St. Mary's of Medford has been working on tackling, blocking and passing this week in preparation for its final regular season football conflict in the Jackson County B league. The Crusaders go to Rogue River Friday night.

The Medford team needs the victory for a clean cut third conference championship in a row as well as for an unbeaten season in the league. Rogue River is out of the race but could prove a spoiler, knocking St. Mary's back into a tie with Talent, which the Crusaders tripped last week.

With 15 or more starters in the Garden State, the winner will take down \$170,000 plus. If Arcaro had the mount on Bold Ruler, he figures the ride would be worth 10 per cent of the winning total, provided the Wheatley colt reached the wire first.
