LULU SCOTT

Funeral services for Mrs. Lulu Shaver Scott, 65, of Scotts Mills, Ore., will be conducted at 2 p.m. Wednesday in the Friends church at Scotts Mills, with the Rev. Charlotte Macy officiating. Interment will be in Maple Grove cemetery at Scotts Mills. Chapel Mortuary is in charge of services and interment.

Mrs. Scott, the daughter of Alfred H. and Margaret Riding Shaver, was born in Glad Tidings, Ore., on July 11, 1871. She was married in Marquam, Ore., on June 21, 1893, to Charles Scott, who preceded her in death on March 6, 1923. Mr. Scott's father, R. H. Scott, founded the mills in the area then known as the Nolen donation claim, and this location became what is now the town of Scotts Mills.

Mrs. Scott's father crossed the plains from Kentucky in 1850, and settled in the Waldo hills east of what is now Salem. Her mother came to the west coast with two brothers, around the Horn in a sailing ship and they also settled in the Waldo hills. After their marriage the couple spent the greater part of their life in Scotts Mills and Woodburn. Mrs. Scott was a member of the Friends church, and a former member of the Order of Eastern Star.

Survivors include two sons, A. Merle Scott, of Medford, and Charles Weston Scott, of Tillamook, Ore.; five grandchildren and three great grandchildren.

Pre-Election Rally Carries Stocks Higher

New York—(UP)—A pre-election rally today carried stocks to new highs since Sept. 17 on the most active trading since Aug. 21.

The rise coincided with a reported cease fire order in Port Said, Egypt. That information brought a smart recovery in international oils while domestic oils, strong early in the session, fell back from their highs.

Oils dominated the whole market. An example of the recovery in the Middle East oil group was Royal Dutch which came back from 103 to 107 1/4, the later up 3 1/4 points net.
