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JACKIE PUSCAS BEATS HALL IN DEBUT AS PRO

Jackie Puscas, Medford, impressive and much improved over his showings last winter and spring as an amateur, handed Teddy Hall, Seattle, a thrashing last night in his first professional boxing bout.

Puscas fought the more experienced Hall in a preliminary to the Eddie Machen-Johnny Holman bout in Portland and took a four round decision.

The Medford lightweight dropped Hall for a nine count in the first chucker, staggered the Seattleite in the second round and hurt him in the third. Desire to put the Wash-

ingtonian away took some of the sharpness and smoothness out of Puscas' fist flinging but the neophyte pro reportedly astounded some of the Portland fight crowd. They had rated Hall, with some 50 pro fights behind him, a 4-3 favorite.

Hugh Jennings, manager and trainer of the Medford fighter, said that Puscas' boxing left something to be desired but that the former national AAU champion recognizes where he needs improvement. Plans for future bouts for Puscas are being mapped on the basis of his Portland showing.

Eddie Machen Stops Holman in Seventh

Portland, Ore.—(U.P.)—Unbeaten Eddie Machen, a lightning fast puncher from Redding, Calif., today eyed a tentative date with Tommy (Hurricane) Jackson after his knockout win over big Johnny Holman here Wednesday night.

Commenting on his seventh round kayo of Holman, the seventh ranked heavyweight credited his sharp left jab through the early rounds with the win.

The fight was carried to a nationwide audience by radio and television over the ABC network. It was the first fight ever beamed nationally from the Pacific Northwest.

"My left jab did the work all the way," Machen said in his dressing room after the fight ended in 28 seconds of the seventh round.

Sid Flaherty, manager of the unbeaten heavyweight, said the fight went according to plan. "I told him to box the first six rounds, then go after him," Flaherty said.

According to plan. If that was the plan, Machen followed it to perfection. For six rounds he stalked his heavier opponent, then unleashed a flurry of blurred leather as the seventh opened.

Holman dropped to the canvas in his own corner and struggled to get up as Referee Eddie Volk tolled off the count. He managed to struggle to his knees as Volk reached ten. The sudden Machen attack fol-

lowed an uneventful six rounds. Machen scored frequently in the early going with his crisp left jabs and constantly managed to evade the lumbering-in Holman who failed to connect with a potent right hand.

Holman went into the fight at 199½ while Machen weighed in at 194½.

13th Knockout
It was the 13th knockout scored by the 24-year-old Machen in his young career.

Comparing Machen with other men he has faced, the big Chicago puncher said Bob Satterfield, who outpointed Holman earlier this year, hit harder.

"But Machen hits quicker and strikes faster," Holman said, reflecting on the fight.

"It sure came fast," Holman said. Machen had the edge on the referee's and both judges' cards when his sudden burst ended the bout. Referee Volk had given all six rounds to him while Judge Ralph Gruman saw it for Holman in the fifth and sixth. Judge George Robinson gave Holman one round.

Volk's card read 36-30 while Gruman had it 35-31 and Robinson 34-32.

Black Tornado Goes To Ashland Friday

Medford's Black Tornado got its last grooming of the week last night for its return to the Southern Oregon conference and District 6 A-1 scramble.

After pausing in the loop race for a side trip to Eureka, Calif., last week, the Tornado sees its third league and district battle of the season Friday night against the Grizzlies of Ashland high. The game will be at 8 p.m. at Ashland.

Medford enters the conflict as a lopsided favorite with one of its best teams in years while Ashland football is at a low ebb but building for the future. The teams have met two common foes. Ashland lost 42 to 0 to Roseburg, a club which Medford beat 40 to 14. Medford trimmed Crater 34 to 12 and the Comets licked the Ashlanders 32 to 12.

Wet weather and mud are miserable to either club on a football field but such conditions, if they exist on Friday night, should make the situation more in Medford's favor. Rooks Make Good in Pro Grid Action

The National Football League wasn't impressed by the rookies it drafted this year but several of them, particularly Don McIlhenny and Lenny Moore, are making good in a big way.

The Detroit Lions drafted Howard Hopalong Cassidy, Ohio State's highly-publicized All-American halfback, No. 1 to fill the gap left by the retirement of Doak Walker. Hopalong has shown promise by McIlhenny, Detroit's third draft choice, has performed brilliantly.

McIlhenny has scored five touchdowns and ranks fifth in the league in rushing with 286 yards after four games. It would be appropriate if he turns into Walker's replacement. Like Walker, he played college football at Southern Methodist.

Moore also came to the pro league lacking an All-America tag. But he has been just about the only bright spot so far for the Baltimore Colts, who have lost three games since winning their opener. The former Penn State halfback, who was drafted No. 1 by Baltimore, has scored four touchdowns.

Other Standouts
Other rookies who appear to have the talent necessary to make good in the pro circuit include end Leon Clarke and fullback Joe Marconi of the Los Angeles Rams; halfback Don Schaefer and center Bob Pellegrini of the Philadelphia Eagles; quarterback Gary Glick and end Lowell Perry of the Pittsburgh Steelers; halfback Perry Jeter of the Chicago Bears, and halfback Preston Carpenter of the Cleveland Browns.

The Cardinals (4-0) defend the Eastern Division's only perfect record against the Washington Redskins (1-3) Sunday at Chicago. The Cardinals are picked to win because their defensive unit has given up the fewest points in the league, 43.
