North, Central Plains Hit by Rain and Snow

Widespread rain and snow slammed parts of the North and Central Plains as the first real storm of the fall season surged eastward to the upper Mississippi Valley early today.

Meanwhile, "heavy to killing frosts" were expected in several California valleys.

Particularly in danger were lettuce and strawberry crops in the Salinas Valley, artichokes and strawberries and wine grapes and tomatoes in the San Joaquin Valley.

The intense storm center pushed into northwest Kansas and southwest Nebraska out of the Rockies Wednesday night, spreading from Mexico to Canada. Snow, however, was limited to the west-central portion of the plains.

Congress Would Up Cost of Living in Sin

Washington — (U.P.) — Congress is taking steps to raise the cost of living in sin.

Congressional tax experts disclosed that they are considering increasing taxes on bachelor playboys who set up housekeeping with women to whom they are not married.

As matters stand now, the wayward male can claim an income tax exemption amounting to \$800 by declaring that his mistress is a "dependent of his household."

But a House Ways and Means subcommittee indicated Wednesday that the days of tax relief for illicit love may be numbered.

The subcommittee announced it is considering legislation that would bar a taxpayer from counting as a member of his household any individual with whom his relationship at any time during the taxable year is in "violation of local law."

Hodge Theft Total Nearly \$1½ Million

Springfield, Ill. — (U.P.) — The total of convicted State Auditor Orville E. Hodge's embezzlement of state funds officially has risen to almost 1½ million dollars.

State Auditor Lloyd Morey, who succeeded the now-imprisoned Hodge, said the official count of Hodge's theft had reached \$1,429,407.

This amount was \$263,000 greater than a previous tally of the state loss.

Morey's disclosure indicated that Hodge will fall at least \$200,000 to \$300,000 short of his attempt to make full restitution.

Hodge is now serving a 12-15 year term in the state penitentiary for his crimes. Gov. William G. Stratton has promised that the state will recover "every penny" of the stolen money.

Disabled Airliner Returns To Shannon

Sannon, Ireland — (U.P.) — An American airliner with 104 American passengers aboard reported engine failure over the Atlantic 800 miles from here today, but turned around and returned to Shannon Airport on three engines.

The crew of a Super Constellation owned by Seaboard and Western Airlines, Inc., radioed for help when one of its engines sputtered to a stop.

A four-engine Shackleton of the Royal Air Force Coastal Command answered the call for help and accompanied the crippled plane back to safety as a precautionary measure.

Army Private Takes Tank for Joy Ride

Manheim, Germany — (U.P.) — A U. S. Army private was charged today with taking a 45-ton tank for a joy ride down Germany's Autobahn (superhighway).

Military police said Pvt. Walter F. Brown, 20, of Caliente, Nev., took the M47 tank from Coleman Barracks near Manheim and frightened motorists along a seven mile stretch of the Autobahn. They said he finally pulled off the highway and ripped through two fences and a garden before stopping at a railroad crossing, where he was arrested.

Multiple Death Case Nearing Indiana Jury

Crown Point, Ind. — (U.P.) — The trial of a young mother accused of murdering four members of her family was expected to go to the jury today.

Should the jury agree with prosecution arguments, Mrs. Opal Collins, 25, could become the first woman in Indiana history to receive a death sentence.

Mrs. Collins told a spectator-packed courtroom Wednesday how she fatally shot her paraplegic husband, his mother and his two sisters last May in Hammond, Ind.
