

## No Cabinet Changes Seen After Election

Washington—(U.P.)—A White House spokesman said today he does not expect any Cabinet changes after the election.

White House Press Secretary James C. Hagerty made the statement in denying that Secretary of State John Foster Dulles may resign.

Hagerty was asked about a statement attributed to Sen. George H. Bender (R-Ohio) in Cleveland that he had heard Dulles intended to resign.

"I haven't ever heard that mentioned, and I know the secretary very well," Hagerty said.

Hagerty added that he believes he will "have the same answer next Wednesday after the election and the next four years."

Asked whether he expects any Cabinet resignations after the election, Hagerty said "I know of none."

## Development of Portentous And Hectic Week are Reviewed

The week's good and bad news on the international balance sheet:

### Explosion

An Israeli invasion of Egypt developed suddenly, dramatically and confusedly into the most serious international dispute since the Red Chinese invasion of South Korea in 1950.

Great Britain and France, without consulting the United States, presented a 12-hour ultimatum to Israeli and Egyptian forces to withdraw from the Suez Canal Zone. They announced that, unless the ultimatum was accepted, they would occupy the waterway.

Egypt rejected the ultimatum. British and French air forces opened a bombing attack against Egyptian air bases. The Israeli-Egyptian fighting became a side show.

Egypt broke off diplomatic relations with Britain and France. The United States had taken the situation to the United Nations Security Council as soon as it learned of the Israeli invasion.

When the Security Council met, Britain and France vetoed United States and Soviet Russian resolutions calling for a cease fire.

The Security Council executive committee of the U.N. then called the full General Assembly, in which all 76 member nations are represented, into its first emergency meeting since the Korean invasion.

The United States and Russia voted for the meeting against the opposition of Britain and France. President Eisenhower had tried vainly to stop Britain and France from carrying out their attack on Egypt. He and Secretary of State John Foster Dulles were openly angry at British Prime Minister Anthony Eden and French Premier Guy Mollet.

Washington suspected Britain, France and Israel of plotting the whole business to give an excuse for the occupation of the canal zone.

Thus the dispute found the United States and Soviet Russia lined up against Britain and France. America's two great allies. Its long-range effect on the world situation was incalculable.

**Titoism**  
The surge of revolt in Eastern Europe against Russian domination intensified.

So insistent was the movement that the Soviet Russian government announced it was willing to consider withdrawing its troops from Poland, Hungary and Romania and to review its economic relations with eastern European countries.

The rebels in Hungary won a historic victory. Their country, like Poland, freed itself from Moscow rule.

Cardinal Mindszenty, Roman Catholic primate of Hungary, was freed from prison and escorted in triumph into Budapest.

Hungarian "Titoist" Premier Imre Nagy took over the post of foreign minister to negotiate the complete withdrawal of Russian troops.

The East German Communists got the jitters. They announced they would crush any Titoist movement by force.

But university students, openly rebellious, demanded the freeing of educational institutions from Communist control. They threatened to hold street demonstrations. The revolts in both Poland and Hungary started with similar student demands.

## Survival of Business Ventures Discussed

Babson Park, Mass.—So much is published today about electronics, atomic energy, and new gadgets of all kinds that I have been investigating what businesses have survived throughout the centuries. Let this week's column give you my report. Probably the best evidence of what businesses are the oldest is to be found in ancient Egyptian Tombs of several thousand years ago. They all contain ceramic ware, jewelry, musical instruments, tapestries and pictures. Although all these arts have had their ups and downs—or cycles—they continue to exist. Religion has also been a "big business," alternating between great influence and barbaric persecution. Gold, silver, and fine architecture have represented wealth throughout history. Although the

early days seem crude to many of us, yet modern art and jazz have now returned to it. This definite cycle has taken place several times during the past 4,000 years. In fact, the cycle is shown in the history of Egypt itself.

Three thousand years ago Egypt was the richest and most progressive nation in the world. Then a decline came which brought poverty and chaos, finally dropping that nation into the lap of Great Britain as its poorest colony. Today's newspaper headlines are now on Egypt. The great wheels even of history are slowly but constantly revolving. This means we should carefully avoid using two words—"now" and "always"—in connection with an art, a profession, a business, or even a nation, or a religion.

**Economic History**  
However readers may disagree as to the importance of daily Bible reading, the Bible gives us an excellent review of what businesses have continued through the centuries. Bankers, lawyers, and tax collectors existed then as now. Jesus even spoke a good word for the bankers (Luke XIX) although he did not want them to carry on their business in the Temple. Fishing has also survived and much of it is being carried on in the same old-fashioned way.

When we realize that stocks and bonds were unknown several centuries ago, one wonders at their permanence; yet I forecast that some form of investment will exist. Real estate has served that purpose for thousands of years. Just now we hear much about "Shopping Centers"; but the downtown Main Street merchant who will adapt his merchandise and hours to new conditions has little to fear. The Sto, in the world's once most beautiful shopping center which flourished 2,000 years ago at Athens, Greece, has been buried for many centuries. John D. Rockefeller is now rebuilding this as a lesson to cheer merchants who cannot afford to change to a new "shopping center."

**Must Be Progressive**  
During Bible days the chief musical instrument was the harp. This gradually developed into the piano. Musical instrument stores which refused to sell pianos were probably forced out of business. Yet more harps are being sold today than ever before. We once thought that kerosene would kill the candle business; that gas would kill the kerosene business; and that electricity would put gas out of business. Yet more candles, more kerosene, and more gas were sold last year than ever before.

Why do I write this column today? My reason is to prevent any manufacturer or merchant from hastily giving up without having some expert make a study of his business, prospective parking lots, and needed changes. Such a merchant should not be in a hurry to sell or give up, but it is wise for him to keep out of debt and to advertise. Then he will have very little to worry about. Sometimes I think that when the next business depression does come, it will be due to the worries of manufacturers, retailers, and especially the consumers, who are most important of all.

## The UNKNOWN FACTORS

Admitted by unbiased authorities on Fluoridation

From the book "Fluoridation as a Public Health Measure," 1954

This text book published for the Public Health worker, the civic official, the water works engineer or the interested layman by the American Assn. for the Advancement of Science is admittedly the basis for the Public Health Service stand on Fluoridation. It is the manual which forms the basis for the promotion of nation-wide Fluoridation.

Page 41 "The point is that the daily intake of fluorine required by the various ages of children in order to give the most favorable effect on teeth is unknown."

Page 85 "The frequency of occurrence of these bony changes in human populations is largely unknown; the total number of patients that have been examined in this country is less than 300. To add to the uncertainty, several of the investigators who have carried out radiographic bone studies have been unable to fix precisely the fluoride exposure of their patients."

Page 74 "Just how safe is the level of concentration of fluoride in drinking water currently proposed as a basis for the addition of fluoride to community water supplies? Very safe, in all likelihood, but that question cannot be answered finally until there is available a better understanding of the mechanisms thru which deposition of fluoride causes radiopacity and hypertrophic changes in bones, as well as accurate knowledge of the levels of injection at which these phenomena first begin to appear in man."

Page 88 "A major question unanswered is whether the severity of the enamel mottling will be the same in communities where water fluoridation is in progress as in communities where the water naturally contains fluorides."

Page 89 "The fact is that in each community there is no uniformity of mottling in every child, instead there is a well defined variability from child to child."

Page 91 "Did these children have a less perfect nutrition, is it a matter of the amount of calcium in the diet, is the appearance of mottling related to rate of maturation of the skeleton, is there some hormonal imbalance responsible, is this an inherited predisposition? Did all these children happen to be excessively thirsty? Did they all happen to drink more of the community water supply? At present we have no indication of what factors control the severity of mottling. Here is an important field for epidemiological research and for animal experimentation."

Page 96 "Mottling of the enamel has been studied in some detail histologically; the hypoplasia results from the failure of the ameloblast to function properly. The columnar cells are altered in appearance, sometimes becoming flat and cuboidal; this is a non-specific response that has also been observed after mechanical injury and in certain vitamin deficiencies. The factors (including the role of fluoride) responsible for the alterations in the form and function of the ameloblast are unknown. It may be suggested that enzyme reactions concerned with calcification as well as with the restorative activities of the bone cells undergo some derangement when influenced by excessive concentrations of fluoridation."

Page 100 "More information is needed on the incidence and severity of diseases such as arthritis that might conceivably have some component of skeletal change involved. More information is needed on the occurrence of anemia, of thyroid disease, of kidney disease, as well as of oral disease."

Page 103 "In the case of mottled enamel, the factor of safety is not large, but it is sufficiently great to permit a confident prediction that severe mottling in the form of stained teeth with grooved and pitted surfaces will not be seen."

REMEMBER: It is admitted that 15 to 20 per cent of the children will have mottling of the teeth, when using fluorides in the recommended concentration of 1 ppm.
