

East German Communists To Reject All Reform Demands

Berlin—(U.P.)—East German Communists bluntly warned potential rebels today the government will reject all demands for reforms such as those brought about in Hungary.

Communist leaders said they would not make the "slightest concessions" to anti-Communists who have demanded more democracy and an end of Stalinism.

Demands by Students

Students led the rebel movement in the same manner which preceded the Hungarian uprising against Communist rule last week. They demanded an end to

government control of universities, the right to form student councils outside the Communist Youth organization, and an end to compulsory study of the Russian language.

But the Communist leaders warned today that "We will tolerate no provocation against the German Democratic Republic."

The Communist party newspaper Neues Deutschland said the counter-revolution is being waged in Hungary now because the Communist party and government there gave in to rebel demands for changes in both the party and the government.

Can Help in Hungary

It ruled out all such changes in East Germany, which is still ruled by Stalinist Walter Ulbricht. It called on Hungarian Communists "to take power firmly in the hand again."

"We can help them (in Hungary) by strengthening the workers' and peasants' power and not allowing the slightest infringement on it," the newspaper said. "We have clenched our fist and it will hit anyone who plots against our state or attacks it openly."

The statement was supported by a leader of the Red militia.

German Unification Seen Possible Outgrowth of Mid-Europe Unrest

Washington—(U.P.)—The wave of unrest in Eastern Europe may have brightened chances for serious negotiations with Russia on German unification and European security, diplomatic sources said today.

They reasoned that the Soviet bosses may at long last figure it would be better to negotiate a neutral belt through Central Europe than run the risk of having bitterly anti-Soviet regimes spring up in the region.

Ike, Dulles Have Hopes

Both President Eisenhower and Secretary of State John Foster Dulles apparently have hopes along this line. Both went to Paris in recent addresses to assure the Soviet Union the United States does not want regimes hostile to Russia set up in Central Europe, but rather would like governments friendly to both the Soviet Union and United States.

NATO has been struck a serious blow by the British and French attack on Egypt without consulting other NATO partners.

The result is that in a sense a buffer zone already is developing between Russia and the United States. This may persuade the Soviets the time is ripe to negotiate a security pact.

Furthermore, East Germany contains valuable uranium mines which Russia covets. And East Germany represents the western-most position Russia has held.

Mother, Son Face Charge of Murder

Hammond, Ind.—(U.P.)—First degree murder charges were to be filed today against a mother and son who murdered her husband and attempted to place the blame on a "phantom" hitchhiker.

Mrs. Gladys Martin, 35, and her 16-year-old son by one of her former marriages, Anthony Brewbaker, confessed late Wednesday they plotted the murder of her husband, Robert.

Blizzard Howls Over Four-State Region

Denver—(U.P.)—The first big blizzard of the season howled across Wyoming, Colorado, Western Kansas and Nebraska today with winds reaching as much as 70 miles an hour driving snow and ice into deep drifts.

Ahead of the blizzard, in Texas and Oklahoma, the high winds brought on dust storms and freezing cold temperatures.

In parts of Northeast Colorado and Nebraska the combination of wind and snow cut visibility to zero. Travel in the area was virtually impossible and the Colorado Highway Patrol reported road conditions throughout the state were treacherous with ice and snow.

Boy To Give Up Kidney To Save Twin Brother

Pocatello, Ida.—(U.P.)—A 12-year-old boy who lives on a fruit ranch at Mink Creek near here is looking forward to the prospect of giving up one of his kidneys to save his twin brother's life.

Jimmy and Jerry Foster will go to Boston Nov. 17 for the unusual operation at Peter Bent Brigham Hospital.

Jerry was born with a kidney condition which doctors said would cause serious uric acid poisoning as time goes on. The physicians notified the boys' parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Foster, that transplantation of a healthy kidney into Jerry's body was necessary to give him a normal life expectancy.

About 32,000 Idled In Nation by Strikes

Some 32,000 workers were idle today due to a number of strikes, but bus service was restored in 18 states with a settlement in the Eastern Greyhound Lines dispute.

Meanwhile, negotiators for the nation's railroad and 11 non-operating unions agreed Thursday night on a long-term wage settlement. The agreement was announced by the National Mediation board and called for a wage boost spread over three years.

Gary Has Bus Strike

Another bus strike was still in progress in the heavily industrial Gary, Ind., area. The strike by 445 members of the Amalgamated Association of Street, Electric Railway and Motor Coach Employees shut down the Chicago and Calumet District Transit Co. and the Gary Transit Co. About 75,000 riders are carried daily by the two lines.

The strike also closed the Northern Indiana Transit Co. in South Bend, which is used by about 40,000 persons each day.

Cleveland Papers Idle

An agreement also was reached with seven major daily New York City newspapers by the New York Guild but three Cleveland newspapers were closed by labor disputes.

Terms of the Greyhound agreement ending an unofficial one-day strike were not disclosed immediately. But Federal Conciliator Harry Young said the union committee planned to recommend unanimous adoption of the new contract.

Nixon Confident Of Pennsylvania

En Route With Nixon—(U.P.)—Vice President Richard M. Nixon ends his Pennsylvania campaign today confident the Republicans will carry the Keystone State which Democratic strategists count as crucial to their victory hopes.

He scheduled a "major" address to be televised nationally CBS, 9:30 p.m., EST, at Hershey to cap a two-day whistle stop drive for the state's 32 electoral votes. A campaign aide indicated it would deal with the tense international situation.

McKay Names Mrs. Hood To Senator Committee

Portland—Mrs. Ernest Hood, Medford, has been appointed co-chairman of the Jackson county McKay for Senator committee. Douglas McKay has announced. Mrs. Hood and other members of the Josephine county committee will underline the theme, "progress for Oregon" in appealing to voters who weigh the issues in the last few days of the campaign.

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Blasting Caps Are Reported Stolen

Ashland—Claude Poole, Ashland, has reported that a box of dynamite caps was stolen sometime Wednesday night from a locked workshop at his residence, according to Ashland police.

Poole also told Ashland police that a box of caps had been taken from the glove compartment of his pickup truck sometime Saturday or Sunday.

Entry to the workshop was made through a small window, officers said.
