Paris—Breezed from Brussels to Paris on that train called Le Oiseau Blue (The Bluebird). Very speedy vehicle. Arrived at Gare Nord Paris right on time. Trip was uneventful. Only misplaced one piece of baggage. This I personally found. My feat was applauded by both the train and station porter. I have developed into a grade A foreign trip baggage spotter. If any of our subscribers are contemplating a trip through Europe with 10 or more pieces of baggage I will be glad to offer some helpful hints on handling same. I have ceased to worry about baggage. Now all I have to worry about is losing my passport.

Paris There has been some very sharp criticism made recently of Paris as it concerns tourists. I will check this situation thoroughly. However, no matter what faults I may discover Paris has, I will love her still. So far I have found none. At the Gare Nord our baggage was handled by a jovial and friendly porter. We had a lot of laughs from my method of conversation with a combination of pantomime and curious French. The taxicab driver was also a genial fellow. My girl friend who speaks French tried out her pronunciation on him. He made a few corrections but said she handled the language very well. The fare was less than it would be in New York for same distance and amount of baggage. The taxicab skipper was satisfied with tip and before he drove off we shook hands all around.

Hotel We are domiciled at the hotel George Fifth. This, as you probably know, is one of the world's greatest hotels. It is brilliantly managed by the very popular Max Blouet. It is just off the Champs Elysees in the heart of one of the city's busiest sections. However, our room which is on the court is as quiet as if it were on a country lane. The service is superb. I am always interested in service because I was once in the hotel business myself. I was a night clerk. I'll tell you about that sometime. Also, my grandfather owned a restaurant in New York City.

The critics of Paris seem very bitter about the taxi drivers. I had much to do this morning which called for taxi trips. I had no trouble. The prices were right. The tip 10 or 15 per cent of what was on the meter was always received with a cherry: "Merci, monsieur." I had a coffee break at Weber's elegant sidewalk cafe near the Madeleine. Just to check the situation, I asked the waiter to name his tip. I held out a handful of francs for him to select from. He said,

"Ten per cent, monsieur." My check was a little over 25 cents so the tip he named was about three cents.

Please Note The vendors of those highly indecent photographs are still hovering about the Madeleine. There are also many itinerant money changers. The latter will offer you 400 francs to a dollar. The official rate is 350 francs to a dollar. However, as you can imagine, a sidewalk money changer is very likely to hand you some "funny money." That is, counterfeit.

Old Place This afternoon I went to my old stopping place, Fouquet's on the Champs Elysees. It is just about the same as always. However, the parking situation on the Champs Elysees is ruining that thoroughfare, one of the world's most beautiful boulevards. In heading for parking space, the cars travel along the sidewalk. That greatly disturbs the tranquility of the sidewalk cafes. I am going to complain bitterly about this situation. I will start by writing a letter of protest to the editor of the Paris Soir.

Horses and Women Haven't checked on the horse situation yet but the woman situation seems as always. There is a plenitude of feminine pulchritude here. However, I will report in detail on this situation later. I'll be going out to Longchamp. That's where the smart looking females really assemble. Some very unusual horses can also be usually seen at Longchamp. I think Eddie Arcaro and Sam Boulmetis will agree with me on that.

OFF STREET PARKING KNOW THE FACTS

Can It Become A Property Tax Burden? A Tax On All Property in the City is a Possibility! The proposed charter amendment provides:

Ordinance No. 6548, Chapter XVII—

"Sec. 2. In addition to the bonds heretofore or otherwise authorized by this charter, the city council is hereby authorized to borrow money on the faith of said city and for that purpose issue general obligation bonds of said city to obtain necessary funds for motor vehicle off street parking and the debt limitations shall not apply to the bonds.

"Sec. 3. In the event the pledged revenues available for payment of the bonds authorized in Sec. 2 (by your vote of approval) shall for any reason be insufficient to pay the bonds and interest thereon, the city council shall levy ad valorem taxes upon all the taxable property within the city of Medford in an amount sufficient to pay the principle and interest on said bonds."

Those advocates of off street parking would have one believe that the taxpayers of Medford could never be called upon to pay off the debt created for off street parking. That is far from the truth as evidenced by the charter amendment itself.

It is proposed that the present street parking meters be doubled in cost to park: that is—5c for 30 minutes and 10c per hour. The meters to be installed on the proposed parking lots to be 5c per hour with a 2 hour limit in the hopes that the high cost of street parking will cause patrons wishing to do business in downtown Medford to use "Off Street Parking."

The conclusions are, the property owners could be called upon to pay by immediate tax about \$140,000.00. Is this tax an obligation we property owners want?
