Mr. and Mrs. William H. Hill observed their golden wedding anniversary October 25. The Hills, who live at 215 West Jackson street, have lived in Medford for 24 years.

In celebration of the anniversary, Mr. and Mrs. Hill with Mr. and Mrs. John Gorr, son Charles and nephew, Dean, had dinner at Omar's restaurant in Ashland.

The Hills were married October 25, 1910, in Cuba, Kansas. Mrs. Hill being the former Martha Holland of Abilene, Kan. Mr. Hill, a veteran of the Spanish-American war, is a retired newspaper editor and printer. Both were born in Republic county, Kansas.

He founded and edited a weekly paper in Munden, Kan., printing it on a Washington hand press. Later he owned the Munden Progress in Kansas, and also founded and operated a weekly paper in Scandia, Kan. From Kansas the Hills went to Richfield, Ida., where for seven years they owned and operated the Richfield Recorder.

While in Richfield the Hills bought their first linotype machine, and Mrs. Hill learned to operate the machine. They recall that the machine cost \$3,500, a fraction of the present-day cost. Before that time, type for their papers had been set by hand. From Richfield the couple moved to Jerome, and there they operated a fifth newspaper, the Jerome County Journal. During the depression years, the Hills traded their Idaho paper and property for a tract of land and house on Crater Lake avenue. During World War II Mr. Hill worked for Commercial Printing company for a time.

Mrs. Hill, a musician, taught piano for a number of years and painting has been her hobby. Now almost totally blind, Mrs. Hill works with Jackson County Council of the Blind.

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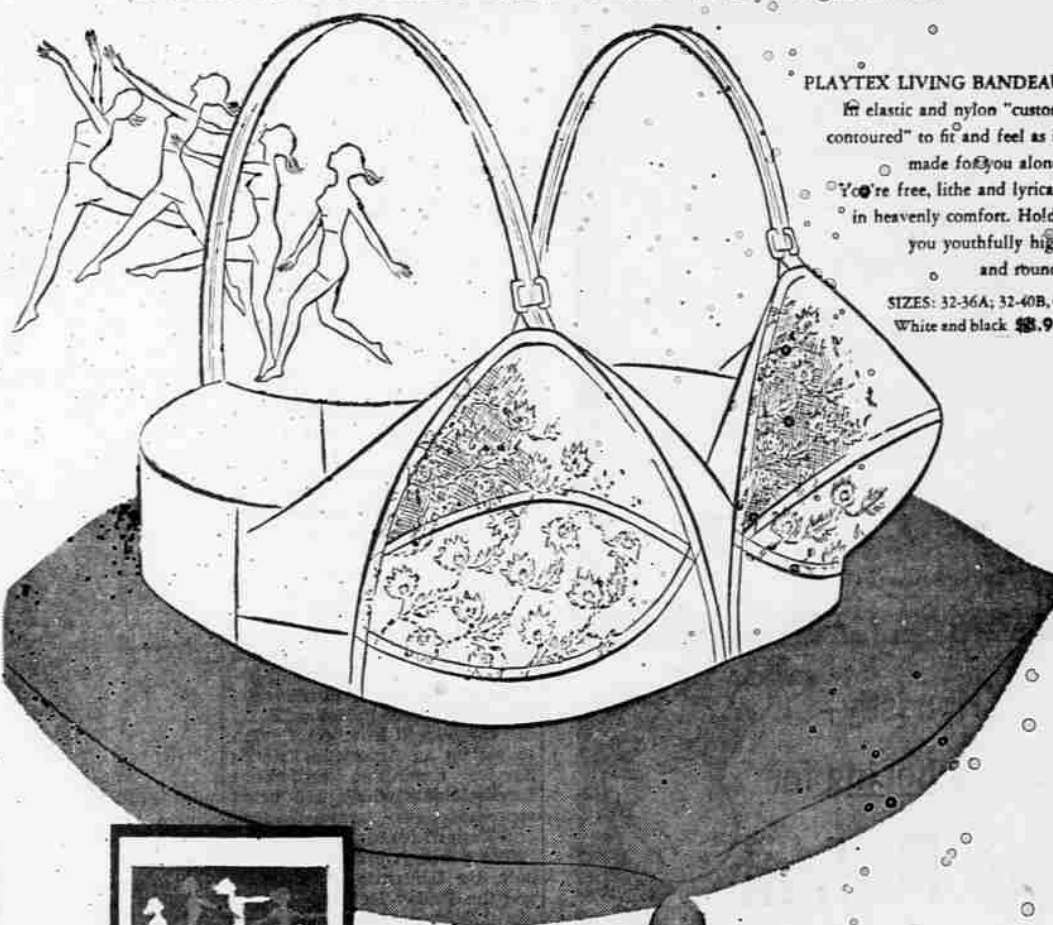
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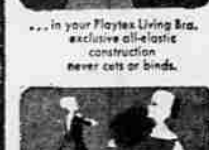
