Dessert was served at the home of Mr. and Mrs. John Lusk, 33 South Riverside avenue. Dancing ended the gay occasion.

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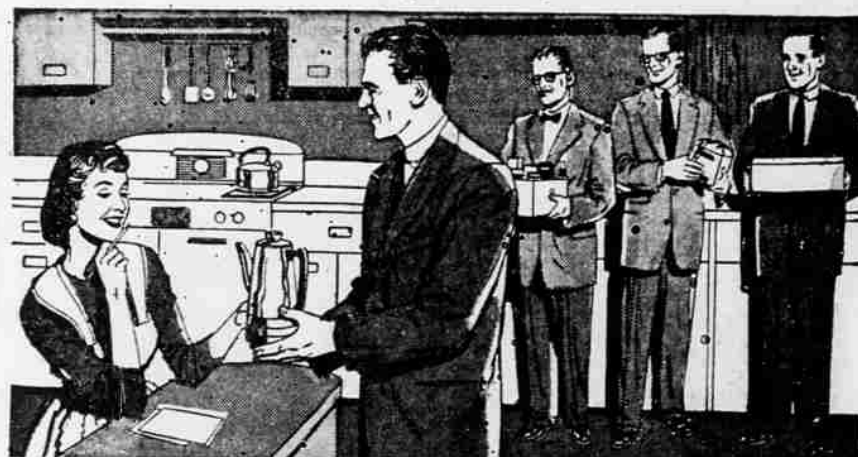
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
