Fitness Program Starts at School

A portion of a long range program for testing physical fitness started last week at McLoughlin Junior High school.

Under the direction of Lee Ragsdale, boys were brought from various schools to undergo checks on speed, muscular growth, coordination, rate of maturity, skeleton development, and other aspects. Comparison also will be made of mental, physical, and social growth, and records kept as these tested take part in school athletic programs.

A team of examiners conducted the tests. The University of Oregon sent Kay Peterson, Stuart Wickens, Noel Hayman, and James Harrison. Theodore Schopf, Ron Mauer and Dale Bates have come from Southern Oregon college.

By the end of the school year 560 students will have been tested, Ragsdale said. The same students will receive similar tests each year. The boys now being tested range in age from 7 to 17.

Scores on the tests were recorded by students of the McLoughlin Physical Education department, under the direction of the testing team and the coaches from the schools participating in the program.

Roundtable Group Approves Program

The Jackson County Chamber of Commerce Roundtable yesterday passed a resolution favoring approval by Medford voters of the proposed off-street parking and arterial street program; parts of Medford's capital improvement program.

The proposed capital improvement program, consisting of four measures, will be submitted to Medford voters for approval during the Nov. 6 general election. The measures are (1) arterial streets, (2) off-street parking, (3) storm sewers, and (4) sanitary sewers.

The roundtable action was taken at its noon luncheon meeting at the Jackson hotel. In approving the two measures, the roundtable joined positions previously taken by the chambers' committee on government operations and the chamber's board of directors.

The resolution was passed following discussion by chamber members pointing out that many Medford residents do not understand they would not pay taxes on the off-street parking program, and that the whole city would benefit by the passage of two measures, not "just the downtown area."

Promotion Problems Topic of Roundtable

Bill Singler, member of the oil industry committee in Jackson county, and Mrs. Bert Pree, chairman of the tourist and conventions committee of the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce, spoke on promotional problems of the previous tourist season at the noon luncheon of the chamber roundtable yesterday at the Jackson hotel.

Singler said the promotional campaign for tourists in the valley was featured by "Visitor's Guides" prepared by the chamber and distributed by the 130 service station operators in the county. Purpose of the guides was to tell tourists what events were occurring in the valley at that particular time.

The "big problem," he added, was to educate the retail outlets to distribute the guides. Tourist response, he said, was "enthusiastic" about the guides.

Mrs. Pree said information on the valley is being distributed to five states other than Oregon. She added that traveling in the state has doubled in the last 10 years.

The lamps shone o'er fair women
And brave men;
A thousand hearts beat happily;

Which spake again,
And all went merry as a marriage bell;
But hush! Hark! A deep sound
Strikes like a rising knell!

Details

Napoleon escaped from the island of Elba in the Mediterranean where he had been a prisoner for about a year and landed at Juan-les-Pins on the French Riviera. Proceeding to Paris he rallied the French army and then started out to attack the forces under the command of the Duke of Wellington. They met at Waterloo. This was the first time the two great generals had opposed each other. The battle was brief but terrific. It ended with the French army on the run leaving behind 46,700 of its men dead on the Waterloo battlefield. At the present time comparatively few travelers visit Waterloo. The outstanding tourist attraction in Brussels and vicinity seems to be its celebrated and much discussed fountain. This bronze statuette of a little boy, considered "shocking" by many visitors and amusing by others, has been attracting the interest of visitors to Brussels for ever 300 years.
