Gold Star Mothers will hold installation of new officers at the home of Mrs. James Wicker, 809 Adams lane, Thursday, November 8, at 2 p.m.

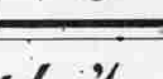
Mrs. Elizabeth J. Gimpl of Eugene will be installing officers. All members are asked to attend. Refreshments will be served.

Miss Sumruld is a junior in Phoenix High school, and her fiancé was graduated from Grants Pass High school in 1953.

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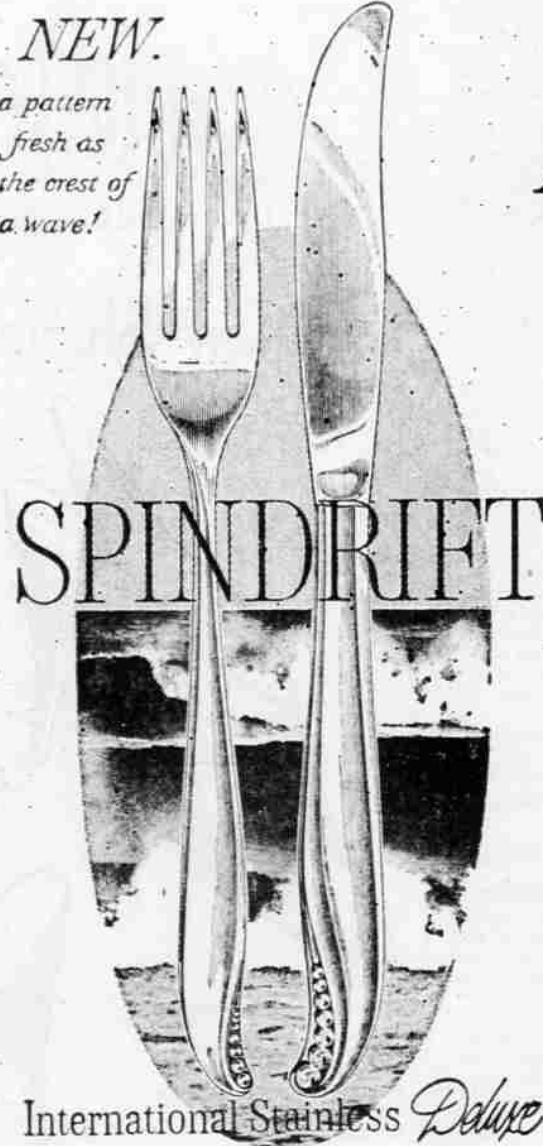
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
