have height in Neil Plumley, around 6-5. Mike Stearns and Larry Slesler, 6-3, and second team all-stater Dick McLaughlin, 6-2.

GLOBETROTTERS COMING
