

# Stevenson Asks for Free Time To Talk On Foreign Policy

Pittsburgh —(AP)—Adlai E. Stevenson asked today for free radio and television time to tell how the Eisenhower foreign policy has taken "the whole world to the brink of another war."

Press Secretary Clayton Fritchey said the Democratic presidential candidate was asking radio and TV networks to give him 15 minutes at 7 p.m. (EST) tonight to comment on President Eisenhower's nationwide broadcast Wednesday night on the Israeli-Egyptian war.

Stevenson cancelled his entire schedule for the day to fly back to New York City where he will make the broadcast tonight. He was to have spoken at Syracuse, Rochester and Buffalo, N.Y.

**Pledges Party Support**

Stevenson told 10,000 persons at a rally here Wednesday night he would use the time to speak "somewhat at length about the bankruptcy of foreign policy of the Eisenhower-Dulles administration."

"As leader of the Democratic Party, I pledge on your behalf the support of our party to all measures which promise to bring a quick end to the fighting in the Middle East," he said.

"But, my friends, I cannot and will not promise support or respect for a foreign policy which must bear a heavy share of responsibility for the Middle Eastern crisis, and which has bluffed and blundered the United States into a shattering diplomatic disaster."

He said the administration foreign policy has taken the world "to the brink of another war which Mr. (Secretary of State John Foster) Dulles may not have planned but which he did a lot to cause."

**Hears Lik on Radio**

Stevenson flew here from New York Wednesday night. He heard the President's report on the Israel-Egypt fighting by radio, while his plane waited for clearance to leave New York.

Fritchey said Stevenson was requesting the networks to give Stevenson "exactly the same time" tonight that the President was afforded Wednesday night.

Asked on what grounds he based his demand, Fritchey said it was his "impression" that under rules of the Federal Communication, the President's speeches during the campaign are like those of any other candidate for office.

# Indians File Suit To Recover Timber Said Under-Priced

Portland —(AP)—Seven Indians yesterday filed a federal suit to recover timberlands they claim they were induced to sell for a fraction of their actual value.

The complaint, filed against Fred M. and Irene K. Marsh, John C. Blanford and the Moore Mill & Lumber Company, alleges that the timberlands involved are worth not less than \$250,000 but that they were induced to sell to Marsh and Blanford for about \$6000.

**Title Claimed**

Plaintiffs in the action are Etta A. Duke, Robert and Ethel Summers, Frank and Angeline Summers and Ora and Martin Summers. They contend, as the sole heirs of Charles H. and John T. Smith, they are entitled to property given to the Smiths in 1895 under the general allotment act of 1887.

The Indians charged that Marsh and Blanford later sold a deed to the disputed land to the Moore Mill & Lumber Company for \$9,000. They asked the court to set aside all agreements signed by them, declaring they are the true owners and requiring the Moore Mill & Lumber Company to account to them for proceeds from timber cut from the lands.

# Education Board Cites Cash Value Of Ballot Measure

Eugene —(AP)—The State Board of Higher Education today pointed to the cash value of an Oregon ballot measure, which has been endorsed by the board, and which would permit state agencies to continue to accept stocks received as gifts and bequests.

The board said income from gift stocks now being held provide for such higher education scholarships as the \$600 Richard Shore Smith Memorial Scholarship at the University of Oregon and the Leonora Hamilton Kerr Scholarship at Oregon State college.

**Britt Stock Sale Helps**

The board also reported that sale of stock received as a bequest of the late Amalia Britt, pioneer Jacksonville resident, is helping to finance the new student center building at Southern Oregon college in Ashland.

Income from only two estates in 1955-56 provided more than \$3,000 and paid for services and equipment at Doernbecher Memorial Hospital for Children that would not otherwise have been available.

Mr. Davis was founder of the Davis Transfer and Storage company here.

The Davis home on East Main st. has been a polling place during elections for several years. The polling place was changed this year because Mr. Davis had been ill.

He is survived by his wife, Mary Alice Davis; two daughters, Irma R. Porter, Medford, and Mrs. W. E. Kocher, Jackson, Calif.; and five grandchildren.

# Men, Bloodhounds Search for Youth

Pendleton —(AP)—Men and bloodhounds searched a snowy country northeast of Walla Walla Wash., today for a 18-year-old alien King of Walla Walla who became separated from a forest trail crew late Tuesday.

Charles Rector of Pendleton, supervisor of the Umatilla national forest, sent four men into the forest about 38 miles northeast of Walla Walla to join the search. Four bloodhounds were flown to the area from Dallas, Ore., and the Columbia county sheriff at Dayton, Wash., sent a search party.

Rector said King was on a forest service trail crew and that Tuesday afternoon he left his partner and said he was going to do some hunting on the way back to camp. He failed to show up that evening and when his partner failed to locate him, the supervisor was notified.

# Hallin to Head Forest Research

William E. Hallin, U. S. forest service project leader in charge of forest management research in northeastern California, will head research activities in southwestern Oregon, effective early next year.

He will succeed G. Lloyd Hayes, recently placed in charge of forest management research at the Rocky Mountain forest and range experiment station.

Hallin has been employed continuously by the California forest and range experiment station since 1932, except for service in World War II. During the 1930's and early '40s, he conducted studies of logging methods and forest regeneration in the redwood region and developed volume tables for redwood timber.

# Man Dies En Route To Vets Hospital

Frank von Fustman, 68, of 302 North Front st., Medford, died yesterday while en route to the Veterans Administration hospital in Portland for emergency medical attention.

He was being flown there by a Mercy Flights, Inc. air ambulance as a VA case. He died when the plane was between Salem and Portland. The body was turned over to VA authorities in Portland, who will make arrangements for funeral services. It was reported Mr. Fustman's only relatives live in the middle west.

The patient, the 533rd carried by the planes of the non-profit air ambulance corporation, had been under treatment for pleurisy, and for heart and lung conditions.

# Salem Woman Dies From Clothing Fire

Salem —(AP)—Mrs. Clara Jean Miller, 27, Salem, died here yesterday after being burned critically Oct. 11 when her clothing caught fire from a heating stove in her home.

Mrs. Miller had run down the street after her clothing caught fire, whipping the flames about her. She suffered third degree burns over most of her body.

# Retirement Coverage For Blind Appealed

Portland —(AP)—A Circuit Court ruling that 15 workers at the state workshop for the blind here are entitled to state retirement coverage has been appealed by the Oregon State Public Employees Retirement Board.

The appeal continues the three-year fight over recognition of rights staged by the workers at the blind workshop. They finally won their court battle in August when the decision now being appealed was rendered by Circuit Judge Eugene R. Oppenheimer.

The retirement board's appeal is based on an opinion handed down by Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton stating that the blind workers are not actually state employees and therefore not eligible for benefits of the state retirement system.

The blind workers make brooms, mops and other articles in the workshop operated by the blind commission here.

# Accountants Favor Simplified Tax Law

Grants Pass —(AP)—A "grass roots" survey by the Oregon Association of Public Accountants shows that businessmen and other taxpayers in Oregon hope the legislature will enact a simplified tax law, a committee report said today.

Sidney Bazzett of Grants Pass, head of the association's tax committee, said that greater conformity with federal income regulations would have a two-fold effect. He said it would reduce book work that confronts the taxpayer and would bring about a possible reduction in taxes by saving administrative costs.

Bazzett said the recommendations have been presented to the Legislative Interim Tax Committee.
