## Court Proposes New Road in Forest Plan

The Jackson county court today received an acknowledgment of its recent letter to the state highway commission asking the proposed new mountain highway between Medford and Klamath Falls be constructed soon and placed on the forest highway system.

The letter was an endorsement of a Klamath county court resolution and was presented to the highway commission at a hearing in Klamath Falls last week.

Both the resolution and letter asked highway commissioners to intercede on behalf of the court with federal officials for the purpose of early designation and construction of the highway.

The plan to include the highway in the forest highway system replaces an earlier proposal that it be built as a cooperative endeavor, with county, state and federal governments joining in the financing and maintenance of the road.

The proposed route is through Eagle Point, McAllister, Soda Springs and Lake of the Woods.

**Major Parties Given Equal Capital Time**

Washington—(U.P.)—The two major political parties have been granted equal time in the White House during the 25th century.

Each has persuaded American voters to elect its presidential candidates seven times. At the end of the current presidential term each party will have held power for 28 years.

During the first 56 years of this century nearly 441,000,000 votes have been cast for Republican and Democratic presidential candidates.

Since 1900, Republican party presidential candidates have received 220,478,693 votes. Their Democratic counterparts have polled 220,382,175 votes. Only 96,518 votes separate the two figures.
