Neuberger Claims Proof That Al Sarena is Timber Operation

Portland — (Special) — Sen Richard L. Neuberger announced today that the files of the public utility commissioner in Salem contain "positive proof that the controversial Al Sarena claims in the Rogue River National forest are a timber operation and not a mining operation."

The Oregon Senator said he had learned of an application made by the owners of the mine, H. P. and Charles R. McDonald, in August of 1955 for refund of the state fuel tax on 738 gallons of gasoline used for "construction and logging."

Under Oregon law, commercial log-haulers can recover the state gasoline tax when fuel is used for operations off highways which receive state or federal aid funds.

"This application, covering a 12-month period, for the gasoline rebate from the Oregon Utility Commission was made only 18 months after Secretary of the Interior Douglas McKay had granted full patents to the 15 controversial claims in the Rogue River forest," said Neuberger. "Nowhere in the application does it refer to a mining operation, but twice there is reference to a logging operation. Yet, ex-Secretary McKay still claims the patents were granted to operate a mine. Where's the mine?"

Neuberger suggested that State Utilities Commissioner Charles H. Heltzel should make a full

statement as to whether or not the fuels-rebate application from the Al Sarena owners, listing use of the fuel in logging operations, actually is on file at the commission office. "This will decide the question of whether Al Sarena has been a logging venture or a mining project," Neuberger added.

Neuberger noted "a strange coincidence that the owners of the Al Sarena property announced two weeks before election day their plans to explore the claims and attempt to 'block out' what they describe as 'valuable' ore bodies."

"It's this a political mine or a mineral mine?" he asked.

"It's about time someone tried to find out whether the claims have any of any value. Assays by three government agencies showed insufficient mineralization to warrant granting of patents, and only the private assay 3000 miles away by a firm chosen by the Al Sarena company was allowed by McKay to overrule these findings," Neuberger continued. "The U.S. Forest Service had already established the fact that the claims had more than 18 million board feet of merchantable timber."

Neuberger pointed out that the Al Sarena company did not need patents on public land in order to mine ore.

"The company could mine ore without patents, but there was one thing it could not do—it could not log and cut the timber

from national forest lands until it had patents to the land involved," Neuberger explained. "A number of substantial mining companies, including Anacosta Copper Mining company and U.S. Vanadium corporation, are producing ores without patents on public lands in the west."

"Basic public policy is involved in the specially invented procedures by which the Al Sarena patents were granted under ex-Secretary McKay. The Forest Service reports that more than 166,000 unpatented mining claims, involving more than 100-billion board feet of timber, dot the National forests."

"What would happen to our national forests—the source of our water supply, the habitat of 70 per cent of our wildlife, the basis of Oregon's \$100,000,000 a year tourist business—if the special patenting procedures contrived for Al Sarena were extended to the other 166,000 claims?"

Neuberger refuted claims of the mine owners that the Forest Service was notified before the claims were granted. The Oregon Senator cited sworn testimony by both Dr. Richard E. McArdle, chief of the Forest Service, and E. F. Mynatt, assistant general counsel of the Department of Agriculture, which "specifically stated they were not informed of McKay's decision until Jan. 20, two weeks after McKay's solicitor had ordered the patents granted."

Earlier attempts to reach the former soldiers by helicopter failed because of the rough terrain and high altitude.

Agreement Reached In Coos Bay Strike

Coos Bay — (U.P.) — Weyerhaeuser Timber Company officials and members of Local 2652, Lumber and Sawmill Workers Union, yesterday reached agreement for settlement of a strike of Weyerhaeuser woods workers here which started last Friday.

Crux of the dispute was recognition of the local as bargaining agent for some 300 woods employees of the company in the Coos Bay area. The union said there were a number of minor grievances outstanding and the union had demanded talks with the firm at high levels.

Construction and maintenance workers began returning to work immediately and Weyerhaeuser said others would return today. Full operations will resume as soon as conditions of access roads and weather permit.
