Entertainer Talks at Knife, Fork Meeting

Drawing on her experiences as a war-time entertainer in the Pacific and as an actress of many years, Miss Betty Roadman spoke for Rogue Valley Knife and Fork club last night. Her topic was "An Actress Looks at America."

Miss Roadman declared that the rest of the world looks to the United States for an interpretation of human values and said "we must have confidence in ourselves if we are to inspire the confidence of others."

Quotes Historian
The speaker quoted Historian Arnold J. Toynbee as having said that the people of this nation have made great progress in recent years in showing the world a true concept of brotherhood, and added that "we must be careful that we don't leave God out of brotherhood."

Miss Roadman, who flew about 20,000 miles in the Pacific region while traveling with the cast of a play, said she "saw democracy in action." One of the examples she gave along this line was the experience of attending an Episcopal cathedral service in Honolulu where the acolytes and choir members were of all colors and all races and she added "there lies the hope of the world."

She also described her visit to Mt. Surabachi on Iwo Jima to see the historic spot where U.S. Marines raised the American flag during the Pacific campaign of World War II. The speaker said she saw two cemeteries, a large one filled with the graves of American servicemen and a small one equally well kept, where the war dogs who died in the invasion are buried. "What other government in the world would devote a cemetery to war dogs?" she asked.

Describes Trials
The speaker also described one of the Japanese war criminal trials which she attended saying that it was conducted with scrupulous fairness and justice, and that one of the two Japanese officers on trial had been completely acquitted.

Miss Roadman ended her talk by reading the poem "How Big is a Heart" and said "When the human heart begins to hold the whole world, then we shall have peace."
