James A. O'Brien, Applegate Rancher, Dies Late Thursday

James Alfred O'Brien, 84, well-known rancher in the Applegate area, died at his home about 8 p.m. Thursday.

O'Brien lived his entire life on the stock and dairy ranch in the Applegate valley.

The land was originally acquired by his father, John O'Brien, as a donation land claim in 1852 when he came to this area by mule team from Jacksonville, Ill. His father had interests in gold mines in Steamboat, Ore., and at one time was county commissioner of Jackson county.

O'Brien's mother crossed the plains by oxen-drawn wagon from Keokuk, Iowa, in 1852, before meeting John O'Brien.

He is survived by one son, John O'Brien of Applegate, two sisters, Mrs. Rose Baldwin and Miss Ann O'Brien, both of Ashland, and one grandchild, Donald O'Brien, of Portland, and one great grandchild, Michael O'Brien.

Funeral services will be held at Perl funeral home Monday, Oct. 29, at 1:30 p.m., with the Rev. T. S. Gapon, of the Applegate, officiating. Interment will be in the family plot in Jacksonville cemetery.
