

### Circuit Court Suit Charges Negligence

Mrs. Pauline K. Goguey, 428 Berrydale ave., Medford, has filed a complaint in circuit court against Edna Moss Miller, 34 Rose ave., Medford, charging her with negligence in operating a car when she collided with another car operated by Mrs. Goguey last July 22.

Mrs. Goguey stated in the complaint that her car was struck from the rear by the car operated by Edna Miller while she was parked at the West 11th st. railroad crossing while a train was passing. The complaint alleges that Edna Miller was driving too fast and that her car was not under control.

Mrs. Goguey stated that the accident caused the death of her unborn child and that she suffered shock, bodily pain and mental anguish. She is asking \$7,500 general damages and \$250 special damages.
