

# SUEZ INVASION SAID IMMINENT

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## SOVIET ARMORED TROOPS MARCHING ON BUDAPEST

### American Legation Families Prepare For Evacuation

**Nagy Reported Resigned as Premier**  
Budapest—(U.P.)—Russia invaded rebellious Hungary today with heavy reinforcements of troops, planes and armored equipment. The Big Three Western powers immediately called a meeting of the U.N. Security Council.

Budapest, Hungary—(U.P.)—The United States, French and British legations prepared today to send the wives and children of their staffs home in the face of reports that Russia has decided to retake Budapest by force.

There are about 20 wives and children of American Legation members here.

In Washington, Monsignor Bela Varga, Hungarian refugee leader, said Communist Premier Imre Nagy has resigned. Varga said Premier Zoltan Tildy, chief of the anti-Communist Social Workers party, had succeeded Nagy. Varga said "irrepressible" Russian armies were entering Hungary to seal the borders and try to starve the Hungarians into submission. City surrounded.

Many Budapest residents were planning to flee to the west at the first sign of attack from Soviet troops which were reliably reported surrounding the city 10 to 15 miles from its center. However, the capital was quiet this morning. No sounds of firing that would indicate the outbreak of fighting were heard.

The Austrian radio quoted an announcement by the "Hungarian Nationalist Headquarters" this morning that two columns of Soviet tanks and motorized troops were advancing on Budapest from the northeast. The report said heavy Soviet bombers and jet fighters had crossed the northeastern frontier of Hungary at Zolnay and were heading toward airfields near Budapest.

Josef Cardinal Mindszenty again took the spotlight as the potential leader of the almost leaderless revolution. He appealed to the West for help "in this critical situation." He said all Hungarians demands that the Russians leave the country because the Hungarians "want to work for themselves and for their own nation."

An editor of the official Hungarian MTEI News Agency said Soviet armed units had occupied the Soviet-Hungarian frontier station of Zolnay this morning, according to reliable reports. There have been unconfirmed reports for several days that the Russians have poured hundreds of thousands of troops and Czechoslovakian Romanians and Czechoslovakian borders.

Budapest Radio broadcast continues appeals to employees of firms in the shattered city to remain at work, but life was slow in taking on any aspect of normalcy. Food was dangerously short, street cars were stalled by lack of power, and buses by a gasoline shortage.



### Cattle Rescued From Along Rogue; Heavy Rain Threat Eases

About 100 head of Angus cattle, belonging to Kirtland Farms at Central Point, were rescued Thursday and moved to higher ground when a grazing area along the Rogue river became inundated.

Mrs. Harriet Kendall, who with her husband operates the farms, said about 50 acres of the pasture were covered with water. The Kendalls were awakened about 4 a.m. Thursday when some horses came from the pasture to the house and whinnied. Kendall went to the flooded grazing area and found some cattle standing on drift wood and others tangled in berry vines.

At daybreak they moved all but two to higher ground. One bull joined the rest of the herd today. Mrs. Kendall said. She theorized it had been marooned somewhere and waited for the water to recede. One calf has not as yet returned.

She added the pasture land is frequently flooded and indicated conditions Thursday were not regarded as an emergency. Kirtland Farms has 100 acres of land annually subject to floods.

The Tom Parker farms, northwest of Kirtland farms, was also reported partially inundated as was the Wilton White orchard in the same area.

A rain-laden storm, which formed off the west coast, moved northeastward into Alaska today and relieved the Rogue valley from the threat of heavy rainfall which might have caused flood conditions.

While the five-day forecast for western Oregon is heavier than normal precipitation the weather bureau predicted variable cloudiness in the Medford vicinity through Saturday and forecast no hard rain here for a day or two.

### Tappings Heard From Men Trapped Deep in Coal Mine

**Seven Known Dead; 113 Still Trapped**  
Springhill, N.S.—(U.P.)—A rescue crew today heard "tapping" at the 3,400-foot level of a coal mine where more than 100 miners were trapped by an explosion of deadly coal gas.

So far, there were 13 known dead in the disaster that struck the mine late Thursday. The rescue men said they rapped eight times on a compressed air pipe and received eight raps in return. Then they tapped five times and were answered by five.

They said they were not sure whether the answering taps came from above or below them. But the exchanges were regarded as a hopeful sign that some of the men caught in the disaster might be still alive.

Five men were killed in the explosion and two volunteers died during the rescue work. Five bodies were recovered or sighted in the mine, and one man injured in the explosion died early today.

That left 113 miners trapped below ground, making the possible toll 125.

The explosion smashed the mine equipment and crews toiled today to set up a new hoist to speed their work.

Two of the seriously injured were taken to a hospital in Halifax today by Navy helicopter.

Crowds of quietly sobbing wives and children, and old men who worked in the pits in their youth, milled around beside cranes and hoists at the pithead refusing to believe some could not be saved.

### Ike To Concentrate On War Prevention

Washington—(U.P.)—President Eisenhower put aside his role of political campaigner today and concentrated on the grim task of preventing World War III.

Mr. Eisenhower delivered his "final, formal address of this political campaign" before 18,000 cheering Republican partisans in Philadelphia's Convention Hall Thursday night.

From here on out, the Chief Executive will leave to the Republican organization and his political lieutenants the chore of completing his second term election campaign.

Addressing himself to the grave crisis in the Middle East, the President declared: "I shall continue to take all actions and decisions in these times, not as a candidate for office, but as President of all the United States."

He pledged to "practice the peace that we preach," saying that "the only way to win World War III is to prevent it."

### U.N. Asks Cease Fire; Eden Refuses Answer

United Nations, N.Y.—(U.P.)—A U.N. resolution called for a cease fire in the Middle East today but Prime Minister Anthony Eden refused in the House of Commons to give his answer to the U.S. sponsored demand.

The measure, overwhelmingly approved early today, had called upon Israel to withdraw its troops promptly from Egyptian soil and urged Great Britain and France to halt the movement of military forces and arms into the embattled area.

Eden declined to answer the U.N. resolution despite repeated opposition demands.

However, British and French representatives to the United Nations indicated their governments would reject the resolution because it "does not meet the situation."

### Ike Offers Hungary \$20 Million in Aid

Washington—(U.P.)—President Eisenhower today offered Hungary \$20 million worth of American foodstuffs and medical supplies.

### Egypt Air Force Said Wiped Out; Shipping Warned

**Trapp Concentrations Target of Airplanes**  
London—(U.P.)—The Anglo-French command claimed today to have wiped out the Egyptian Air Force. It broadcast warnings to the Egyptian people indicating that invasion of the Suez Canal Zone was imminent.

Britain's Cyprus radio warned Arab listeners that "our warships will disembark tanks and guns on Egyptian soil."

The British admiralty wanted all merchant shipping to keep out of the Mediterranean between Cyprus and Egypt and out of the Gulf of Suez south of Egypt.

A communiqué issued at Anglo-French Expeditionary Headquarters on Cyprus noted land, sea and air commands for the final operation.

British and French jet fighters and bombers from Cyprus and aircraft carriers of both ends of the canal diverted some of their attacks on Egyptian airfields to troop concentrations.

A British broadcast warned Egyptian civilians to stay away from military camps around Cairo because those bases would be bombed tonight.

Egyptian President Gamal Abdel Nasser, assuming virtual dictatorial powers in his role as military governor, abandoned Sinai Desert positions to Israeli attackers and was concentrating his forces west of the canal for promised "total war."

Israel Takes Gaza Strip  
Invading Israeli forces claimed to have taken over virtually the entire Sinai Peninsula, including Gaza, a city of about 40,000, and the Gaza Strip jammed with more than 200,000 Palestinian refugees.

Capture of the Sinai Peninsula meant that the Israelis had taken over Egyptian territory 240 miles long and 130 miles deep at its widest point.

In addition to Gaza, the Israelis claimed to hold the vital Abu Athelia Road junction, the Red Sea islands of Sirah and Senabahr, and the road to Port Said, a coastal port. The Egyptians had planned to use as an escape route.

### Central Point Boy Held for Damaging Mail Boxes, Signs

A 17-year-old Central Point boy was lodged in the county jail yesterday after admitting damaging or destroying about 100 mail boxes Wednesday night in the area of Old Stage rd., between Beall lane and Kane Creek rd.

Sheriff's deputies said about 40 private signs had been torn from mail boxes and posts, and about 99 metal flags had been removed from mail boxes. The signs were later found in the yard of a residence occupied by Mrs. Ruby Opal Colgan, 617 Cedar st., Central Point.

Investigation revealed the mail boxes posts had been uprooted by hand with the bumper of a car. Samples of blue auto paint were obtained from the posts and officers examined several blue cars in the Central Point area.

The youth was stopped on the highway near Central Point when officers observed the paint on his car matched samples they had taken from posts. The car bumper also was damaged. The boy admitted the act, deputies said, and said he had been accompanied by two other youths who are on active duty in the Navy. One, 17 years old, is formerly of Central Point and the other, 18 years old, is formerly of Gold Hill.

Postal authorities were notified and told officers they would attempt to start proceedings against the two Navy youths.

Two Bids Received For Project Plant  
Two bids have been submitted for furnishing a 23,500-horsepower hydraulic turbine and governor for the Green Springs power plant of the Talent project, according to the bureau of reclamation.

Allis-Chalmers Manufacturing company, Milwaukee, Wis., submitted a bid of \$373,245 f.o.b. Rockford, Ill., and West Allis, Wis. The Baldwin-Lima-Hamilton corporation, San Francisco, submitted a bid of \$393,750, f.o.b. San Francisco.

The equipment is to be delivered to Ashland. Award of contract will await determination of freight costs and other factors, the bureau said.

Washington—(U.P.)—The United States announced today that it has cut off all military shipments to Israel.

Damascus, Syria—(U.P.)—Syria broke off diplomatic relations with Britain and France today.

London—(U.P.)—Prime Minister Anthony Eden refused today despite repeated opposition demands to give his answer to the United Nations resolution calling for a cease fire in the Middle East.

### Light Plane Missing Near Crescent City

Gold Beach—(U.P.)—A light plane carrying three persons on a flight down the coast from Newport, Ore., to Eureka, Calif., was reported missing today.

Reported aboard the red and white Tri-Car aircraft were Louis Jansen, 46, the pilot and operator of a Newport trucking company, and John Delzel and Don Dimnick, both of Newport, according to the CAA at Crescent City, Calif.

Two planes from the Curry county sheriff's rescue squadron and a Coast Guard plane made a search just before dark without finding a trace of the missing craft.

### Charge Dismissed; New One Is Filed

A charge of obtaining a narcotic drug unlawfully against Mrs. Ace E. Yates, Prospect, was dismissed in district court last night and a new charge filed against her after preliminary hearing before District Judge Rawles Moore.

Mrs. Yates had been accused of forging prescriptions for dieneal, a pain-relieving narcotic, at Waincott's pharmacy. She was arrested last Monday.

The judge held that the state had failed to show proof that she had obtained the drug. Mrs. Yates, who had been held in the county jail since her arrest, was released. A short time later she was again arrested and returned to the county jail when Harold C. Waincott, owner of the pharmacy, filed a new charge against her. She is now accused of attempting to obtain narcotics unlawfully.

Time for arraignment on the new charge had not been set this morning.

Mrs. Yates' husband, also charged with obtaining a narcotic drug unlawfully, was bound over to the grand jury after a preliminary hearing Thursday.

### Building Permits Show Increases in Medford

Building permits issued in October totaled \$256,610, compared with \$198,019 for October last year, according to Oliver R. McNeel, Medford building inspector.

Among permits for October were 16 new homes, \$178,000; 14 homes remodeled, \$12,625; three apartments remodeled, \$6,000; two businesses, \$5,500; two businesses remodeled, \$21,000; and 13 signs, \$6,585.
