

Salmon Fishing in Puget Sound Closes

Olympia — (U.P.) — The Washington State Fisheries Department Friday closed commercial salmon fishing on Puget Sound for the rest of November because of what it termed "the extremely light chum salmon run."

The closure was effective immediately.

Robert Schoettler, fisheries director, said the catch of chum this season was the lowest on record—87,000 fish. He said the department decided that it was necessary to spare the remainder of the run so it can reach the spawning grounds.

Ike, Holmes Win in Mock Election at SOC

Ashland — A large number of Southern Oregon college students turned out to vote Wednesday in the traditional mock election held at the campus.

Dr. Marshall Woodell, professor of social science, supervised the election, and was assisted by 58 political science students. The event is sponsored each election year by the social science department.

"Elect Eisenhower."

SOC students "elected" Dwight D. Eisenhower by a sound 112-1 majority in the presidential race.

In the Oregon senatorial contest Wayne Morse was favored by almost 2-1 over Douglas McKay, and in the battle for national representative, Harris Ellsworth also had a 2-1 majority over Charles Porter.

The vote for the governor's chair was close, with Robert Holmes edging Elmo Smith by a slim margin. In other state offices, Mark Hatfield had a substantial majority of votes over Monroe Sweetland for secretary of state; Sig Underdahl doubled Wiley Smith's vote for treasurer; Robert Thornton had a 2-1 majority over Carl Francis in the attorney general contest; Robert Boyer easily topped the state representative vote, and Robert Duncan nabbed the second spot, with E. A. Littrell and E. H. Mann trailing.

In a light vote for judges of the Supreme Court, Walter L. Toose had 146 votes in position 3; Hall S. Lusk got 147 votes in position 5; Harold J. Warner

Athletes, Orphan Airlift Planned

Portland — (U.P.) — An athletes and orphans airlift plan was disclosed here Saturday by Harry Holt of Creswell, as he departed on his seventh Pacific aircrossing to Korea to launch the biggest orphan rescue operation since he started the operation more than a year ago.

Holt revealed that Pan American Airways is considering routing some of its planes to Korea to pick up Holt's orphans after airlifting the United States Olympic teams to Australia. Holt expects to bring back 150 Korean orphans for adoption in the United States. The trip is Holt's first since he was stricken by exhaustion while returning on a similar rescue mission in August.

Holt said President Eisenhower has taken emergency action that would permit orphans already adopted by Americans to enter this country without visas up to Dec. 31. Quotas named in previous legislation has been filled but Holt expects that new legislation will be written by the next Congress.

The Creswell farmer's rescue operation has been conducted at his own expense and was started after he was shocked by the plight of youngsters of mixed American - Korean parentage who were abandoned in Korea. He adopted eight of the children himself.

City Asks Court to Break up Boycott

Montgomery, Ala.—(U.P.)—The city of Montgomery sought by court action Saturday to break up a car pool which has enabled Negroes for 11 months to boycott the city transit system.

The city asked circuit court in a suit filed Friday to abolish the car pool by injunction on grounds that it is a private enterprise operated without proper licensing and is a "public nuisance."

PROOF THAT FLUORIDATION IS A DETRIMENT

People who are in favor of putting Fluorine in our drinking water claim it will cut down tooth decay in the children. However, they do not know what it will do to people who drink it for fifty to eighty years. The following will partly answer that question.

The Iowa Agricultural Experiment Station, Ames, Iowa, has put out a bulletin on the effect that different kinds of feeds have on hogs. The tests ended when the hogs weighed 200 pounds.

- One of the rations contained Fluorine.
- On this ration the pigs gained slower.
- The breaking strength of the femur bones was lower (in other words the bones broke easier.)
- There was an increase in the ash content of the bones.
- The total weight of fresh bone marrow was lower.
- Greater calcification in the anterior and posterior portions of the medullary cavity was also apparent.
- As the Fluorine content of the rations increased, there was a corresponding increase in the Fluorine content of the femur bones. (Since bone marrow is a blood making organ and since Fluorine causes a reduction in the amount of bone marrow—it is only reasonable to expect it will have a detrimental effect on our blood.)
- The average amount of Fluorine in the ration, for two levels was from .0025 to .0045 per cent respectively.
- As you see the per cent of Fluorine is much higher than one part to a million, which we are asked to drink all our lives. However, the Fluorine is accumulative in our bodies. And since the above ration has the above effect on hogs that only live until they weigh 200 pounds—what effect is it going to have on humans who live from 50 to 80 years? The answer will have to be our bones will be more brittle than without the Fluorine. That means more broken bones. We don't know what else it may cause, since the bone marrow, a blood making organ, is reduced in weight.
- Here is proof of what Fluorinated water will do to the bones of people who drink it all their lives.
- Since Ames College Experiment Station has proven fluorides are a detriment to hogs—how can humans think fluorides will be a benefit to them?
- It is up to the Voters to say what they want.
