

Morse Defends Record in Senate; McKay Denounces Foe's Work

Sen. Wayne Morse and his opponent for the Senate, Douglas McKay, campaigned in Portland yesterday. — Morse with a staunch defense of his 12 year Senate record and McKay with an equally vocal denunciation of the senior senator's work.

The Republican flying team that has taken to the air for a fast paced tour of the state before the election next month, visited the Willamette valley yesterday and Morse billed that area for himself today.

Sen. Richard Neuberger campaigned in eastern Oregon in

behalf of Morse and other Democratic candidates and was to be in Klamath Falls today.

McKay Charges Fear Tactics
McKay singled out Adlai Stevenson's views on H-bomb testing for his sharpest criticism yesterday and attacked a Morse statement which he said "supported abandonment of H-bomb testing." McKay said the statement "completes his record of being wrong on every issue that involves war or peace."

Morse visited Marylhurst college yesterday. He told his listeners there that a senator's job is "to translate moral values

into legislation."

McKay ended his day with an address in Portland in which he charged that eastern labor leaders are employing fear tactics in an attempt to sway Oregon voters.

"Oregon labor leaders have taken an active and interested part in Oregon elections for long years—but never have they used intimidation in any form," McKay said. "These practices are the importation of eastern labor leaders whose intervention in this campaign is a matter of documented record," he added.

Morse Asks About Ad
Morse toured the Oregon Chain saw plant in Portland and also the Omark industries plant. While there he asked a workman "Do you think the full page ad is doing any damage?" to which the workman replied, "It stinks." The senator was referring to the recent advertisement in behalf of his opponent.

The three men flying Republican team attacked the Democratic party's record and had high praise of McKay in its Willamette valley tour yesterday.

Phil Hitchcock charged that Morse was "an advocate of the policies that brought a 49 per cent increase in the cost of living during the seven years of the Truman administration."

"While Morse promises, McKay produces," Hitchcock said.

Governors Race
Robert Holmes, candidate for governor on the Democratic ticket, told a labor audience in Portland last night that "Democrats appreciate labor's support because you people believe in government in the interest of everyone, and so do we."

He charged that his opponent, Gov. Elmo Smith, had an anti-labor record in the state senate.

Wendell Wyatt, state GOP chairman and like Holmes a resident of Clatsop County, lashed out at Holmes in a talk to Republican women. He called Holmes "a man who is unfit to hold the governorship."

Hatfield Discusses Education at Kiwanis Meeting Yesterday

"We have long put too much emphasis on manpower and have not recognized the importance of brainpower," State Sen. Mark Hatfield, Salem, declared yesterday in a talk to Medford Kiwanis club.

Hatfield, Republican nominee for Oregon secretary of state, discussed education as a national need and pointed to "education, the defense of the state" in the non-political address at Rogue Valley Country club.

"We need to get brainpower in the laboratories to keep us ahead in the race for nuclear weapons," the senator stated. He pointed out that if people of this country would compare what is produced in their school systems with what Russia is developing in the sciences, they would find this nation losing a major battle. Hatfield brought out much more education along scientific or technical lines is required of Russian students.

"We have bowed down to a great god—the god of mediocrity," Hatfield asserted. He said that this country and its educators have been too long content with developing the average student rather than dealing with the individual student and chan-

neling his ability into the right pathways.

Hatfield maintained that education has been left too long in the hands of the educators and that there should be a broader participation of citizens. He spoke of the need to "cajole, direct and urge the student into science so that he will not take the easy road."

The senator pointed out that parents can do much to get the student's brainpower properly channeled. "The parent has greater influence on the thinking of the student than he thinks," the senator declared.

Slower Students
Education geared to the slower students in our schools is harmful in pre-college years in that the bright students grow rusty in their abilities, according to the former political science instructor at Willamette university. He mentioned that the system leads to the flunking out of students in college who showed brightness in their pre-college years.

The senator also stressed the need to get rid of unrealistic pressures in which easy courses are taken so that a student can make certain grade points.

Pravda Declares Ike Lacks Foundation for Intervention Claim

Moscow — (U.P.) — The official Communist organ Pravda said today President Eisenhower is "without any foundation" in complaining that Premier Nikolai Bulganin's latest disarmament message amounted to intervention in US internal affairs.

"Such subjects cannot be an internal affair of the United States," Pravda said. "Long ago the Soviet government proposed the prohibition of atomic weapons and the cessation of tests of such weapons."

The Communist newspaper said the world can hardly consider prohibition of atomic tests an American campaign issue because the subject has been before the United Nations for 11 years.

Pravda printed the full text of President Eisenhower's stern letter which rebuked the Soviet premier for prematurely revealing the premier's preceding message public and for criticizing Secretary of State John Foster Dulles.

"The American president has obviously been the victim of uninformed experts," commented
