San Francisco—(U.P.)—Thirteen Japanese maidens, victims of the atomic bombings at Hiroshima during World War II, Saturday left for home looking far different than when they arrived here a year and a half ago.

The 13, part of a group of 25 scarred victims brought to this country for a series of plastic surgeries in New York, departed for Tokyo Nov. 5.

In Honolulu, where they will remain overnight, they will be tendered a reception. Norman Cousins, a magazine editor who had arranged for the girls to receive medical treatment in America, made the return trip with them, as did some of the surgeons who had performed the operations.
