



## Secret Service Agents Will Be Glad When Ike Ends Campaign

Washington — (U.P.) — White House Secret Service agents won't talk about it for the record, but they will be glad when President Eisenhower winds up his campaigning for reelection.

They have the awesome, around-the-clock responsibility of seeing that no harm comes to the most important head of government in the world. And their task is much more difficult when he is campaigning as he was this week.

And even so, his campaigning—with only airport speeches—didn't present the Secret Service agents with nearly so many problems as Mr. Eisenhower's recent campaign trip to the West Coast with its motorcades through crowds.

The agents sometimes relax during a political campaign some of their precautions designed primarily for the President's privacy and convenience. For instance, news photographers are given more freedom in taking pictures.

But the agents always are alert for the President's safety.

**On the Job**

More than a score of the agents on the White House detail accompany the President on extended trips. They relieve each other on eight-hour shifts with a half dozen or so on duty at all times. The traveling detail also is bolstered by agents stationed in the area visited.

The White House refuses to make public the exact number of agents on details of their precautionary measures for security reasons.

Crowds, with the possibility they may include a person intent on harming the President, give the Secret Service agents their greatest worries.

On motorcades, Mr. Eisenhower's limousine is preceded by a local police car with one Secret Service agent. Six other agents ride in a special White House car immediately behind the President. When the motorcade slows up or the crowd closes in, four of the agents jump out and run alongside the four fenders of the President's car to smother any untoward incident.

When he speaks, agents are spotted at strategic places near the speaker's platform and in the audience.

**Like a Shadow**

James T. Rowley—youthful, husky head of the White House Secret Service detail—rides in Mr. Eisenhower's car and stays close to him at all other times the President is in public places.

The work of the Secret Service agents starts days ahead of the actual trip of the President. One goes ahead in advance to work out with local law enforcement officials the details of protecting the President.

The advance agent goes over motorcade routes, inspects places where the President will speak, selects the building entrances he will use and makes numerous other such arrangements—all with an eye to the President's safety.

Mr. Eisenhower's "bubble-top" limousine and the special ones of the Secret Service—equipped with running boards and side handles—are sent ahead to places where there will be motorcades. A 40-hour, non-stop trip from Minneapolis, Minn., to Los Angeles was necessary for two of them on Mr. Eisenhower's swing to the West Coast.

At hotels, agents are posted at all times near the President's suite to screen visitors. One stays in the kitchen from where his food is served.

The agents keep a time log on the President's visitors.

## Poll of Newsmen Favors President

Washington — (U.P.) — Forty-seven of 50 Washington correspondents polled by Newsweek magazine believe President Eisenhower will win the Nov. 6 election.

But 38 predicted the Democrats will retain control of the House and 30 forecast a Democratic Senate victory.

The poll, prepared for the Nov. 5 issue of the magazine and released Tuesday night, said the average guess on the number of electoral votes each candidate would receive was 347 for President Eisenhower and 183 for Adlai E. Stevenson.

The average guess on the House membership was 229 Democrats and 206 Republicans, which would amount to a loss of three seats by the Democrats.

The correspondents predicted the makeup of the Senate will stay the same with 49 Democrats and 47 Republicans.

In the magazine's 1952 poll, the 50 correspondents estimated that Stevenson would receive 297 electoral votes and Mr. Eisenhower 264. In the actual balloting, the President received 442 electoral votes and Stevenson 89.

The correspondents also predicted that the Democrats would retain control of Congress in 1952, but the GOP actually won both the House and Senate.

## 29 States Will Elect Governors on Nov. 6

Washington — (U.P.) — Twenty-nine states will elect governors Nov. 6.

Republicans now control 16 of the governorships at stake, and the Democrats 13. In the states where there are no gubernatorial races this year, the Democrats control 14 state capitols and the Republicans five.

There are nine Republican governors seeking re-election and eight Democratic governors. Two states already have picked governors this year. Maine re-elected Democratic Gov. Edmund S. Muskie on Sept. 10, and Democrat Earl K. Long was elected governor of Louisiana on Jan. 17.

## Damage Reported By Deer Hunters

Prineville — (U.P.) — Despite pleas by sportsmen's groups, the 1956 deer hunting season in central Oregon is being recorded as one of the worst on record in destruction to private property.

Ranchers and farmers have filed numerous complaints with state police and game officials, protesting the shooting of cattle and other animals and the destruction of property.

The Morrow county Livestock Growers' Association executive committee has requested the Oregon Cattlemen's Association to take official notice of the situation by calling a meeting of representatives from each county.

In the Ochoco national forest, a 20-man crew of deputized wardens, reported they found hundreds of unattended hunter's fires. Several small forest fires were started during the season by careless hunters.

Ranchers report fences have been torn down, gates left open so animals could stray and a wholesale disregard of no trespassing signs.

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## Americans Evacuated From Egyptian Cities

Alexandria, Egypt — (U.P.) — The American Export liner Exochorda sailed today for Naples with some 350 Americans evacuated from Egyptian cities.

The Americans left on the "urgent" advice of the U.S. State department. Americans in Syria and Jordan also were advised to get out.

The State department in Washington said Tuesday about 806 Americans have been moved out or are about to leave Israel and the three of its Arab countries. Another 5,255 or so Americans are still in the four countries.

## Coast Guard Stands By Derelict Vessel

New York — (U.P.) — A Coast Guard cutter which rescued the crew of 33 of a sinking German freighter stood by the derelict vessel today off the Newfoundland coast.

The cutter Chincoteague rescued 32 crewman and a woman radio operator from the battered Helga Bolten Tuesday afternoon after ploughing through heavy seas to reach the distressed ship.

Cmdr. Raymond G. Miller of Norfolk, Va., captain of the cutter, radioed Coast Guard headquarters here that all survivors of the freighter "are recovering comfortably."
