### Freedoms Asked in Malaya Constitution

Kuala Lumpur — (U.P.) — The three major political parties in Malaya have asked for 15 "freedoms" to be written into the new constitution for an independent Malaya.

The recommendations were submitted to the Reid Constitutional commission, which is writing the new constitution, by the United Malaya National organization, the Malayan Chinese association and the Malayan Indian congress.

1. Freedom of expression, speech, assembly and worship.
2. Freedom from want and fear.
3. Equality before the law.
4. Protection of life and personal property.
5. Freedom from arrest and detention except according to law.
6. Protection against retrospective offenses and punishment.
7. Freedom of association, belief and faith.
8. Freedom to acquire, hold and dispose of property.
9. Protection against confiscation of property except according to the law with due compensation.
10. Protection against slavery and forced labor.
11. Freedom to engage in trade and in the professions.
12. Protection of children in employment of a hazardous nature.
13. Freedom to profess, practice and propagate any religion and to establish and maintain religious institutions.
14. Protection of the languages and culture of all races, and of their schools and cultural institutions.

2. The Bill of Rights guarantees every person accused of a crime the right to be represented by an attorney, even though he lacks the funds to employ one.

3. The Bill of Rights prohibits denial of bail or excessive bail except on charges of murder or treason.

4. The Bill of Rights provides that no person be compelled to testify against himself.
 

Nunley contrives to get a complete written statement from every defendant, incriminating himself. This is accomplished by implying there will be leniency, which only the Courts have the power to grant.
