Another guest in his home at the same time was a young fellow out of work whom the Senator was entertaining until he could find him a job.

As you know, the Senator is often called the CONSCIENCE of the Senate. Let's pray for him and give him the support he needs to represent us and the whole nation in Washington.

Sewers and Annexation

To the Editor (and also voters of the Berrydale district):
Friday we all received three pages of quotes and comments from the "opposition to annexation committee."

It started out with a misleading statement, about the Medford water and disposal plant being bought for one dollar. The disposal plant, yes. But the present source of water from the Big Butte springs, above Butte Falls, was piped to Med-

ford in the 1920s. Camp White got its water from Medford, and we were rationed on water as a result. The second line from the springs was put in right after the war—all paid for by Medford.

Any "quote" that is not complete is not to be depended on. By using parts, most anything can be proved. The underlined "quotes" about the council meeting look impressive, but whoever thought the mayor could give us a sewer? How soon we get it depends entirely on how soon this district can get itself organized to pay for it, and how much some of the residents fight even a sewer. Some have said they don't want it. Annexation gives us the right to use the Medford disposal plant.

The sanitation law now under consideration clearly states the districts served are to be assessed for the costs. Is that any different than what we have been talking about? We pay for it just the same.

Only if we can't use the Medford plant, we also will be assessed to build a disposal plant, and for its operation, which will double the assessment. But I notice there was no "comment" on that. Do your own thinking. Don't take the thoughts of those who don't even want a sewer and have said so.

No matter how it is worked out, we have to pay full price for our own district sewer. We can't afford to neglect these open sewer ditches much longer! Is money more important than health? Expert help on figuring out taxes was offered this week. How many used it?
