

Leo Rejects Tribe Offer To Glendale

Hollywood — (UP) — Cleveland General Manager Hank Greenberg still was in the market today for a new baseball manager for the Indians. Greenberg had tried to convince Leo Durocher to take the job, but the former Dodger and Giant manager apparently refused the post.

Durocher, who retired from baseball to become a radio-television executive, disclosed Tuesday night he had met with "my old friend Hank" and discussed the Cleveland manager's job. Durocher said any details of the meeting would have to come from Greenberg.

No Foreseeable Change

But the onetime pennant-winning manager declared, "I'm free to say there is no foreseeable change in my present plans."

The meeting between Durocher and Greenberg reportedly took place Tuesday afternoon. Greenberg, who arrived in Los Angeles Monday, could not be reached at his hotel for comment.

Durocher, in the wake of several shakeups in Major League clubs, had announced earlier he wasn't interested in returning to baseball unless given an interest in the club he would manage.

Housing Slated On Ebbets Field

New York — (UP) — Ebbets Field, home of the Brooklyn Dodgers since 1913, will be converted into a middle income housing development—but not for a few years.

The Dodgers sold the ball park to real estate investor Marvin Kratter Tuesday but protected themselves by retaining an option to play at Ebbets field through 1961 if plans for a new park fail to work out.

The exact purchase price was not announced but it was believed it was upward of \$2 million.

Lopez Views Chicago Task

Chicago — (UP) — Al Lopez, new manager of the Chicago White Sox began to find out today how complicated a task he faces in building the American league's third place team into a contender which can beat the world champion New York Yankees.

Lopez, who Tuesday signed a contract for one year for an estimated \$40,000, began a series of conferences with Vice Presidents Charles Comiskey and John D. Rigney to find out exactly what his new team lacks.

The new chief planned also to confer with at least two of his new coaches, Ray Berres and Don Gutteridge, who were on the staff of the White Sox last season. His third coach, Tony Cuccinello, was with him at Cleveland, where he resigned as manager Sept. 28 after piloting the Indians to second place five times and to the pennant once in six seasons.

Lopez took over the Sox full of optimism because Chicago beat his Indians 15 times in 22 games last season. On the basis of this performance, he was unable to name any specific positions he wanted to improve.

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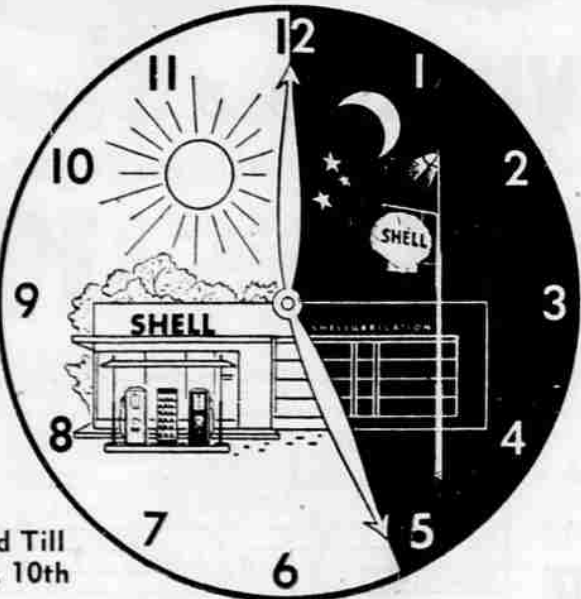
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
