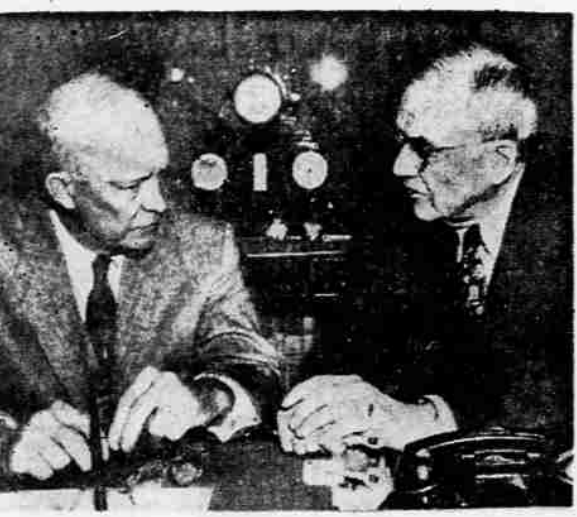

Five Bids Opened For Comfort Stations

Five bids were received on two comfort stations at the Annie Springs campground site at Crater Lake National park, according to Tom Williams, park superintendent.

Apparent low bidder was A. L. and Construction company, Grants Pass, at \$20,980. Other bids were submitted by the R. and M. Construction company, Central Point, \$26,262.62; William R. Kindred, Rivera, Calif., \$27,038; Thompson - Geoghegan Inc., Portland, \$28,064; and W. H. Conrad, Medford, \$28,500. Engineers estimate for the project was about \$20,000.

Bids will be awarded on the project some time next week. Construction of the two comfort stations is the second phase in the development of the Annie Springs campgrounds. The campgrounds project is the first work of the 10-year "Mission 66" improvement program planned for Crater Lake National park.

Oregon Traffic Mishaps 42,828 for This Year

Salem—(U.P.)—Latest traffic accident and injury figures for Oregon show 42,828 accidents reported for the first eight months of the year. Injuries numbered 10,690.

Both figures reflected increases over the same period in 1955, according to the Oregon Traffic Safety Commission. Accidents tallied 39,812 and injuries 9,488 at the end of August last year.

Governor Praises State Newspapers

Salem—(U.P.)—Gov. Elmo Smith today praised the newspapers of Oregon for their fair and liberal treatment of political news "not only to me but to all candidates regardless of party." The governor spoke at the opening session of the Pacific Northwest Newspaper Advertising Association.

"Oregon newspapers have a long record of objective newspaper reporting," the governor said.

"Fair treatment is the rule," he added. "Exceptions to this are very few. I have had honest treatment by Oregon newspapers in my opinion, we have no yellow press in Oregon."

The governor, himself a newspaperman, said that business offices of newspapers know as well as the editors so that an advertiser cannot control the policy of a good newspaper.

Static Electricity Physicist's Target

East Lansing, Mich.—(U.P.)—Static electricity, like the weather, has been much talked about. But a Michigan State University physicist is trying to do something about it.

"Static electricity," said Dr. Donald J. Montgomery, "can be dangerous in some modern situations. Hospitals, for example, have had to be careful about use of synthetic fiber blankets in operating rooms."

"The spark produced by a blanket rubbing against another fabric, or even against the skin, can cause ether to explode."

Because of static electricity's importance in the use of plastics, adhesives and synthetic fibers, Montgomery is studying the phenomenon trying to find new ways of controlling or taking advantage of it.

The electricity provides not only annoying shocks but it also is a hazard in fuel transportation and can plague industrial processes, delicate instruments
